





## 79<sup>th</sup> Legislative Session Recap Children's Safety

- AB 99 Provided additional Protections for LGBTQ Youth in Out of Home Care
- AB 176 Revised Safety Provisions for Seasonal/Temporary Recreation Programs
- AB 180 Established the Juvenile Justice Bill of Rights
- AB 305 Required All Schools to Hang Posters with the Child Abuse Hotline information
- AB 346 Revised Provisions Related to Unlicensed Child Care Providers

## 79<sup>th</sup> Legislative Session Recap Children's Safety

- SB 2 Revisions to Nevada's Safe Haven Law
- SB 46 Updated Provisions Regarding Background Checks for Child Care Providers
- SB 257 Established Prudent Parenting Liability Protections for Foster Parents.
   Created the Normalcy for Foster Youth Account to help pay for foster youth to participate in extracurricular activities

# 8oth Nevada Legislative Session Priorities Children's Safety

### **Child Care Subsidies & Business Tax Credit**

- The average annual cost of care in licensed centers in Nevada ranges from \$10,324 for an infant to \$8,702 for preschoolers (age 3-5).
- A single parent making minimum wage (\$8.25 an hour) would have to spend 60% of their total pre-tax annual income on infant child care.
- Nevada's child care subsidy program currently serves 3.21% of its eligible population.

## **Child Welfare Funding**

- In 2011, Nevada revised the child welfare funding structure for the two urban county child welfare agencies, Clark County Department of Family Services (CCDFS) and Washoe County Department of Social Services (WCDSS)
- To ensure that Nevada is funding CCDFS and WCDSS at appropriate levels to provide effective and efficient child welfare services, a study should be conducted to provide analysis of:
  - The current block grant structure
  - Potential funding sources to support child welfare
  - All funding sources that support the broad child welfare system

# Replace Nevada's Data System UNITY with an Integrated Data System

- Nevada's Current UNITY Data System, currently:
  - Lacks features of modern web applications
  - Functionality lags behind business processes
  - Foundational technology is antiquated
  - System performance in some areas is poor
  - Difficult to implement some new features
  - Steep learning curve for users
- Blue Ribbon Commission Report

## **Expand Access to Resources for Fictive Kin Providers**

- Fictive Kin caregivers are individuals who care for a child with whom they have a family-like tie, although not a direct familial blood relative.
- Kinship caregivers differ from foster parents because they are "unlicensed" when they are first accepted into their home, which means they are not entitled to the financial support that non-kin foster parents receive.
- Review inclusion of Fictive Kin in NRS/State Policies to ensure access to necessary resources, including TANF, KinGap & other related assistance programs.



# Review Policies Related to Licensure of Mental Health Professionals

- Nevada's child welfare & juvenile justice systems are reliant upon access to licensed mental health professionals to support prevention, treatment, rehabilitation and reunification.
- Mental health providers include: Alcohol, Drug & Gambling Counselors; Clinical Professional Counselors; Licensed Clinical Social Workers; Marriage & Family Therapists; Psychiatrists; and Psychologists.
- "Currently, the entire population in 16 of the 17 counties in Nevada resides in a mental [health professional shortage area] HPSA, including all rural and frontier regions of the state and both urban counties of northern Nevada."

## **Juvenile Justice Repayment Costs**

- Nevada's Juvenile Justice System currently imposes three mandatory fees. These include the following:
  - Cost of Care, which is defined as "costs to cover the care, treatment, supervision, or placement of the child."
  - Fines, which can be "monetary sanctions, which may include those established as an alternative to incarceration, imposed for specified offenses such as truancy, or available as a dispositional option for all offenses."
  - Restitution, which is "payment to reimburse the victim, or the victim's insurance company, for damages or to compensate for any loss, damage, or injury."
- The inability to pay these fees can have serious consequences for the juvenile offenders and disproportionately affect minority and low-income youth.

### **Preschool Expulsion Policies**

- Pre-kindergartners are three times more likely to be expelled from school than children in K-12 schools.
- Young children who are identified as "hard to manage" are more likely to:
  - experience discipline at school,
  - have negative interactions with family and peers,
  - have lower academic achievement or drop-out of school,
  - experiment earlier with drug and alcohol, and
  - engage in delinquency
- Caregivers who are nurturing and responsive stimulate children's healthy brain development reducing the likelihood of long-term behavior concerns
