



Percent of Income from the Lowest Quintile Needed to Pay for College*







A State-Supported, Merit-Based Scholarship Program




How it all started

The 1999 Session of the Nevada State Legislature, through its enactment of Senate Bill 496 (Chapter 536, Statutes of Nevada 1999), established the Millennium Scholarship. Then Governor Kenny Guinn and the Legislature declared their priorities in expending funds from the tobacco master settlement to include increasing the number of Nevada students who attend and graduate from Nevada institutions of higher education.

Tobacco Settlement and State Fund Infusions

- 1999: Tobacco settlement funds diminishing over time
- 2005: \$7.6 million annual infusion from the Unclaimed Property Fund plus \$35 million infusion from State General Fund
- 2008: Suspended regular transfer from Unclaimed Property Fund
- 2010: \$4.2 million infusion from College Savings Endowment Account
- 2011: Restored transfer of \$7.6 million each fiscal year from the Unclaimed Property Fund plus one-time infusion of \$10 million from State General Fund
- 2013: \$7.0 million infusion from State General Fund (\$5 million in Regular Session + \$2 million in Special Session)
- 2017: \$20 million infusion from State General Fund

Eligible Institutions

NRS 396.916 "Eligible institution" defined. "Eligible institution" means:

- 1. A university, state college or community college within the System; or
- 2. Any other nonsectarian college or university that:
 - (a) Was originally established in, and is organized under the laws of, this state;
 - (b) Is exempt from taxation pursuant to 26 U.S.C. § 501(c)(3); and
 - (c) Is accredited by a regional accrediting agency recognized by the United States Department of Education.
 - NSHE Institutions
 - Roseman University
 - Sierra Nevada College

Requirements for Initial Eligibility

- ✓ Graduate with a diploma from a Nevada high school;
- ✓ Be a resident of Nevada for at least two high school years;
- ✓ Affirm affidavit regarding legal residency in the United States;
- ✓ Complete the defined **core courses** in high school (4 units of English, 4 units of math, 3 units of Natural Science, 3 units of Social Science and History); and
- ✓ Achieve 3.25 overall high school grade point average or qualifying ACT or SAT score.

Target Population: Traditional Students (age 18-24)

The Affidavit Affirming Legal Residency

| All students need to acknowledge that they: |
|--|
| ☐ Are a citizen of the United States; or |
| Have a lawful immigration status; or |
| ☐ Have filed an application to legalize their immigration status; or |
| ☐ Will file an application to legalize their immigration status as soon as they are eligible to do so. |

The Process

- ➤ There is no application process students are contacted by the Nevada Treasurer's Office if eligible
- June School districts and private/charter high schools submit list of students identified as eligible to the Treasurer's Office
- End of July Eligible students are sent an award packet from the Treasurer's Office with instructions on how to activate and utilize the Scholarship
- August After certification of eligibility by NSHE, institutions begin disbursing fall funds to eligible students who have activated their scholarship

Over time it became more and more difficult for students and parents to keep track of changes in eligibility requirements

Requirements for Continuing Eligibility

- ✓ Satisfactory progress toward a recognized degree or certificate; and
- ✓ Completion of either 9 credits at a community college or 12 credits at a university or state college with a 2.6 grade point average per term on the first 29 credits, and a 2.75 per term thereafter.

"Two strike" rule - a student may only regain eligibility once

Exceptions Established by the Legislature

- ✓ Students with a documented physical or mental disability are excluded from the credit requirements and time limitations, but not from the GPA requirements.
- ✓ Students who have been discharged from active duty military or who have participated in a charitable, religious or public service assignment may request an extension to the 6-year time limitation.
- ✓ Students who have a parent or legal guardian on active duty in the Armed Forces and are residents of or stationed in Nevada are exempt from the 2-year residency requirement and the requirement to graduate from a Nevada high school.

How much is the Scholarship?

^{*}Senate Bill 128 (2015) increased minimum enrollment at community colleges from 6 to 9 credits, and increased the maximum funding across all institutions from 12 to 15 to align with 15 to Finish initiatives

Students may receive the award for the fall, spring and summer terms


Maximum Annual Award: \$1,200 at community colleges \$1,800 at state college \$2,400 at universities

Summer

Students may receive funding for summer school as long as all eligibility requirements are met.

There is no minimum credit load requirement for summer eligibility.

The Millennium Scholarship Portion of the Base Registration Fee at 30 Credits



This analysis assumes full-time enrollment (fall and spring only) at 30 credits per year, excluding other mandatory fees, compared to the scholarship award amount.

A State-Supported, Need-Based Program

Why was the Program Created?

Nevada's Challenges

- Aggressive degree productivity and college attainment goals under Complete College America (CCA)
- Affordability too many students from low income families in Nevada do not pursue a college degree or credential


The Solution

- A need-based, state-supported financial aid program the SSOG
- Aimed at making college more affordable to low income students
- Graduating more students to achieve CCA goals


SSOG and return on investment – go hand-in-hand!

% Graduated



Opportunity Grant The Silver State

Shared Responsibility Model (SRM) for State-Supported Financial Aid

The SRM is a philosophy for awarding grant aid that is based on the **total cost of attendance** (tuition and fees and living expenses) being shared by **partners** (the state, feds, family, and the student).

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Eligibility Criteria Established by State Legislature (SB 227,2015)

- Enrolled full-time 15 credits
- Enrolled in a program of study leading to a degree or certificate
- College Ready placement or completion of entry-level, college-level mathematics and English
- Nevada resident
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)

Target Population:
Traditional (age 18-24) and Non-Traditional (age 24+),
Low-Income Students

Award Calculation and Funding

SSOG Calculation

Average Annual Cost of Attendance

- Student Contribution (\$5,500)
- Expected Family Contribution (EFC)
- Federal Contribution (Pell, SEOG, TEACH)
- = SSOG Award (\$200 minimum; \$5,500 maximum)
- **Distributing Funds** grants are awarded in ascending EFC order to the financially neediest students first up to 8500 **EFC**

State Support

- \$2.5 million for 2015-16
- \$2.5 million for 2016-17
- \$5.0 million for 2017-18
- \$5.0 million for 2018-19

² As the principal beneficiary, the student is expected to contribute toward his/her own education costs. Sources may include earnings, savings, borrowing, scholarships or non-federal grants. The dollar amount of the student share is determined by the Board of Regents based on the expectation of a reasonable work commitment throughout the year.

³ Expected Family Contribution (EFC) is determined under federal methodology and based on data provided in completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

⁴ In practice, the federal contribution will include the Pell Grant, the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), and the federal TEACH Grant. Example is based on 2017-18 Pell Grant eligibility (full-time attendance assumed).


