#### 1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation.

The need for the adopted foster home regulations are a result of several factors, to include: reduction in use of licensing waivers, which will increase federal Title IV-E funding reimbursement to Nevada; legislative changes over the years to the Nevada Revised Statutes, Chapter 424 – Foster Homes for Children; changes in child welfare practice; improvements in overall standards for regulating foster care; and ensuring appropriate clarification of NRS 424 statutes within regulation. All these factors led to making necessary amendments and new requirements within the Nevada Administrative Code, Chapter 424. The changes made to the adopted regulations better ensure the overall safety and wellbeing of children in the custody of Nevada's child welfare agencies and within their actual placement into safe and caring foster homes.

# 2. A description of how public comment was solicited, a summary of public response, and an explanation how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Copies of the proposed regulations, notices of workshop and notices of intent to act upon the regulation and agendas were sent by U.S. mail, fax and/or email to persons known to have an interest in the subject of foster care licensing as well as any persons who specifically requested such notice. These documents were also made available on the website of the Division of Child and Family Services and the Nevada Legislature. Notices were posted at DCFS offices in every county that DCFS has an office, Clark County Department of Social Services, Washoe County Department of Social Services and in each county library in Nevada where there is not a DCFS or foster care licensing authority location. #### **Public Workshop – Summary of responses**

There were six attendees that testified at the public workshop, five in Las Vegas and one in Carson City. All five testified to the same section, NAC 424.600. This section identifies the requirements for foster caregivers that own and use guns.

All six persons testified that persons, such as law enforcement officers and persons with a permit to carry concealed weapons (CCW) should be authorized to carry a loaded firearm as a foster parent and also to maintain a loaded firearm within the home for purposes of self-defense. One of the persons testifying was a police officer and a licensed foster parent. She made public comment regarding the increased risk of accidental shootings, by law enforcement -foster parents, due to the increased need to unload and load the firearm due to the existing requirements in NAC 424.600.

DCFS also received a written comment regarding the current NAC 424 restrictions regarding persons with communicable disease. It was recommended that language should be used that protects children, but does not prohibit and/or discriminate against a person from becoming a foster caregiver if they have a communicable disease that does not put children in foster care at risk of contracting the disease from the caregiver.

Minor revisions were made in several sections of the NAC 424 to broaden the language around restrictions regarding disease that would not jeopardize the health, safety or wellbeing of children in foster care.

#### **Public Hearing – Summary of responses**

At the public hearing, the predominant public comments were in regards to NAC 424.600. These comments supported foster parents ability to carry a concealed weapon (CCW) if they are certified in Nevada for that capacity and to maintain a loaded weapon in a locked manner within their house. The Nevada Youth Care Providers (NYCP) requested clarification regarding the regulations in several areas.

#### **Public Meeting – Summary of responses**

Upon the recommendation of the DCFS Deputy Attorney General, an additional public meeting was held on April 30, 2014 to formally adopt the regulations for the record. Only one person made comment at the public meeting. This person commented that a foster child will not be able to be placed in her loving home due to the "flawed" NAC 424.600. She further stated that she wondered who would have to inform a child that due to this the child would have to remain at Child Haven.

# 5. A description of how comment was solicited from affected businesses, a summary of their response, and an explanation how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

On November 8, 2013, the NAC 424-Proposed Regulations of the Division of Child and Family Services and a Small Business Impact Questionnaire NAC 424 were posted on the DCFS website; additionally, both a mailed letter and an email were sent out on November 9, 2013 to all 37 Nevada Foster Care Agencies and stand-alone Specialized Foster Home businesses. These communications provided small businesses with all necessary information for reviewing the proposed regulations. A Small Business Impact Survey was also included, whereby small businesses could provide information back to DCFS regarding any known positive or negative impact to their businesses. To ensure participation, two separate emails were sent out to all 37 small businesses to remind them of the deadline to submit back their completed surveys and ensure that any concerns were identified. The Small Business Impact Statement was posted on 11/27/2013 and made publically available on the DCFS website at <a href="www.dcfs.nv.us">www.dcfs.nv.us</a> under the "What's New" section on the right-hand side of the webpage. The document was updated and reposted on March 24, 2014, on the DFCS website and the Nevada Legislature website, with a new section referencing revisions made based upon the public workshop. This new section identified that there was minimal, if any, impact to small businesses from the minor revisions.

## 6. If the regulation was adopted without changing any part of the proposed regulation, a summary of the reasons for adopting the regulation without change.

Based upon earlier workgroup discussion and the public comment by the police officer-foster parent, who identified the increased risk of accidental shooting due to unloading/loading the firearm, the decision was made to amend NAC 424.600 to reduce this vulnerability pointed out during the public workshop.

#### **Existing**

#### NAC 424.600:

Weapons and ammunition. (NRS 424.020) Any weapons, such as firearms, air rifles, bows, hunting knives or hunting sling shots, shall be unstrung and unloaded at all times when children are in the home. They shall be stored in locked containers or rooms out of the reach of children or made inoperable. Ammunition and arrows shall be stored in separate locked containers. Weapons shall not be transported in any vehicle in which children are riding unless the weapons are made inoperable and inaccessible."

#### **Prior to Public Workshop**

#### 424.600 initial revision:

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, any weapons, such as firearms, air rifles, bows, hunting knives or hunting sling shots, [shall] must be unstrung and unloaded at all times when children are in the home. They [shall] must be stored in locked containers or rooms out of the reach of children or made inoperable.

