LEGISLATIVE REVIEW OF ADOPTED REGULATIONS AS REQUIRED BY NRS 233B.066

LCB FILE R076-21

The following statement is submitted for adopted amendments to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) Chapter 640A.

1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation.

The need for the proposed regulations is to protect the public health, safety and welfare by ensuring that only qualified and competent occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants are licensed in the state.

The proposed regulation clarifies the requirements relating to the renewal of a license to practice occupational therapy; revising provisions relating to the supervision of provisional licensees; revising provisions relating to continuing education requirements; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

The regulation allows the Board to accept an application for renewal of any type of license up to 30 days after the expiration date of the license; eliminates the requirement to complete 640 hours of supervised practice if an applicant for a provisional license was previously certified but has not practiced for 5 years before application; and eliminates the requirements for submission of a form to comply with continuing education requirements.

2. A description of how public comment was solicited, a summary of public response, and an explanation of how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Copies of the proposed regulation, notice of workshop and notice of intent to act upon the regulation were sent by e-mail to persons who were known to have an interest in occupational therapy as well as any persons who had specifically requested such notice. - 5. A description of how comment was solicited from affected businesses, a summary of their response, and an explanation how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

The Board used informed, reasonable judgment in determining that there will not be an impact on small businesses.

In making this determination, the Board considered the content of the regulation in making a determination the occupational therapy practitioners regulated by the Board will not have their practice impacted nor will there be an impact on a small business due to the nature of the regulatory changes.

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6. If the regulation was adopted without changing any part of the proposed regulation, a summary of the reasons for adopting the regulation without change.

The Board of Occupational Therapy adopted the regulation on **March 19, 2022** without change. There were no written or oral comments on the proposed regulation.

The Board determined the regulation was appropriate and necessary and that undue burden is not placed upon licensees as a result of the provisions of the regulation.

There will **be no significant adverse economic effect of these adopted regulations** on the businesses which it is to regulate (occupational therapists and occupational therapy assistants) nor the public. The adopted regulations will benefit the occupational therapy practitioners and the public by clarifying renewal requirements, and eliminating unnecessary practice requirements for a provisional license and obsolete continuing education documentation requirements for renewal of a license

(b) Both immediate and long-term effects.

Immediate effect will be improved administration through clarification of existing law and regulatory requirements. Long-term effect will be clarity and consistency in regulation of occupational therapy practitioners in Nevada.

8. The estimated cost to the agency for enforcement of the adopted regulations.

There are no additional costs involved in the enforcement of these adopted regulations.

A description of any regulations of other state or government agencies which the proposed regulation overlaps or duplicates and a statement explaining why the duplication or overlapping is necessary. The Board of Occupational Therapy is not aware of any similar regulations of other state or government agencies that the adopted regulations overlap or duplicate.

The Board of Occupational Therapy is not aware of any similar federal regulations of the same activity in which the adopted regulations are more stringent.
