The following statement is submitted for adopted amendments to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) Chapters 278.

1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation:

This regulation is necessary for the advancing of technology and allows the Department to offer game tags in an electronic format for utilization in the field on an electronic device. This regulation creates opportunities to offer additional conveniences to the public by accessing required documents more efficiently for game tag holders.

How comments were solicited:

Public comment was solicited during three regulation workshops with the Nevada Board of Wildlife Commissioners (NBWC) on May 3, 2024, August 17, 2024, and September 28, 2024. There were three public comments made by the Clark, Elko, and Washoe County Advisory Boards at the September 28, 2024, meeting.

Public comment was solicited during a regulation adoption hearing with the Nevada Board of Wildlife Commissioners (NBWC) on November 16, 2024.

There was no public comment.

Summary:

Public comments surrounded clarifications on initial regulation language regarding validation codes and fixing those codes to the animal portions through durable material and how the process would be manageable for processors, taxidermists, and hunters. Concerns arose regarding tracking location data and how that would be managed within the roll out of the application. The Department worked to answer their questions through multiple public workshops at Nevada Board of Wildlife Commissioners Meetings.
