SUMMARY AND RATIONALE: The Nevadans for Equal Rights Ballot Committee appreciates the changes made to Ballot Measure 1., or the Nevada Equal Rights Amendment ballot measure. We strongly urge the Legislative Commission to adopt the changes provided below.

## ARGUMENTS FOR PASSAGE

Equality is a cornerstone of our democracy, but not everyone enjoys full equality. Historically, certain groups have been discriminated against because of their characteristics. One of the most effective ways to help ensure equality is to specifically include protections from discrimination in the *Nevada Constitution*, making them far more difficult to repeal, undermine, or overturn based on the political mood of the day. Approving Question 1 will establish [a strong] an enduring commitment to equality for everyone.

Although some protection against discrimination exists in federal and state law, there are gaps in the existing legal patchwork that have resulted in discrimination against certain

populations, including unequal pay for women, pregnancy

discrimination, and discrimination against LGBTQ individuals. This ballot measure [provides] fills those gaps by providing comprehensive state

constitutional guarantees of equal treatment under the law for the classifications of race, color,

creed, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, age, disability, ancestry, and national

origin. The measure would also provide the strongest legal protection against future legislative attempts to roll back equality rights in the state, including access to abortion and reproductive health care.

Do not be misled by opponents' exaggerated and incorrect arguments about Question 1. They argue that this ballot measure will protect abortion rights, erode and destroy women's sports by allowing male and transgender athletes to compete unfairly against women and girls, and endanger our students' safety in school facilities such as restrooms and locker rooms. First, Nevada law already guarantees the right to an abortion and passage of this measure will not change this right. Second, the passage of Question 11 Their arguments consist of unfounded speculation intended to distract from the clear goal of this ballot measure, which is to ensure equality. This ballot measure will not diminish the rights of some people at the expense of others but, instead, will advance equality for all by filling the gaps in existing protections. This measure would not undermine women's sports and in fact would protect and advance opportunities for women and girls, including those who are transgender, to participate in sports. There are dramatic disparities in opportunities, funding, and leadership opportunities for girls and women in the US in sports and we hope this amendment will help close those gaps.
