We will not redraw the block completely, but we will keep the block split by the new line and add a suffix to the block name. For example, if block 1000 needs to be split by a new congressional district boundary, it will become 1000A on one side of the CD line and 1000B on the other. We also do this in cases where an incorporated changes their boundary and the annexation is not coincident with the census blocks.
