



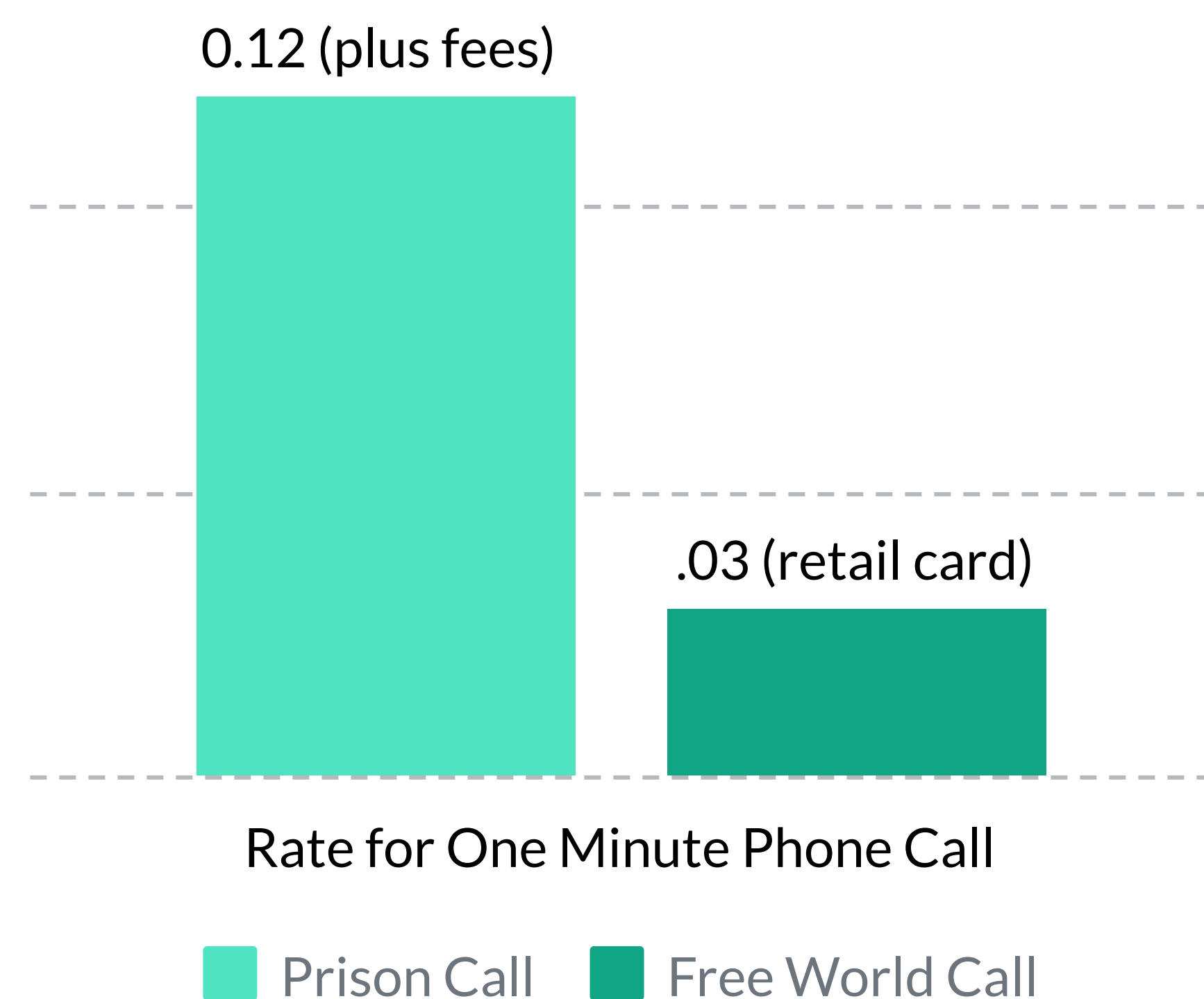
Pilot Program for Parent/Child Prison Phone Calls

Silver State Facts

- **55,000 Nevada children** have at least one incarcerated parent (Annie E. Casey Foundation, 2016)
 - 8% of Nevada youth
- **66% of incarcerated people** in the Nevada Department of Corrections committed **non-violent crimes** (Nevada Advisory Commission on the Administration of Justice, 2019)

Relevant Research

- 76% of children who speak to their incarcerated parents on the phone report doing so weekly (Haverkate & Wright, 2020)
- 53% of parents incarcerated in state prisons had spoken to their children over the phone since being admitted (Glaze and Maruschak, 2008)
- Frequent phone contact leads to more "warmth, closeness, and loyalty" between children and their incarcerated parent (Poehlmann et al., 2010)
- Women who reported frequent phone contact with a family member "were significantly less likely to be reincarcerated within 5 years post release than women who did not report family phone contact" (Barrick et al., 2014)
