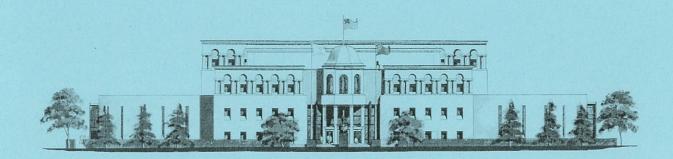

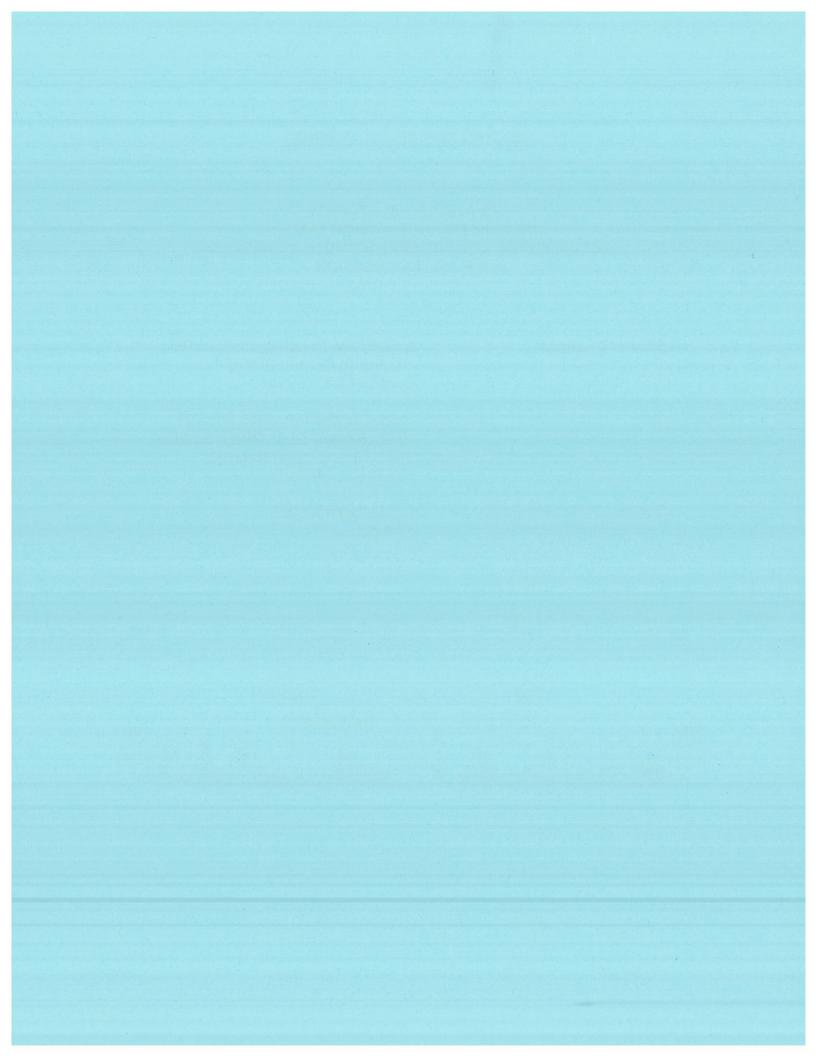

Overview

As part of the ARRA program, the State of Nevada will be responsible for spending and reporting on approximately 2 billion dollars. The reporting effort is substantial as it will need to satisfy internal controls, mandatory federal requirements, and public transparency expectations. The objective of this project will be to analyze requirements in all of those areas, with an emphasis on the public reporting aspect. Based on that analysis and working closely with the State team, we will document those requirements and propose an approach that will satisfy them. We anticipate that the solution will include both procedural and software components. Finally, we will produce estimates of the associated cost and time as well as a detailed project plan for the next phase.

Areas for Requirements Analysis

The high-level requirements that need to be reviewed and documented fall into two areas. On the frontend of the process, we need to satisfy the Governor's legal requirement to ensure complete and accurate reporting. The approach in this case may be procedural and will need to tie into agency or Controller reporting methods as well. In general the basic requirements here are to:

- Track all ARRA awards given to any recipients in the State of Nevada
- Track all the quarterly reporting required by Section 1512 of ARRA for all recipients within the State of Nevada

The larger scope objective of this project is to review requirements in the second area, public transparency. This will involve a software solution that must satisfy the following objectives:

- Create and maintain a mechanism for secure download of Nevada information from the Federal Recovery System
- Maintain a data warehouse of information that will serve the reporting requirements of all the Nevada recipients of ARRA awards, Elected Officials, other government stakeholders, nongovernmental organizations (NGO's) and the public
- Build and maintain a web site (Nevada.Recovery) that meets the requirements in the ARRA program in an accurate and transparent manner
- Provide mapping display reporting including drill down options to identify political jurisdictions (i.e. Congressional District, State Senatorial District, State Assembly District, City, County) and geographical location of dollars spent and jobs created

At a more basic level, the overall objective will be to ensure that the State of Nevada meets or exceeds all requirements and expectations, and will be considered a top tier State in this area.

Aeris Tasks

The specific tasks that this project will involve include:

- Determine system requirements to support the stated objectives
- Estimate associated design, development, testing, and implementation hours
- Provide recommendation and cost estimate of development tools required
- Provide recommendation and cost estimate of hardware and system software required, including ongoing associated costs, such as licenses. maintenance, and server hosting by DolT
- Identify contract team member skill set requirements and workload distribution
- Develop a detailed project plan
- Identify risks and constraints, and plans for mitigating those risks



Identify opportunities to position the State as a top tier provider of ARRA transparency

Note that a key objective will be to ensure that the requirements process and resulting document is directly helpful for the next step in the process – system design and development. The time spent here should make that effort much more efficient.

Resource and Cost Estimate

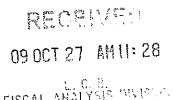
Based on the tasks described above, we are estimating 1.5 to 2 FTEs for approximately 3 weeks of effort. Given the nature of the work, the calendar time to complete the project will probably be much longer in order to allow time for meetings, review, and follow-up.

