Definition

Geriatric social workers, also known as gerontological social workers, help elderly people meet their daily needs. Geriatric social workers work closely with a wide variety of medical and health professionals (i.e. psychiatrists, psychologists, therapists, physicians, and nurses). These social workers help elderly/older clients and patients improve their lives (i.e. manage mental health conditions, reduce stress, and resolve issues). More specifically, they provide services to adults, age 65 years old and older. Geriatric social workers also help elderly clients and patients manage behavioral problems, and cope with illnesses (www.psychologyschoolguide.net/social-work-career)

According to the Administration on Aging, the number of elderly Americans over the age of 60 jumped from <u>378 million in 1980 to 759 million</u> in 2010.

In Nevada, 13.1 % of population is currently elderly, in ten years it will be near 38%.
