### ADOPTED REGULATION OF THE

#### STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

#### **LCB File No. R050-16**

Effective June 28, 2016

EXPLANATION - Matter in *italics* is new; matter in brackets [omitted material] is material to be omitted.

AUTHORITY: §§1 and 2, NRS 385.080 and 385.448.

A REGULATION relating to education; revising the minimum passing score for certain high school equivalency assessments; revising the required scores on certain high school equivalency assessments needed to waive credits; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

### **Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

Existing law requires the State Board of Education to select an assessment which enables a person who satisfies certain requirements to demonstrate that he or she has achieved an educational level which is an acceptable substitute for completing a high school education by taking a high school equivalency assessment. (NRS 385.448) Existing regulations: (1) adopt the General Educational Development Test, the HiSET Exam and the Test Assessing Secondary Completion as high school equivalency assessments; and (2) prescribe the minimum passing score for each assessment. (NAC 385.408) **Section 1** of this regulation changes, from 150 to 450, the minimum passing score for the General Education Development Test, if the test was taken before January 1, 2014. **Section 1** also provides that 145 is the minimum passing score for the General Education Development Test, if the test was taken on or after January 1, 2014.

Existing regulations authorize a person who passes the tests of general educational development to waive the units of credit required for an adult standard diploma if he or she: (1) is at least 18 years of age; or (2) is at least 17 years of age and is enrolled in an alternative program for the education of pupils at risk of dropping out of school established by a school district pursuant to NRS 388.537. (NAC 385.404, 389.694) Existing regulations also prescribe the minimum score that is required to waive credits and the corresponding number of credits which can be waived. **Section 2** of this regulation revises the minimum scores required on the General Education Development Test in order to waive certain numbers of credits.

**Section 1.** NAC 385.408 is hereby amended to read as follows:

385.408 1. Pursuant to NRS 385.448, the State Board hereby selects the following as high school equivalency assessments:

- (a) The General Educational Development Test;
- (b) The HiSET Exam; and
- (c) The Test Assessing Secondary Completion.
- 2. The minimum passing score:
- (a) For the General Educational Development Test is a standard score of [150] at least 450 on each of the four subtests [...], if the test was taken before January 1, 2014.
- (b) For the General Educational Development Test is a standard score of at least 145 on each of the four subtests, if the test was taken on or after January 1, 2014.
- (c) For the HiSET Exam is a standard score of 8 on each of the five subtests and an average standard score of 9 on the five subtests.
- (c) (d) For the Test Assessing Secondary Completion is a standard score of 500 on each of the five subtests.
  - **Sec. 2.** NAC 389.694 is hereby amended to read as follows:
- 389.694 1. Except as otherwise provided in this section, a person who is 18 years of age or older and who seeks an adult standard diploma may waive units of credit for language arts, mathematics, science and social studies by taking a high school equivalency assessment in those subjects. A person who seeks an adult standard diploma who is at least 17 years of age but less than 18 years of age and who is enrolled in an alternative program for the education of pupils at risk of dropping out of school established by a school district pursuant to NRS 388.537 may waive units of credit pursuant to this section.
- 2. The maximum number of credits which may be waived in the areas of language arts, mathematics and science must be based on the number of credits previously earned which meet the minimum requirements for course content outlined in NAC 389.450 to 389.511, inclusive,

and the credits waived upon the completion of a high school equivalency assessment selected pursuant to NRS 385.448.

- 3. Credits in elective courses may be waived only in the area of social studies. The maximum number of credits which may be waived in the area of social studies must be based on a high school equivalency assessment selected pursuant to NRS 385.448.
- 4. The following tables set forth the scores which a person must achieve on a high school equivalency assessment to waive credits in required and elective courses and the corresponding number of units which may be waived:

# LEGISLATIVE REVIEW OF ADOPTED REGULATIONS—NRS 233B.066 Informational Statement LCB File No. R050-16

- 1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation: The minimum passing score in NAC 385.408 needs to match the minimum passing score approved by GED Testing Service. When the new test was released in January 2014, the passing score was set at 250. Recently GED Testing Service revised the minimum passing score to 145, retroactive to January 2014, based on analysis of test data since the new test was released. Without this amendment, test-takers who score between 145-149 are not eligible to earn the Certificate of High School Equivalency (HSE). The language in 389.694 is changed o adjust the score range for the waiver of credits for an adult standard diploma.

Mr. Kehes stated that by adjusting the cut score from 150 to 145 about 1400 students in Nevada will be able to get their credential. This is for those who tested January 2014 going forward. Most of the GED administering states changed their cut score as of March 1, only Nevada and New Jersey have not adjusted their scores yet.