Based on the rough time commitment above and the assumption that we are doing this work as an extension to the existing T&M contract, we arrive at the cost estimate below:

Dear Assemblywoman Smith:

In accordance with Section 1512 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA), the State of Nevada has successfully met its first federal reporting requirement. Under federal guidelines, state agencies that received stimulus funding were required to submit a separate report for each federal funding award they received. During the period October 1 - October 10, Nevada State Agencies transmitted more than 100 combined project reports via the FederalReporting.gov website for the quarter ending September 30, 2009.

Preliminary data indicates that 4,875.06 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) positions were created or retained in Nevada. The most significant number of jobs created or saved is related to the State Fiscal Stabilization Fund - Education, which created or saved 4,158 jobs in school districts throughout Nevada.

While these figures are still preliminary, they serve to illustrate the positive impact of stimulus funds on the State of Nevada. State agencies are to be commended for their outstanding efforts in satisfying the first federal reporting benchmark.

The following chart provides a summary of 1st Quarter Job Reporting.

It is important to note that the data provided in Nevada's 1512 reports were for state expenditures only and did not include information on ARRA funds that may have gone directly to individuals, local governments, companies, or any other entities that are not part of state government. Additionally, not all programs receiving stimulus funding are required to submit Section 1512 reports. Entitlement programs including Medicaid, unemployment benefits and food assistance payments are not covered by Section 1512.

In the coming days, all data reported in Nevada's 1512 reports will be available on the NV.Gov/Recovery website. On October 30, 2009, all data reported by state and non-state agencies will be published on Recovery.gov.

I trust that the federal agencies are working together, learning from their first quarter experiences, and will be better prepared for a smooth and successful second quarter reporting period in January 2010. To help improve state and federal processes for the

January reporting period, I will be participating in a State ARRA Lead Meeting in Washington, D.C., on November 9-10, designed to bring together state and federal officials to discuss how to improve reporting and increase the consistency and integrity of recipient information.

Hello.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for having Mr. Brandmueller available for the presentation to the IFC Subcommittee for Federal Stimulus Oversight on the funding available to the Nevada State Office of Energy (NSOE) from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) at the September 24, 2009 meeting. The presentation provided by Mr. Brandmueller was very informative and provided a good insight as to the complexities the NSOE is facing in designing programs that will best utilize available ARRA funds at the same time attempting to distribute the available funding as quickly and judiciously as possible.

During the presentation several inquiries were made by Subcommittee members for additional information. I have

summarized these inquiries below, and would appreciate a response no later than October 30, 2009. The response will be shared with the members.

- 1. Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy for Schools program:
 - Please discuss the timeline the NSOE is working with to select and distribute funding to the school districts and for completing the projects selected.

The Office of Energy conducted workshops the week of September 28th in Elko, Reno and Las Vegas. It is our intent to send letters and e-mails to the school districts late in the week of October 19th to request that they submit projects to the Office which will be formatted and sent to the State Purchasing Division to complete.

• Is there a requirement by the federal government that there be an equal distribution of funding to each school as proposed by the NSOE?

No, the schools program was not a required funding activity from the ARRA funds. The Office of Energy made all decisions relative to including schools and school districts in the grant application. The Office also selected the amounts to award each District.

• It appears from the presentation at the September 24th meeting and the ensuing discussion, that the NSOE is considering alternatives to an equal distribution of funding to school districts. Please discuss the alternatives under consideration for distributing ARRA funds to the school districts and when a final decision will be made.

The NSOE has carefully considered the options available, with concern about maintaining the program continuity and has added funding for the Clark County School District and Washoe County School District. The amount adds \$500,000 to the Washoe Schools (to a new total of \$941,000) and \$1,000,000 to the Clark County Schools (to a new total of \$1,441,000). Although this does not completely address the problem, it more accurately reflects the larger Districts in relationship to the area population.

During the presentation information was provided which indicated the NSOE sent a formal letter to school
districts in early August regarding projects that could be funded with ARRA funds. Apparently the NSOE
received only one response identifying \$21 million in projects. Please identify which school district provided
this particular response. Also please identify any other school districts that have responded more recently
and the dollar value of projects they have identified for funding.

If I stated that the amount was \$21 million, I misspoke. The proposal was from the Douglas County School District and was for approximately \$14 million. Since the amounts available were fixed (pending the resolution of the issue outlined above), no other District submitted any proposals.

2. NRS 701.215 (section 12 of AB 3 of the 22nd Special Session) requires the Director, NSOE prepare a state energy reduction plan. The reduction plan requires state agencies in the Executive Branch to reduce grid-based energy purchases for state-owned building by 20 percent by 2015. Please discuss the status of developing the state energy reduction plan and implementing the plan to achieve the results as set forth in the referenced statute.

As I was not employed with NSOE at the time of the passage of this requirement, I was not aware of it. I immediately investigated the issue following the September meeting and found that nothing had been done on this requirement. I offer no excuses for this as I do not know why the matter was not undertaken immediately, as it should have been. Immediately upon assuming the position of Acting Director I directed staff to undertake this activity and would expect that we should have something available for workshops by early November. There is no excuse for the failure to comply with this matter. The objective of reducing energy consumption in State owned buildings was the centerpoint of the ARRA State Building activity in which we are currently implementing.

3. As you are aware, SB 152 approved by the 2009 Legislature has reporting requirements for the State Public Works Board, school districts, and the Nevada System for Higher Education (NSHE) to identify and prioritize buildings under the jurisdiction of each respective agency for energy/ efficiency/retrofit enhancements. Please discuss and identify the buildings that have been tentatively selected by the NSOE (based on the prioritization from each respective agency) to receive ARRA funding, and when the ARRA funding to actually commence the energy efficiency/retrofit enhancement will become available to each respective agency.

