Pahrump



When the SNTC was founded in June of 2002, the primary focus of the coalition was to bring a transit system to the town of Pahrump. The population of this community has swelled from 9000 residents in 1994 to 30,000 residents in 2004. This growth can be comparable to the growth of the Las Vegas Valley. Pahrump provide rural living with modern conveniences. In April of 2003, Wal Mart opened its doors to a grateful community. Total sales on the first day of operation of Wal Mart in Pahrump were \$325,000.

Pahrump is a bedroom community for Las Vegas. It provides a simpler way of life with most homes on lots about 1 acre or more in size. This has become a logistical nightmare when it comes to providing a viable transit operation. Pahrump is a decentralized community that offers unique challenges when it comes to providing a viable transit operation.

In November 2003, the Nye County Board of Commissioners approved a master plan for the community. This plan enables a transit system to be mapped out. Predetermined locations for business, government buildings, hospitals, and schools help plan routes so transit service can be operated efficiently.

Along with a transit system in the Pahrump Valley, providing a connecting service to Las Vegas must also be considered. With over 40% of the Pahrump Valley's population work in Las Vegas, a service linking into the current Citizen Area Transit (CAT) system is a must. This route would run down highway 160 and tie into the CAT system off of Rainbow and at the Downtown RTC transportation center.

Funding will be the major hurdle for this project. Currently we are looking at approximately \$1,300,000 for the valley and another \$1,100,000 for service to Las Vegas, and an additional \$700,000 to connect communities within Nye County. This will be a major transit project. Funds will need to come from NDOT, Nye County, and the town of Pahrump. No one single funding source will be able to provide total funding for this project.

At the present time the only service being provided in Pahrump is the Senior Transportation Service. Currently the Senior Center is providing 1500 rides per month. This service is at capacity. The Senior Center relies on funding from the Division for Aging Services to provide senior transit service. They also receive funds from Logistic Care for Medicaid Services.

Medicaid helps low-income residents and their families with trips to and from local and out of town Medical Facilities.

Care Center residents are provided with:

transportation to medical appointments daily

transportation to recreational outings two to three times a month.

The Senior Centers in Ely and McGill depend on us to transport senior citizens to and from the Nutrition Program Monday through Friday.

We also provide transportation for home bound residents to and from church on Sundays.

With the equipment and training provided to us by the State of Nevada, we are able to transport the disabled and wheel chair dependent individuals to their destinations. With the help of County Welfare, we provide the delivery of Food Baskets and presents to disadvantaged families in the Community around the Holidays.

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
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Northern Nevada Transit Coalition Ridership

Evolving Across the State

- NNRT opperating since 1999
- Currently provides over 20,000 rides per month
- Who: elderly, disabled, minority, low-income families, and the general public
- Where:Rural Communities: Elko, Ely, Winnemucca, Carlin, Wells, Wendover, Eureka, and Battle Mountain
- What:
 - Each operation provides door-to-door service that is based on appointment only and a few have deviated fixed and fixed routes.
 - The service provided aides in several different aspects for each individual needs
 - Medical appointments
 - Grocery stores
 - Employeement
 - Schools
 - · Elderly to local senior center (where they receive nutritional meals they would otherwise not get)

Need:

- Most of the communities do not have access to larger public transportation, or taxicab service
- Our services allow the elderly, and the disabled to continue with independent living
- Do not need to depend on family members to meet their demands
- Many senior's cars are taken from them, dramatically limiting quality of life
- Senior Centers deliver one meal a day to the homebound
- Also provide funds to the Indian Reservations so theyto may accommodate people that are in need of Public Transportation
- Parents depend on our service to transport children to and from school when school transportation is unavailable
- to may accommodate people that are in need of Public Transportation
- In the larger communities the general public also uses the service, whether it is to do daily errands, go to medical facilities, or to get back and forth to work. P

what's possible now:

- With the funding that the services receive, it allows them to keep the cost of Transportation at a level that is affordable to everyone
- Every year each of these services become more popular due to the demand for Public Transportation in the rural areas.
- The smaller communities do not have the same amenities as the larger cities; Public Transportation is considered a necessity not a luxury

Without the funding, these services would not be able to accommodate those that need transportation.

History of the Ely Buss

- operates in 1995 in White Pine County, Northern Nevada
- population of approximately 9,115.

Current Operations

- four vehicles
- three 15 to 21- passenger shuttle buses that are wheel chair accessible
- one 7- passenger van for out of area service.

Rural Community Services

- Ely, McGill, Ruth, and the outlying Sub-Divisions, with door-to-door public transportation.
- The only Public Transportation for White Pine County, many residents depend on our busses running daily.

Growth

Within a year, we have gone from approximately 1,500 passengers to 1,800 passengers a month, and are striving to reach our goal of 2,000 passengers a month. Every year we have exceeded the previous year's passenger count.

The People who Depend on Us

- Our community has many low-income families, disabled individuals, and senior residents that utilize our services.
- State and Local Agenciy funding enables our service is at a cost that they can afford.
- Local seniors so they may continue with independent living.
- They benefit from our services for employment, medical, nutritional, social, and recreational purposes.
- Individuals that do not have other modes of transportation can rely on us to transport them to training or educational facilities, or to their prospective place of employment.
- We transport children to and from school for parents who do not or are unable to use the Public School Transportation System.
- Our Head Start Program relies on us to transport the children on field trips through out the community and during the summer months to the local swimming pool located in McGill every other day.