  Ammunition and arrows [shall] must be stored in separate locked containers. Weapons [shall] must not be transported in any vehicle in which children are riding unless the weapons are made inoperable and inaccessible.
- 2. The provisions of this section do not apply to a law enforcement officer who is required to keep a weapon on his or her person if the weapon is maintained as required by subsection 1 whenever the person is not required to carry the weapon.

#### **Post Public Workshop**

#### **424.600** as adopted:

- 1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 2, any weapons, such as firearms, air rifles, bows, hunting knives or hunting sling shots, [shall] must be unstrung and unloaded at all times when children are in the home. They [shall] must be stored in locked containers or rooms out of the reach of children or made inoperable.

  Ammunition and arrows [shall] must be stored in separate locked containers. Weapons [shall] must not be transported in any vehicle in which children are riding unless the weapons are made inoperable and inaccessible.
- 2. The provisions of this section do not apply to a law enforcement officer who maintains a holstered weapon on his or her person if the weapon is maintained as required by subsection 1 whenever the person is not carrying the weapon holstered on his or her person.
- 3. Firearms which are wholly inoperable and solely ornamental are exempt from the requirements of this section relating to the storage of the weapon.

After consideration of all other public comments regarding firearm storage during the public hearing, the Division adopted the regulation without any additional revision to NAC 424.600. This decision was made since accidental shootings and gun related injuries/deaths continue to be one of the leading causes of unnatural child fatality or injury in the United States.

The Division is legally responsible to make every effort to ensure the safety of children in foster care, who have entered child welfare custody due to significant abuse and/or neglect. Children that do not have access to loaded firearms are at much less risk of an accidental shooting or other gun related injuries or death. NAC 424.600 is no different from other NAC 424 regulations, such as regulations that regulate access to pools or other water hazards; regulate access to medications or potential poisons that could harm a child; or regulate the use of portable heaters or use of electrical extension cords. These regulations are intended to reduce the risk of harm to a child from drowning, poisoning and fire. NAC 424.600 does not attempt to regulate the transfer, sale,

purchase, possession, ownership, transportation, registration and licensing of firearms and ammunition in Nevada. Similar to the other regulations in NAC 424, NAC 424.600 only provides the necessary requirement for proper storage of weapons and ammunition for foster parents/caregivers in Nevada.

- 7. The estimated economic effect of the adopted regulation on the businesses which it is to regulate and on the public. These must be stated separately, and each case must include:
  - (a) Both adverse and beneficial effects; and
  - (b) Both immediate and long-term effects.

#### **ADVERSE EFFECTS: Comments from Small Business Impact Survey:**

- As a COA accredited agency we operate utilizing most, if not all, of the best business practices covered in the proposed regulations. We may have to modify some operational policies and procedures but those should not have any sort of adverse economic impact on our business, other than the staff time required to review the regulations and makes changes.
- More staff hours needed to update policy.
- The new regulations will require us to revise current policies and procedures which will take staff time.
- Given the increased requirements for licensing agencies it is possible that some of the smaller, less experienced agencies will be unable to meet the new requirements, thereby being forced to leave the industry. This would be beneficial to the established, high-quality providers as it would consolidate the market.
- Not exactly from NAC 424, however if you combine AB 348 and the removal of the Medicaid BST Notification Process prior to finding alternate ways to fund Child Welfare, all foster agencies will likely be impacted in an adverse manner.

#### **BENEFICIAL EFFECTS: Comments from Small Business Impact Survey:**

- The changes to the regulations, as proposed, will be beneficial, both economically and programmatically.
- More families will be approved, which will allow for more program growth.
- We are supportive of the revisions to NAC 424. We are also supportive of the increased requirements brought forth via AB 348. Our main concern is with the removal of the Medicaid Notification Process for 2 hours, daily of services providers will experience a significant reduction in daily rate to support Nevada's most troubled youth. Funding for foster care needs to be discussed ASAP to ensure appropriate resources.
- Will minimize problems, more clarity will be helpful. May spill over into economic effect on business.
- More specifics will help regulate how things are done; lead to better practice.

#### **IMMEDIATE EFFECTS: Comments from Small Business Impact Survey:**

• As a small non-profit foster care agency in California, we are required already to implement the proposed changes. We already have policies & procedures in place to accommodate these regulations.

- Not recruiting foster homes currently due to several circumstances. Not willing to invest financially in something which may not be sustainable.
- Once the Medicaid Notification Process is removed foster care agencies will
  experience significant rate cuts, yet be asked to do more for less. Our concern is that
  the state and counties need open and proactive discussion on how to appropriately
  fund the Child Welfare System before Medicaid implements cuts January 10th,
  2014.
- Some of the AB 348 changes will impact the organization's method of oversight.
- Workload for record manager in the Reno office will increase some but not substantially.
- No apparent effect.

#### **LONG TERM EFFECTS:**

- May improve staff caliber, and
- Same as Immediate effects noted above.

#### **PUBLIC:**

**ADVERSE:** None anticipated.

**BENEFICIAL:** The benefit to the public is the increased safety and well-being of children in the foster care system. Foster parent/caregiver compliance with the regulation will create better consistency of care and practice within the foster care system statewide.

**IMMEDIATE:** Same as Public Beneficial effects noted above. **LONG TERM:** Same as Public Beneficial effects noted above.

There is no additional cost to the agency for enforcement of this regulation.