As the NSOE does not have a defined role in the SB 152 process, this is a difficult matter to address directly. Each agency was requested to nominate, presumably from the lists that they had prepared pursuant to SB 152, three projects in Northern, Southern and Rural Nevada. These nominations are currently under review by the NSOE and State Public Works Board to determine costs, project and building viability, and other related factors which will be used to determine which projects can be done with the limited funds available. We recognise the extreme needs which are being identified by the SB 152 requirements, but we also are very limited in funds available for this activity. Clearly, the NSOE could have expended the entire grant on State buildings and not made a significant dent in the identified needs. Projects will be funded and undertaken. Public buildings were an identified portion of the DOE opportunity. These projects will be funded through agreements with the State Public Works Board.

As a reminder, Assemblywoman Smith, the chair of the Subcommittee, has requested the agenda for the next meeting include an item to continue the Subcommittee's review of ARRA funding administered by the NSOE. The next Subcommittee meeting has been tentatively scheduled for November 10, 2009. I would like to thank you in advance for responding to this request and for your continued cooperation. As per your request, please see the Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation's (DETR) response to the outlined questions *in bold italic*. Also, please note that associated attachments are enclosed.

1. Please describe the Department of Employment Training and Rehabilitation's (DETR) efforts in compiling a team to pursue grants in renewable energy and offender reentry.

RESPONSE: The Department's recently established workforce solutions unit has the responsibilities of researching, seeking and preparing grant proposals that fit Nevada's Workforce Investment Act — Wagner-Peyser Act Workforce Development Plan. Led by one of DETR's deputy directors, the grant research and preparation team consists of subject matter experts in grant and project management, i.e., DETR's workforce development staff and any associated partner/agency with statewide interest. The grant initiatives team oversees the application of grant solicitations for green and renewable energy, as well as prison reentry. Daily searches for grant solicitations are conducted by the workforce solutions staff, using the Internet web browser as well as links to national trade organizations. Solicitations are reviewed and evaluated by DETR's grant initiatives team. Based on evaluation for an appropriate fit of Nevada's Workforce Development Plan, grants are pursued via preparation and submittal of proposals.

2. Please compare and contrast job search requirements for Unemployment Insurance claimants receiving regular benefits versus those receiving extended benefits.

RESPONSE: The State Extended Benefits Program requires claimants to provide proof of their work search each week prior to benefit payment; whereas work searches of regular and Emergency Unemployment Compensation benefit recipients are selected for validation based upon a variety of statistical models. State and federal laws and guidelines require that all Unemployment Insurance recipients actively engage in a systematic and sustained effort to obtain work. As communicated through a variety of methods, benefit recipients are instructed to keep a record of their work search, which is subject to verification, in order to retain benefit eligibility. Under the regular Unemployment Insurance Benefit program and federal Emergency Unemployment Compensation programs, work search records are validated through a variety of programs where the recipient is directed to appear for an in-person review. At the review, continued benefit eligibility and work search records are examined and verified. The in-person review also serves to connect workers to available training and employment assistance programs.

Benefit claimants are required to furnish "tangible evidence" that work search efforts have been made each week in order to receive benefits. As a result, benefit claimants are required to submit paper documents supporting their work search efforts each week State Extended Benefits (SEB) are claimed. The type of work SEB claimants are seeking must include work that the individual is mentally and physically capable of performing and that pays more than his weekly unemployment benefit amount. Requiring proof of a weekly work search is a federal requirement that indeed does place additional administrative burdens on states paying SEB and recipients of those benefits. However, the state does not have the authority to change those requirements and must comply with federal rules. Through the National Association of Workforce Agencies, the Department has joined the other states in advocating for a change to this rule. In the meantime, the process of requiring submission of paper work search documents for SEB benefits must continue to avoid federal sanctions.

3. There was considerable discussion regarding federal competitive work force investment grants that do not flow through DETR, but rather are issued directly to community based organizations. A September 20, 2009, news article in the Reno Gazette Journal indicated the Community Services Agency (CSA) Executive Director declined to say how much his agency is receiving in stimulus money because of the competitive nature of the grant application process. The Subcommittee commented on the need for transparency and accountability relative to federal grants.

RESPONSE: As the state's workforce development agency, DETR will make every effort to ensure that other U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) direct grant recipients (community based organizations) reveal funding expenditures and program activities associated with their awarded grants to the general public. DETR will also notify DOL that technical assistance is offered to any of their workforce development direct grant recipients. Such technical assistance will include on-site training with focus on how to

ensure transparency to complement openness to the public, with full accountability of programs and service delivery.

Subsequent to the September 24, 2009, Subcommittee meeting, DETR forwarded a message from the CSA indicating the comment in the newspaper referred only to CSA's plans to apply for additional funding which the CSA director indicated was confidential as the agency was in competition with other entities.

As requested by the Subcommittee, please provide assurances that agencies receiving federal funding are producing reports that are available to the public to ensure transparency and accountability. Does DETR track the amount of ARRA funding provided directly to community based organizations? If so, please report the amounts provided to each agency and the performance indicators associated with each grant.

RESPONSE: Since DETR is not a direct recipient of federal competitive grants, reporting of grant recipients' expenditures and activities lie with the federal grantor, and such reports and activities are not made available to DETR. However, any and all grants and federal funding that flow through DETR shall be tracked and reported at all levels with transparency and accountability.

4. On behalf of the Subcommittee, please invite each of the local workforce investment boards to attend the next Subcommittee meeting to discuss ARRA funded programs. Additionally, please ask each board to report the following:

RESPONSE: The Chief Executive Officer and Executive Director of both the northern and southern Nevada Workforce Investment Areas have been contacted and are prepared to present their ARRA workforce development activities before the IFC Subcommittee.

a. Funding amounts allocated and actual anticipated ARRA expenditures:

RESPONSE: Please see the fiscal allocation/expenditure chart below:

b. Types of programs funded and program goals;

RESPONSE: Workforce Investment Act (WIA)—America Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) Performance Indicators/Measures: WIA performance measures are negotiated with the U.S. Department of Labor (DOL) each year. For this Program Year (PY) 2009, beginning July 1, 2009, the following performance measures apply:

Youth Employment and Training Programs and Goals

Place in Employment/Education Rate: 40% of all youth enrolled in the program must be placed in employment, military, post-secondary education, or advanced/occupational skills training prior to exiting the program.

