Introduction

- NLRC owns approximately 418,000 acres of former railroad checkerboard property in Pershing County, 20 miles on each side of the railroad
- NLRC land is currently committed to agricultural uses, which generate about \$35,000 in ad valorem taxes to Pershing County

Background

- Checkerboard pattern of ownership creates problems for everyone -- NLRC, BLM, recreational users, ranchers, utilities, and Pershing County planners
- Problems include access, fencing, roads, utility construction, and fire-fighting
- Problems impact or constrain economic development in Pershing County


Background

- Consolidation of the checkerboard lands would resolve many of the problems
- Historically, land exchange was a BLM process for consolidating public and private lands, or for disposing of public lands
- NLRC & BLM have made several unproductive attempts at land exchanges


Project History

- In 1999, NLRC and Pershing County officials began exploring ways to promote economic development
- In February 2003, Pershing County Commissioners appoint a citizen committee to make recommendations for consolidation of the checkerboard lands
- In March 2003, Pershing County passes a resolution in support of the checkerboard land consolidation
- In July 2003, State Legislature passes Senate Joint Resolution 10 in support of the checkerboard land consolidation, and urges Congress to assist



Consolidation Mechanics: Convey NLRC Lands

 Convey 217,000 acres to the US Government at fair market value

 Convey 950 acres to Pershing County for immediate economic development

Consolidation Mechanics: Replace Tax Revenue

 NLRC deposits with Pershing County 20 years of ad valorem taxes for the land conveyed to the US Government

 This tax revenue allows for the transition of auctioned lands into private ownership, which encourages development, expands the employment base and the tax rolls

Consolidation Mechanics: Periodic Auctions


- BLM auctions up to 217,000 acres in accordance with Pershing County Master Plan over the next several decades
 - 34,000 acres scheduled for near term disposal
 - 92,000 acres scheduled for mid term disposal
 - Balance for long term disposal
- Auction proceeds to be allocated between Pershing County and BLM

Consolidation Mechanics: Safeguards

 Legislation to provide for existing land owners to have preferential purchase rights for adjacent lands

 Successful bidders required to enter into development agreements with Pershing County governing the timely development of the auctioned property


Example: Checkerboard Lands




Example: Consolidated Lands

Benefits to County

- Availability of "blocked-up" auctioned lands to stimulate economic activity in accordance with the Pershing County Master Plan
- Local government direction of where future growth and land use elements occur within Pershing County
- Local government decision on when to request release of public lands for auction

Protection of Rye Patch Reservoir

 Protection of Humboldt River riparian areas

Benefits to BLM


- Eliminate large portion of checkerboard land pattern to improve management of public lands
- Additional public lands acquired with cultural sensitivity values, such as land along the California trail and its view shed
- Additional public lands acquired with biological sensitivity values

Benefits to NLRC


 Obtain fair market value for a large portion of its land in Pershing County
