
Water Trails ...

Shoreline facilities include parking, short-term and long-term boat storage, restrooms, interpretive info






- 2003 BIG IDEA Winner at the SMG Tourism Conference

- LTWT Committee published trail and trip planning guide and launched web site in 2005









- 2007 California legislative effort to designate water trail and direct planning effort received support and drew concern before stalling
- National Park Service Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance Program agreed to support development of water trail plan
- Initial planning steps 2007