Attainment of Degree/Certificate Rate: 32% of all youth enrolled in the program must receive a diploma or certificate by the end of the third quarter after exiting the program.

Literacy and Numeracy Rate: 30% of all out-of-school youth enrolled in the program with basic skills deficiency must increase one or more educational levels within one year of program participation, i.e., reading, writing, numeracy, listening, speaking, or workplace skills.

Adult Employment and Training Programs and Goals

Entered Employment Rate: 70% of all unemployed clients enrolled in the program must be employed during the first quarter after exiting the program.

Employment Retention Rate: 75% of all unemployed clients enrolled in the program must be employed during the 2nd and 3rd quarters after exiting the program.

Average Earnings Rate: An average of at least \$11,500 in comparison to pre-program earnings must be earned in the second, plus third quarters after exiting the program.

Dislocated Worker Employment and Training Programs and Goals

Entered Employment Rate: 73% of all unemployed clients enrolled in the program must be employed during the first quarter after exiting the program.

Employment Retention Rate: 82% of all unemployed clients enrolled in the program must be employed during the 2nd and 3rd quarters after exiting the program.

Average Earnings Rate: An average of at least \$14,700 in comparison to pre-program earnings must be earned in the second, plus third quarters after exiting the program.

c. Performance indicators that include the anticipated and actual numbers of clients served and the program outcomes, including numbers of clients placed in training and employment.

RESPONSE: Please see Attachment A for reported details.

d. Numbers and types of new administrative support positions added as a result of the receipt of ARRA funding.

RESPONSE: A total of 31 support positions were created through the Local Workforce Investment Boards' ARRA funds. The types of positions were as follows: Receptionist; administrative assistant; project/youth coordinator; job coaches; employment and training services supervisor; teacher's aide; office manager; financial assistant; case managers; crew supervisors; tutor; and computer technician.

- 5. The Subcommittee noted the substantial amount of funding spent on youth training programs and asked DETR to describe the methods used to track the outcome of those expenditures. Does the department monitor how many of the youth were able to obtain jobs due to the training received? If so, please describe the reporting methods and provide the most recent reports prepared by the department.
 - RESPONSE: Using the Nevada JobConnect Operating System (NJCOS), the local workforce investment boards and DETR track youth clients from their initial registration until they are exited from their youth training activities. Youth receiving services and participating beyond the summer youth employment and training program are tracked and provided follow-up services for up to 12 months after exiting the program. At least annually, DETR's Workforce Investment Support Services Unit conducts on-site monitoring review visits to each local workforce investment board and their subrecipients. Youth performance outcomes are reported to DETR and on to the U.S. DOL via the NJCOS system. Performance evaluation reports are reviewed at least quarterly. Performance reports indicated the number of youth placed in employment, received high school diploma/GED, and improved academic skills. (Please see the most recent quarterly report).
- 6. Please describe the processes used by the local workforce investment boards in determining how to place employees in the summer youth employment program. Please also respond to the following questions regarding the program:
 - RESPONSE: Upon receipt of summer youth funding allocation, local workforce investment boards recruit businesses/employers via advertisement and referral contacts. Referral contacts are primarily businesses/employers who have participated in summer youth employment and training programs before—particularly during the previous year. Approximately 60 days prior to the start of summer youth employment, letters are sent to employers and businesses asking their support in hiring youth participating in the Workforce Investment Act Summer Youth Employment Program. Once businesses/employers are identified, work site agreements are executed and youth are placed at work sites based on their career interest and/or availability of work site employment. There never seems to be a sufficient number of businesses or employers to

place youth in summer jobs. Thus, some businesses and employers are requested to take on multiple youth for summer employment.

a. Please briefly describe the goals and the anticipated outcomes of the summer youth employment program.

RESPONSE: Work experience only. Performance goal for all youth participating in WIA ARRA summer youth programs is work experience only, without any other associated employment and training services.

b. How were businesses selected for participation?

RESPONSE: Advertisement and referral recruitment

c. How many businesses participated in the program?

RESPONSE: 340

d. Did the boards deny paid youth employee placements to any of the businesses seeking to participate in the program? If so, what were the reasons for denial and how many businesses were affected?

RESPONSE: No businesses/employers were denied paid summer youth job placements. In fact, many businesses/employers were asked to double up in order to ensure all registered youth were placed in summer jobs. Special notices for summer youth employment went out to hundreds of businesses and emphasis were placed on state and local agencies to serve as summer youth employers to help ensure youth had the opportunity to participate in summer employment and gain work experience.

e. How many businesses had multiple youth employee placements?

RESPONSE: 93

7. DETR reported that an interlocal agreement with the Housing Division has been drafted that would transfer \$1.75 million to DETR for weatherization training. The funding would enable DETR to train 300 individuals. Please describe the department's plans for integrating these trained individuals into the workforce.

RESPONSE: As outlined in Nevada Senate Bill (SB) 152, at least 50% of those individuals trained in DETR's weatherization program shall receive priority job placement with the Department of Business and Industry, Housing Division's contracted weatherization collaboratives. Through resource sharing/leveraging with Nevada's workforce development system, Nevada JobConnect Centers, as well as local workforce investment boards' employment and training services providers will be available to offer an array of employment services that allow trained and skilled clients to connect with employers and businesses requiring trained weatherization talent.

8. DETR noted the department is seeking a waiver to the requirement in Senate Bill 152 that 50 percent or more of the workforce of outside contractors for weatherization projects be trained as provided for in the legislation. Please describe the provisions of the waiver in detail, i.e., what is the department specifically seeking to be waived?

RESPONSE: The provision of the waiver is to allow the ARRA weatherization program to become operational and function immediately by using current employed and trained individuals to weatherize eligible residents' homes. The waiver process applies to all Business and Industry, Housing Division's contracted weatherization collaboratives. In order to receive a waiver, contractors must demonstrate with documented evidence that reasonable efforts have been made to recruit and hire DETR's graduated weatherization clients. Written requests with justification for waiver must be submitted to DETR's director for consideration and approval. Waivers may be approved for up to 90 days, at which time weatherization collaboratives may recruit individuals who have graduated from DETR's weatherization training program. If DETR graduated weatherization clients continue to be unavailable, a second 90 day waiver may be requested and approved with appropriate justification.

