

**LEGISLATIVE REVIEW OF ADOPTED REGULATIONS AS REQUIRED BY
NRS 233B.066
LCB FILE R041-25**

The following statement is submitted for adopted amendments to Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) Chapter 641.

1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation.

This regulation was prepared in response to and to align the Board's regulations with 2025 SB251, which provides for the issuance of a provisional license, instead of a registration, to psychological assistants and psychological interns.

2. A description of how public comment was solicited, a summary of public response, and an explanation of how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

A notice of a public workshop and a notice of the Board's intent to act upon the regulation were sent to persons who were known to have interest in the provisional licensure, in place of registration, of psychological assistants and psychological interns; to the Board's licensees; and to any specific person who requested notification regarding regulation changes. That distribution included further information on how to receive a free copy of the proposed regulation. These documents were also made available through the website of the Board of Psychological Examiners (psyexam.nv.gov) or by directly emailing the Board office (NBOP@govmail.state.nv.us), and were posted at the following location:

The Board held a public workshop on August 22, 2025, to discuss the proposed change to the current NAC Chapter 641. There was no public comment on R041-25 during that regulation workshop.

The minutes of the August 22, 2025, meeting during which the Board conducted its regulation workshop, which can be obtained by contacting the Board office or locating them on the Board's website (psyexam.nv.gov), contain a summary of any discussion regarding the proposed changes.

On November 10, 2025, the Board issued and posted a Notice of Intent to Act Upon a Regulation, which incorporated the proposed regulation change that the Board addressed at its August 22, 2025, regulation workshop. That notice included a request for submission of public comment regarding adoption of the regulation.

On December 12, 2025, after the Board received an approved R041-25 draft from the Legislative Counsel Bureau, the Board conducted a public hearing on R041-25 during its regular Board meeting. The Board did not receive any public comment on the proposed regulation, and there was no opposition to the adoption of the regulation. The Board approved the adoption of proposed regulation R041-25 at the conclusion of the December 12, 2025, hearing on that regulation.

5. A description of how comment was solicited from affected business, a summary of their response, and an explanation of how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

The Board solicited comments from affected businesses in the same manner as they were solicited from the public. Notice of the public workshop and notice of the Board's intent to act upon the regulation were sent to persons who were known to have interest in the provisional licensure, in place of registration, of psychological assistants and psychological interns; to the Board's licensees; and to any specific person who requested notification regarding regulation changes. The summary of the Board's discussion may be obtained from the meeting minutes, which will be provided and/or made available by contacting the Board office or locating them on the Board's website (psyexam.nv.gov). The Board did not receive any public comment on the proposed regulation.

6. If the regulation was adopted without changing any part of the proposed regulation, a summary of the reasons for adopting the regulation without change.

As drafted, R041-25 did not reflect any changes from the initial proposed language that had been drafted for and considered during the public workshop based upon and to align with 2025 SB251. For that reason, there were no changes proposed for R041-25, and the Board approved its adoption as provided in the LCB R041-25 draft.

Be that as it may, because the regulation revisions in R041-25 were prepared in response to and to align with the new provisional licensure designation provisions of 2025 SB251, which provides for the provisional licensure (instead of registration) of psychological assistants and psychological interns, there are no known or estimated immediate beneficial effects from this regulation, except to the extent that the new provisional licensure designation for psychological assistants and psychological interns provided in 2025 SB251 has an effect on health care reimbursement.

Beneficial, long-term: The Board does not regulate businesses. Be that as it may, because the regulation revisions in R041-25 were prepared in response to and to align with the new provisional licensure designation provisions of 2025 SB251, which provides for the provisional licensure (instead of registration) of psychological assistants and psychological interns, there are no known or estimated long-term beneficial effects from this regulation, except to the extent that the new provisional licensure designation for psychological assistants and psychological interns provided in 2025 SB251 has an effect on health care reimbursement.

- c) Direct, immediate: The Board does not regulate businesses. Be that as it may, because the regulation revisions in R041-25 were prepared in response to and to align with the new provisional licensure designation provisions of 2025 SB251, which provides for the provisional licensure (instead of registration) of psychological assistants and psychological interns, there are no known or estimated immediate direct effects from this regulation, except to the extent that the new provisional licensure designation for psychological assistants and psychological interns provided in 2025 SB251 has an effect on health care reimbursement.

Direct, long-term: The Board does not regulate businesses. Be that as it may, because the regulation revisions in R041-25 were prepared in response to and to align with the new provisional licensure designation provisions of 2025 SB251, which provides for the provisional licensure (instead of registration) of psychological assistants and psychological interns, there are no known or estimated long-term direct effects from this regulation, except to the extent that the new provisional licensure designation for psychological assistants and psychological interns provided in 2025 SB251 has an effect on health care reimbursement.

- d) Indirect, immediate: The Board does not regulate businesses. Be that as it may, because the regulation revisions in R041-25 were prepared in response to and to align with the new provisional licensure designation provisions of 2025 SB251, which provides for the provisional licensure (instead of registration) of psychological assistants and psychological interns, there are no known or estimated immediate indirect effects from this regulation, except to the extent that the new provisional licensure designation for psychological assistants and psychological interns provided in 2025 SB251 has an effect on health care reimbursement.

Indirect, long-term: The Board does not regulate businesses. Be that as it may, because the regulation revisions in R041-25 were prepared in response to and to align with the new provisional licensure designation provisions of 2025 SB251, which provides for the provisional licensure (instead of registration) of psychological assistants and psychological interns, there are no known or estimated long-term indirect effects from this regulation, except to the extent that the new provisional licensure designation for psychological assistants and psychological interns in 2025 SB251 has an effect on health care reimbursement.

8. The estimated cost to the agency for enforcement of the adopted regulation.

To the extent that the revised regulation would require enforcement, there will be no increased cost for enforcement of the changes.

9. A description of any regulations of other state or government agencies which the proposed regulation overlaps or duplicates and a statement explain why the duplication or overlapping is necessary. The Board is not aware of any overlapping or duplicating of federal or state regulations.

The Board is not aware of any federal regulations that apply.
