Regarding Nevada voting and counting guidelines proposal.

Sirs,

We have been following the ongoing problems here in Nevada about the validity of votes being cast. We continue to be registered voters, and received an illegal ballot during the 2020 election cycle, apparently promoted by the DNC threat of lawsuits against Clark County IF they did not mail out ballots to ALL NAMES on file – without regard to status. In my view that was a violation of law, but never stopped. The EXTRA ballot we received was for the previous owner of this house – a person we know lived in another state after selling. That ballot we directly returned to the Clark County offices as invalid.

Sadly, during that same election, news stations here in Clark County ran multiple stories of the thousands of “unclaimed” ballots lying around in many apartment mail rooms – and mail carriers were interviewed reporting they knew those named were not tenants, but they had no choice but to leave them there. EVERY ONE OF THOSE “unclaimed” ballots could be, and likely was taken and used in the election. NEVADA HAS NO effective control to validate voters. At minimum, all voter rolls in Nevada must comply with the federal laws on keeping the rolls clean, elimination of dead people and contain only those who have chosen to continue voting in every election.

Our first choice in Nevada would be to have VOTER ID required, and to encourage in-person voting. It is also recognized that if a voter has been verified by VOTER ID, and that VOTER REQUESTS an absentee ballot, it be supplied to them. What we don't want ever is to mail ballots out to everyone. We also want to have a system that can be audited at any time after the event to ensure accountability and accuracy. Electronic voting machines cannot be reliably audited, and should not be used. Any computer equipment that is used to manage voting must NEVER be have access to the Internet.

It appears that many of the suggested changes are reducing accountability to the Nevada citizens, and that is not a good thing. One example is to eliminate recording the name(s) of people who transport ballots – that is an important record of who controlled votes and must be maintained. No vote counting should be done outside the direct observation of the observers from the major political parties. If it is done, those counts must be voided and redone with the observers in place.