DETR also indicated the department is seeking a waiver of 60 days initially, but if trained employees are still not available, they may ask for an additional waiver. As requested by the Subcommittee, will the waiver be discontinued when sufficient numbers of individuals have met the training requirements?

RESPONSE: No waivers will be granted when there are sufficient numbers of weatherization graduates available for recruitment.

9. As noted in the RFP, DETR is seeking proposals to establish contractual relationships with one or more nonprofit collaborative to carry out the state's mission of creating training opportunities and new jobs in the field of residential energy efficiency by combining job training with residential weatherization assistance.

The Subcommittee noted that Senate Bill 152 includes tuition as an allowable cost and expressed concern that the RFP appears to exclude tuition. Please clarify whether DETR intends to include tuition as an allowable cost pursuant to the provisions of Senate Bill 152.

RESPNSE: Tuition for the weatherization training is an allowable cost under the program. Tuition and other administrative costs are also among the unallowable costs.

10. The Subcommittee expressed concern that the RFP does not appear to provide details on the specific laws and codes that must be addressed. Please describe the efforts taken by the department to ensure all requirements have been fully communicated.

RESPONSE: Training is required to ensure all weatherization safety and skills craft codes are applied and followed for every assigned housing project. The adequacy of the training will be monitored—as it is the purview of the accrediting bodies and agencies

licensing the training programs. DETR will ensure that all such programs have the approval of the appropriate licensing or accreditation agencies, which have oversight responsibility of ensuring that the course of study and training covers all the appropriate materials and activities.

11. Please describe the provisions of the RFP relative to entrepreneurship training.

RESPONSE: Entrepreneurship training will be offered as an option for individuals who may elect to enter into a business proprietorship.

- The City Attorney is funding training requirements for investigators and witness supportive services. (\$30,000.00)
- The Office of Administrative Services and the Department of Finance will hire two part time staff to assist with the monitoring, coordination, and reporting of ARRA and DOJ requirements for this grant. (\$196,926.29

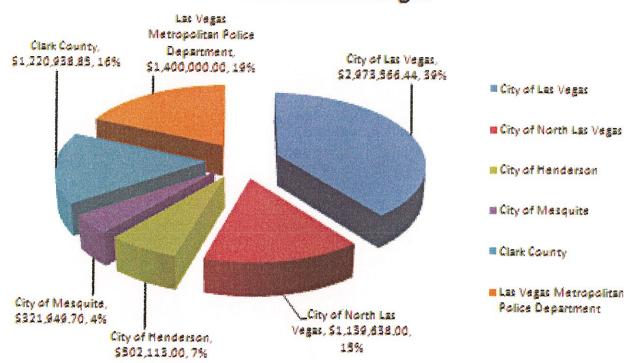

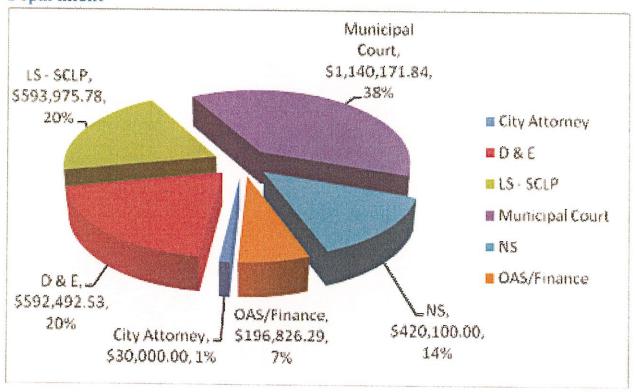

Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP)

The City of Las Vegas HPRP provides financial assistance and services to prevent individuals and families from becoming homeless and help those who are experiencing homelessness become quickly re-housed and stabilized. The HPRP will assist households whose income is at or below 50% area medium income for up to 18 months. The financial assistance is limited to short term rental assistance (3-months) and/or medium term rental assistance (4-18 months). The family income will be evaluated every three months and upon reaching 51% of AMI, the family is no longer eligible for HPRP funding.

The HPRP supports four eligible activities:

1. Financial Assistance to households at or below 50% AMI.

- a. Rental & utility payment assistance up to 18 months
- b. Back payment of up to 6 months rent and/or utilities
- c. Security and utility Deposit/Local moving cost assistance
- d. Motel/Hotel vouchers up to 30 days

2. Housing Relocation and Stabilization Services, Including:

- a. Outreach & engagement for clients
- b. Case management/service coordination
- c. Housing search and placement
- d. Legal Services and credit repair

2. Date Collection and Evaluation

- a. HMIS training on HPRP requirements
- b. Costs associated with participating in HUD sponsored research & evaluation

4. Administrative Costs – limited to 1%

- a. Accounting for use of grant funds
- b. Preparing reports for submission to HUD
- c. Program audits
- d. Training of staff on HPRP case management protocols
- The City of Las Vegas was allocated \$2,105,118 in HPRP funds pursuant to the HUD Agreement dated July 31, 2009, signed by the City on August 3, 2009. The HPRP funds have not yet been obligated as the agreements are being finalized.
- No jobs have yet been created and retained; however, once the program is ready for operation, it will retain one full time position.
- The HPRP does not support Capital improvements

The City of Mesquite has three grants/allocations of funds for programs contained in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

- 1. \$69,900 from the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grants Program. These funds will be used to obtain 13,980 lineal feet of fiber optic cable which will be used to synchronize traffic signals in Mesquite.
- 2. \$1 million from the American Recovery Act transportation funding for construction ready projects. Funding was received through a cooperative agreement with NDOT and will be used to overlay Hillside Drive and Hafen Lane.
- 3. \$322,000 from the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG). Funding was received through an interlocal agreement with multiple jurisdictions for funding obtained by the City of Las Vegas. This funding will be used by the Police Department for police equipment and personnel.

