LEGISLATIVE REVIEW OF ADOPTED REGULATIONS OF THE COLORADO RIVER COMMISSION OF NEVADA AS REQUIRED BY NRS 233B.066 INFORMATIONAL STATEMENT LCB FILE R071-22

The following statement is submitted for adopted amendments to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) Chapter 538.610.

1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation.

The proposed regulation change involves two areas. The first change removes the projection of annual costs based on a review of the past two years and replaces it with a projection based on a review of the average of at least three previous years' annual costs incurred and adjusted for future known and expected changes. This change allows for some flexibility in forecasting the Colorado River Commission of Nevada's ("Commission's") costs of operations related to hydropower based on a wider range of past average annual costs that could be more reflective of future costs and allows for known or expected changes that may be required.

The second change removes the requirement to determine an administrative rate that is charged solely on the kilowatt hours of energy delivered to the customers. The proposed language would allow the Commission the flexibility to base the hydropower administrative charge on hydropower contract allocations and allocation of other electric resources.

With the variability of hydrology and the variability of the nonhydroelectric purchases or market purchases made on behalf of the industrial customers, the Commission's administrative fee revenue has declined over time using the method required by the regulation. Although the Commission is not anticipating the need to increase the administrative rate at this time, the regulation change would provide a tool for the Commission to consider in the future if such a tool was necessary to stabilize the administrative revenue and cover the costs of the Commission.

2. A description of how public comment was solicited, a summary of public response, and an explanation how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Copies of the proposed regulations, notices of workshop and notices of intent to act upon the regulation were sent by U.S. mail and email to persons who were

known to have an interest in the subject of the regulation and administrative charges as well as any persons who had specifically requested such notice. These documents were also made available and posted at the following locations:

Staff brought the proposed changes to the Commission on March 8, 2022 and requested to start the process of a regulation change during the Commission's open public meeting. The Commission approved proceeding forward so the proposed regulation change could be considered. Staff issued a Notice of Workshop on March 28, 2022, and for a Workshop on April 19, 2022.

Staff received an initial comment from a customer following the issuance of the Notice of Workshop. Staff held an informal meeting with the customer and based on the customer's comments received, Staff issued a revised draft of the proposed regulation change on April 5, 2022.

At the Workshop on April 19, 2022, the Commission held a workshop that could be attended in person or remotely. Staff answered several questions during the Workshop and, following the close of the Workshop, the Executive Director offered the customers the opportunity to comment further by contacting the office or sending an email. Staff answered some follow up questions regarding the proposed change.

The regulation was noticed for Public Hearing on July 7, 2022, and requested written comments be filed with the Commission's office by August 2, 2022. The notice indicated that comments could be made in person at the hearing on the regulation at the Commission's meeting on August 9, 2022.

On July 22, 2022, Staff met with NV Energy management to give an update on an assortment of Commission matters and gave a summary of the proposed regulation change. Staff answered a few questions during the meeting in regard to the regulation and provided a copy of the PowerPoint to NV Energy. Further,

Staff provided a copy of the PowerPoint to the person assigned to follow Commission proceedings and ask to let Staff know if he had any further questions.

Staff did not receive any further written comments on the proposed regulation change by August 2, 2022.

Staff did receive a call from a customer on the morning of the Adoption Hearing on August 9, 2022. The Executive Director and the Chief Financial Officer discussed and explained the two changes to the regulation with the customer. The customer was satisfied with the explanation.

Before conducting workshops in this matter, the Commission made a concerted effort to determine whether the proposed regulations are likely to impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a small business or directly restrict the formation, operation, or expansion of a small business. The methods used by the Authority in this effort included taking and analyzing written and verbal comments from the public and from businesses to be affected by the proposed regulations in public Workshop on April 19, 2022. Despite repeated invitations for comment (either written or oral) identifying small business impacts of the proposed regulations, no such impacts attributable to the regulations has been identified

The Commission determined pursuant to NRS 233B.0608(1) that the proposed regulations are not likely to impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a small business or directly restrict the formation, operation, or expansion of a small business. Further, the proposed regulations will not have a significant adverse or beneficial economic impact upon the regulated industry, either immediately or long-term, and the proposed regulations will have not a significant adverse or beneficial economic impact upon the public, either immediately or long-term. Accordingly, the agency has not prepared the statement referenced in NRS 233B.0608(2)(b).

The permanent regulation was adopted on August 9, 2022 and included all of the changes suggested.

7. The estimated economic effect of the adopted regulation on the businesses which it is to regulate and on the public. These must be stated separately, and each case must include:

The estimated economic effect on business pursuant to NRS 233B.066(1)(g):

(a) Both adverse and beneficial effects on business; and

The Commission does not regulate businesses but delivers power to its hydropower customers and charges an administrative fee to cover the costs of administering the hydropower contracts. The Commission does not expect an adverse effect from the regulation change on business.

Currently, the charge is made solely on a kilowatt basis. The change in regulation gives the Commission at tool, if needed, to charge its costs based on an allocation method in full or in part. This change would give the Commission the benefit of being able to stabilize its administrative revenue and rely less on a reserve account to cover the variability of revenue. This change would benefit the Commission's customers to allow for a more stable and known administrative charge and allow the Commission to hold less reserves to cover the variability in revenue.

(b) Both immediate and long-term effects on business.

No immediate effect is expected since the Commission does not plan to change its method of collection of its administrative charges in the immediate future. In the long term, the change in regulation does give the Commission the option to charge its administrative fee on a more level basis that would be more predictable and reduce the need for a large reserve balance.

The estimated economic effect on the public pursuant to NRS 233B.066(1)(g):

(a) Both adverse and beneficial effects on public; and

The proposed amendment to the regulation is not anticipated to have an adverse or beneficial effect on the general public.

(b) Both immediate and long-term effects on public.

The proposed amendment to the regulation is not anticipated to have immediate and long-term effects on the general public.
