LEGISLATIVE REVIEW OF ADOPTED REGULATIONS AS REQUIRED BY NRS 233B.066 LCB FILE R128-21

The following statement is submitted for adopted amendments to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) Chapter 641.

1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation.

This regulation establishes requirements governing the use of a recording of the provision of psychological services to a patient for a training activity. The Board of Psychological Examiners proposed the regulation in order to comply with the provisions and intent of Assembly Bill 366 (2021). That bill was proposed by the Board in order to clarify that such training recordings should not be part of the medical record.

This regulation requires that the form on which a patient provides informed written consent for the use of a recording in a training activity must inform the patient of the following: who will have access to the recording, the manner in which it will be stored and kept confidential, and the time frame for the destruction of the recording. This section of the regulation was created to ensure full transparency with individuals receiving psychological services, including the ways in which a training recording may be used when services are provided by a psychological assistant, psychological intern, or psychological trainee.

This regulation establishes that a person having custody or control of a recording that is used or maintained for the purpose of a training activity shall maintain the recording in accordance with confidentiality laws, and ensure the recording is destroyed upon completion of its use by the supervisor of the training activity, or thirty (30) days after the date on which the recording was made. This section of the regulation complies with the provisions of Assembly Bill 366 (2021) which required regulation be created for this purpose.

The definitions of "recording" and "training activity" have been included for the purposes of this regulation. The definitions allow for clarity by psychological licensees, supervisors, supervisees, and the general public.

2. A description of how public comment was solicited, a summary of public response, and an explanation of how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Notices of workshop and notices of intent to act upon the regulation were sent to persons who were known to have interest in the application requirements of psychologists in the state of Nevada, as well as any specific person who requested notification regarding regulation changes. Such distribution included further information on how to receive a free copy of the proposed regulation. These documents were also made available through the website of the Board of Psychological

Examiners, psyexam.nv.gov or by directly emailing the Board office (NBOP@govmail.state.nv.us), and posted at the locations listed below.

A workshop was held to discuss language changes to the current NAC 641 on September 10, 2021, and the minutes of the meeting, which can be obtained through contacting the Board office or locating them on the Board's website Psyexam.nv.gov, contain a summary of the discussion held regarding the proposed language change. No written or public comment was submitted.

Thereafter, on or about April 1, 2022, the Board of Psychological Examiners issued a Notice of Intent to Act Upon a Regulation which incorporated the proposed amendment that was discussed at the above workshop. That notice included a request for submission of public comment regarding adoption of the regulation.

On May 6, 2022, a public hearing was held, where the Board of Psychological Examiners received testimony from three members of the public. No written public comment was received. The Board of Psychological Examiners approved adoption of the proposed regulation R128-21 with two changes. The first, related to the definition of recording, changed the word "tape" to "recording." The second clarified language related to the destruction date for recordings of training activities.

No written comment was submitted and testimony comment was provided by three members of the public at the public hearing.

Comment was received that resulted in two revisions to the language of the regulation.