RE: City of Fallon review of plans and spending of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act funds administered by the State Energy Office – EECBA Grant

The City of Fallon understands that it most likely will receive EECBA grant funding through the State Energy Office, but the City has not yet been formally notified of such a grant approval or a total grant amount.

The City submitted two eligible energy efficiency projects to the State Energy Office that will result in substantial reduction in energy usage and costs, deliver immediate and sustained reductions in the City's CO2 emissions and energy usage, and reduce maintenance costs and enhance reliability. The two projects are:

1. HPS Street lights – replace all existing (640) streetlight heads with LED heads and bulbs

Estimated payback 8 years

Labor – estimated 2 contract linemen with a bucket truck for 80 to 90 days and consultant engineering for 100 hours

Series street lights and poles – replace 32 series street lights and poles with LED heads and bulbs

Estimated payback 8 years

Labor – estimated 4 contract linemen with a bucket and line truck for 30 days (includes trenching, cutting and paving), and consultant engineering for 67 hours

2. Energy audits – Conduct energy audits on several City owned and operated older buildings and electrical facilities to develop the necessary calculators

and programs to effectively audit and track energy savings and CO2 equivalents.

Technical consultants will be hired to perform energy audits on City Hall, the Old Post Office (90 N. Maine), Convention Center, all pumps and wells owned and operated by the City, and all large electric transformers within the system.

Labor - estimated consultant time of 187 hours

The streetlight relamping project will utilize the majority of grant funds available to the City through the State Energy Office. The City anticipates it will accept the State Energy Office's offer to produce the necessary reports to the U.S. Department of Energy ("DOE") and the Legislature. The projects do not require an environmental questionnaire. Work can commence upon final approval from the State Energy Office and the selection of contractors and technical consultants. Should additional grant funding become available, the City has other projects that it feels would qualify for submission to the DOE.

The City appreciates the Subcommittee's interest in the energy efficiency projects submitted to the State Energy Office and the support and assistance provided by the State Energy Office. The City is anxious to begin work on the projects which will greatly benefit the citizens of Fallon.

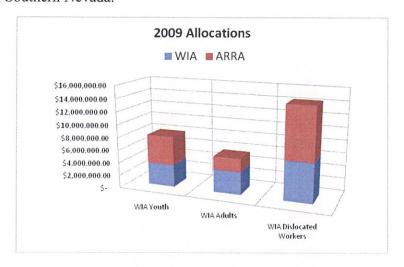

I. General ARRA Information

In PY 2009, workforceCONNECTIONS received \$14,812,007.00 in American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) funding to serve Youth, Adults and Dislocated Workers. These monies, when combined with the \$13,219,691.15 Workforce Investment Act (WIA) formula allocation more than doubled the funds available in Southern Nevada.



The award of ARRA funding followed a significant increase in WIA Dislocated Worker formula funds received in PY 2009 due primarily to Nevada's high unemployment rate. The graphic below illustrates formula funding received in the last 3 years and the increase in Dislocated Worker funds.

II. Youth Program

When ARRA stimulus money was authorized by the Department of Labor in February 2009, all recipients were urged to expedite programs quickly and inject funding into the economy as soon as possible. work-forceCONNECTIONS youth staff did a stellar job in meeting these goals. An RFP was issued in March of 2009 and 22 youth contractors were selected to provide employment services to youth. This represents a huge increase from the 3 or 4 agencies workforceCONNECTIONS typically contracts with each year. Contractors began recruiting youth in April with the goal of having a full program by the time school let out. In addition to the formula allocations from DOL, workforceCONNECTIONS was also asked by the Nevada Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation to administer a portion of ARRA youth funding set aside for that purpose in the Governor's Reserve.

The primary focus of ARRA Youth stimulus funding was to create summer jobs for "at risk" and lower income youth. The purpose was to give these young people valuable work experience and a paycheck. Through an agreement with the Clark County School District, students who were credit deficient were given the opportunity to attend summer school to catch up with their class and get back on the track to graduate. Many were also granted academic credit towards their high school diploma by participating in work experience activities.

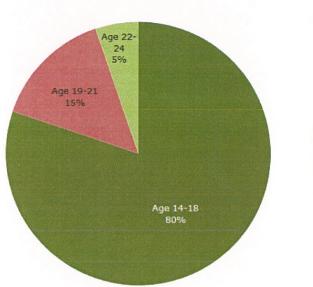

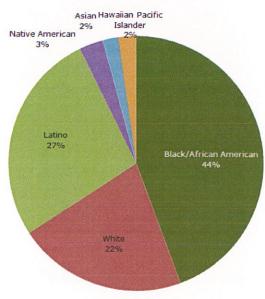

III. Adult Program

The official notification of ARRA Adult and Dislocated Worker money was received in February 2009, but there was no pressure to award the funding immediately unlike the youth allocation. On April 17, 2009, workforceCONNECTIONS released a Request for Proposals seeking Adult service providers and after a careful review process, 10 service providers were selected. Following contract negotiations, these contractors began providing services on July 1, 2009. The program year will continue until June 30, 2010.

During and since the solicitation process, *workforce*CONNECTIONS placed an emphasis on providing services to Dislocated Workers due to the high unemployment rate. ARRA contractors are required to allocate at least 65% of their total contract amounts to this population.

Youth ARRA activities were the main focus of the 2009 summer for Nevadaworks. 462 youth throughout Northern Nevada completed a work readiness certificate program where they learned:

- Work ethics
- Interpersonal relationships
- Dependability
- · Diversity in the workplace
- Team work
- Communication skills

In addition to the work readiness certificate training, the youth participated in various work experiences in their communities including desert cleanup and recycling, daycare work, construction, landscape, Reno ACE's ball field staff and various other businesses. Nevadaworks estimates that the Youth ARRA program funds will be 100% expended by 31 December 2009.

The Adult and Dislocated Worker ARRA program activities began on 1 July 2009. The initial months have been spent recruiting clients and training staff on the ARRA and WIA requirements in parallel monitored capability. Nevadaworks has contracted with twelve different agencies to run various programs such as training for computer technician skills, case management skills to work with disabled clients, communications technology, and community job development, lean manufacturing training, ESL training for mental health staff, waste removal processing and Certified Alcohol and Drug Counselor certification. Nevadaworks is currently accepting compatible incremental contingency proposals for additional ARRA programs to serve the Adult and Dislocated Worker populations.

INTERIM FINANCE COMMITTEE'S SUBCOMMITTEE FOR FEDERAL STIMULUS OVERSIGHT (ACR 34)

November 10, 2009

Chairwoman Smith and members of the Committee:

Although International Energy Conservation historically has been involved in commercial/industrial/MUSH markets for the past decade, we became interested in residential energy efficiency last year when we were exposed to Mayor Bill White and his Houston residential EE program as delivered through their neighborhood revitalization program. We reported on Houston's results to the DSM Collaborative. A copy of one of the evolved Powerpoint presentations to the DSM Collaborative is attached. We developed our REEPsm (Residential Energy Efficiency retrofit Program), and looked at it as a perfect mesh with ARRA and SB152, with their emphasis on reducing energy consumption and utility bills for increased numbers of residential customers, as well as increasing the number of Green Collar jobs, particularly for unemployed tradespeople. We have coalesced a high-quality blend of general contractor, Resnet auditor, rehab and weatherization-ready workers, and blower door and duct blasting technicians.

As you may recall, IEC has been involved in the legislative process, and this year SB152 (Sen. Horsford's Green Jobs Bill) was the focus of a substantial amount of our attention. We started discussing our REEPsm program with Craig Davis, Hillary Lopez and Charles Horsey in mid-session. We believe that our approach to bringing our "moving assembly-line" and suitable neighborhoods to the table will allow for giving the maximum number of urban homes serviced and jobs created for budget dollars available. A copy of our REEPsm program description is attached. IEC's REEPsm program eliminates one of the inefficiencies inherent in the old Weatherization model by reducing much travel time, and eliminating the featherbedding-type practice of requiring the most highly compensated staffer—a blower-door technician and his/her equipment—to be present while the less highly paid staffers perform the prescribed remediation. Rather, it allows the blower-door technician to work several contiguous homes, thus multiplying the number of homes serviced, as well as the number of jobs created.

Please do not take this as a critique of the longstanding program that Housing has in place. We respect the substantial and valuable experience that the Division of Housing, and their sub-grantees have gained, and believe they have served some Nevada homeowners very well. Particularly impressive and commendable is the manner and sufficiency of service provided to many needy rural families who, without Craig Davis', as well as others, efforts, might not have comfortable and safe homes.

That said, we believe that both the historical model our REEPsm can and should co-exist, with the existing Housing program working effectively in less dense areas, and IEC's REEPsm being deployed more in urban neighborhoods. Furthermore, we believe that our plan to have an independent Resnet auditor verify that work has been completed satisfactorily on each home and that energy savings have been achieved, is a sound approach. We have already done some outreach to particular lowerincome neighborhoods, and believe we should be able to bring qualified prospective homes to Housing, rather than waiting for them to contact Housing and/or its subgrantees.

At a recent ACEEE (American Council for an Energy Efficient Economy) conference in Chicago, I met with several DOE executives. They all expressed concern that ARRA funds provide the greatest benefit for the greatest number of homes, as well as providing the greatest number of jobs. Our moving assembly line approach made sense to them. Having the blower-door technician also use duct-blasting made sense, as well as having the blower-door technician and Resnet auditor deploy to several adjacent neighborhood homes so that he/she can serve as staff to several simultaneous weatherization and other energy efficiency crews made good sense to them. Thus far, it is my understanding that the Housing Division will not allow such a process. HVAC tune-up is also a component of our program, and has a proven energy efficiency value. This process will multiply both homes served, dollars and energy saved, and provide more green-collar jobs.

The DOE executives with whom I spoke referred me to a couple of publications, one dealing with the historical results of the Weatherization Program, and one with the new DOE "Weatherization Plus" program. We attach both herewith. The first report shows a national average unit cost of \$2,380 per home, which is more in line with our proposed cost under our more cost-effective delivery system. and approximately half of what Housing, and its sub-contractors, have been achieving. More important, the 21st century model—Weatherization Plus—is compatible with the IEC REEPsm

We urge the adoption by Housing of the newer DOE Weatherization Plus program, and the inclusion of such innovative, and more cost-effective, programs such as International Energy Conservation's REEPsm.

THE REEP PROGRAM

- Modeled after a program that is currently being provided by the City of Houston as part of its neighborhood revitalization initiative,
- Houston Mayor Bill White (former U.S. Deputy Secretary of Energy from 1993-1995) sponsored Houston program in concert with Clinton Climate Initiative staff.
- Utilizes a neighborhood assembly-line approach of doing the retrofits, thus eliminating many of the financial inefficiencies normally associated with residential and small commercial retrofit contracting. Without this type of approach, individually home and small business owners who desire to exercise responsible energy stewardship have to perform many tasks before embarking on such a program.
- Steps which will be eliminated for each homeowner through the REEPsu include:
 - Research on what measures are appropriate for the home
 - Identifying contractors in each discipline
 - Contacting each contractor and obtaining bids
 - Ordering the work from each successful bidder
 - Ordering materials, when necessary
 - Supervising the work performed by each contractor

Included in the REEP^{su} are the following, as necessary and financially feasible:

- Building envelope weatherization
 - Weather-stripping
 - Insulation
 - Increasing Attic Insulation to R-30 (12") from R-11 (3-1/2") or R-19 (6")
 - Blowing additional insulation into walls
- HVAC Tune-up
- Occupancy sensor driven thermostat controls from Energy Eye
 - Thermostat setbacks
 - o Water heater on/off control
- Re-lamping with LED lighting
- Replacing single-pane glass with energy efficient double-pane glass

Cost effective method of producing new, non-outsourceable Nevada jobs:

- 1. Uses efficient scheduling of retrofits
- 2. Contractors work up and down the blocks in a moving assembly-line approach
- 3. Cost--approximately \$2,000 per house versus \$4-5,000 when done singly
- 4. Provides much needed construction jobs at a time when the construction industry is in a deep recession in Nevada

Although the REEPSM can provide a mechanism to reduce power bills to low income customers, it is also appropriate for all ratepayers. Grants could be given to low-income ratepayers, or funded by the Economic Stimulus package. Non low-income customers could have their REEPSM retrofits paid for from the future energy savings, and could be financed by on-bill financing.

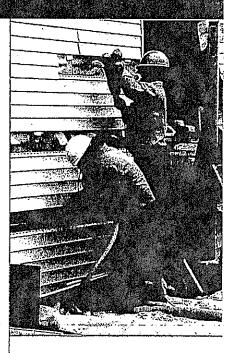

Executive Summary

What is Weatherization Plus?

Weatherization *Plus* is a term that describes the evolution of the Weatherization Assistance Program from its traditional focus on heating and cooling energy conservation to an expanded focus on whole-house energy usage and whole-community efforts. The whole-house approach incorporates advanced technologies and addresses the comprehensive energy usage in low-income homes, as well as related health and safety improvements. The whole-community approach enables Weatherization providers to serve as a resource for community-based efforts to conserve energy, boost economic activity, and improve the environment.

Why was Weatherization Plus developed?

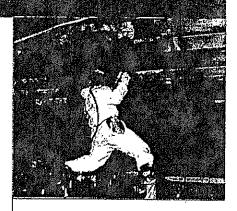
Weatherization services are delivered by an established network of local Weatherization providers. Through diverse partnerships with other federal, state, community, and private entities, many Weatherization agencies have demonstrated the capability to deliver expanded services in low-income homes. Weatherization *Plus* has been developed to foster this capability within the full network of providers and to magnify the benefits produced through weatherization.

What is the goal of Weatherization *Plus*?

The goal of Weatherization *Plus* is to achieve significantly greater energy cost savings for more low-income households and to increase the Program's contribution to the economic and environmental health and sustainability of the nation's communities.

Background

Discussions about strategic planning for the evolution of the Weatherization Assistance Program first began in the fall of 1998, at the Weatherization State Program Managers' Meeting in Brooklyn, New York. As an outcome of the Brooklyn discussions, a planning group, called the Weatherization Millennium Committee, was formed. The committee included state, local and federal staff, in addition to representatives from the National Association for State Community Services Programs (NASCSP) and the National Community Action Foundation (NCAF).



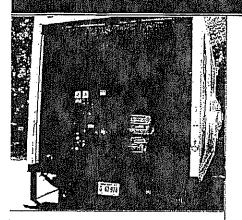

The Millennium Committee developed a visionary report containing a strategy for strengthening and expanding the Weatherization Assistance Program for the future. Named "Weatherization Plus: Opportunities for the 21st Century," this strategic plan urged the Department to support the network of state and local Weatherization agencies in flexibly adopting a whole-house approach and a whole-community approach to better serve low-income Americans.

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The goal of Weatherization *Plus* is to enable the Weatherization Assistance Program to achieve significantly greater energy cost savings for more low-income households and to increase the Program's contribution to the economic and environmental health and sustainability of our nation's communities.

When the original Weatherization Millennium Committee's work was completed, a follow-on group, called the Millennium Implementation Planning Committee (nicknamed the "MIC") took the vision of the first Committee and transferred it into an implementation plan. The MIC expanded upon the membership of the original Committee to include representation of the interests of Native American tribes, training centers and other stakeholders. With input from the entire network, the MIC formulated a series of action steps to lay the groundwork for Weatherization Plus. Actions were defined in the context of the three main strategies that the original committee established. They are:

Increase the network's flexibility through legislative/regulatory program improvements, and facilitating the role of Weatherization agencies in interactions with other community-based initiatives.

Advance the network's technological capabilities through an integrated strategy of training and technical assistance to employ new and advanced technologies which have been determined to be cost-effective, but have not been readily available to the Weatherization network in the past.

Expand resources available to the network through exchange of information on successes and new opportunities, interagency partnerships, appropriations at state and federal levels, and other leveraged funds from multiple sources.

In May of 2000, an update on Weatherization *Plus* was provided via a report entitled: "Progress Report on Weatherization *Plus*: Steps to New Opportunities in the 21st Century." It reported on the status of the 18 specific actions that the MIC defined to lay the groundwork for success assuming eventual broader network implementation when the necessary resources become available. Another update was issued in June 2001, entitled, "Weatherization *Plus* Progress Report: Poised to Move Forward."

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Weatherization Assistance Program - Weatherization Plus

In 2005 the Weatherization *Plus* Committee met once again to discuss the future of the Program and where focused time and attention was needed to ensure the future health and success of the Program. The results of that meeting are contained in the report, "Weatherization *Plus* – Our Future, Our Vision – *Where we want to be in 2010*." It contains clear, concise areas of focus and milestones for the Program over a five-year timeframe. Three strategies evolved from this process that are consistent with the Program's Mission and Vision:

- · Expanded Resources: Leveraging/Partnerships
- · Consistent Delivery of Quality Services
- · National Information Exchange Resource

Since the release of the latest report the Weatherization network has achieved great accomplishments in each of the outlined areas. A dedicated Web site, www.weatherizationplus.org, was developed to provide a gateway to information, analysis, and contacts available to Weatherization providers. The pages contain examples of lessons learned and material used when winning resources for affordable energy. In 2007, the Weatherization Trainers Consortium released the "Core Competencies" which outline a set of core competencies for the various-staff positions that implement the Weatherization Program. This document is intended to:

Increase awareness of the specialized skills and knowledge that are required to run an effective weatherization program;

- Help state and local weatherization agencies hire staff with a strong potential to perform well and prosper in the program;
- Serve as a foundation in establishing standardized curricula to ensure the consistent delivery of high-quality weatherization services nationwide; and
- · Put upward pressure on salaries to reduce staff turnover.

Additionally, in keeping with the three strategies outlined above, the Weatherization network will complete the first phase of the Weatherization Resource Library (WXRL). WXRL, developed specifically for the Weatherization Assistance Program, will serve as a source to archive all historical documents and ensure easy retrieval of governing documents by the Program network.
