- 6,542 square miles
- Includes cities of Reno and Sparks
- 501,635 population (~116,000 in unincorporated Washoe)



Housing Continuum & Regional Roles



Regional Priorities:

1. Centralized, Shared Client Data

All data for individuals experiencing homelessness is shared across organizations to improve program outcomes.

2. Unified, Regional Outreach

Consistently work as a coordinated, regional team to ensure that all individuals are reached, and data shared.

3. Housing Clients Faster

Enable coordination of all partners to connect people experiencing homelessness who are on the by-name list to available housing and available resources to help housing individuals faster.



Regional Priorities:

4. Sheltering the Unsheltered

Using a housing first approach, ensure that our regional can provide emergency shelter and temporary housing to those in need.

5. Accessible Care for All

Expand staffing so that everyone who needs access has access to a case manager.

6. Regional Approach to Affordable Housing

In partnership with all jurisdictions, enable a regional direction to expand and fund sustainable, affordable housing options.



Washoe County's Fiscal Year 2023-24 annual operating budget for homeless services = \$35.5 million

Reduction of Barriers


- Cares Campus addresses common barriers.
- Cares Campus is the only option for many of our most vulnerable.
 - Property /Partners / Pets are allowed
 - No Sobriety Requirement
 - No Fees, Rent or Income
 - No Prior Program Completion Requirement
 - No Background or Criminal History Check
 - No ID Requirement

Permanent Supportive Housing ("PSH") is an innovative, costeffective, and proven solution to addressing homelessness.

It combines affordable housing with services for homeless households who face complex medical, mental health and/or substance use issues that are co-occurring.

- 24 Hour Staff




Permanent Supportive Housing

\$2,397 / day Hospital




- Increased number of Partnerships with the Campus from 13 to 34 since May




Percent of individuals who have returned to homelessness within 6 months of being housed

Decreased Recidivism Rate





- Decrease in overall individuals experiencing Homelessness
- Decrease of Unsheltered individuals
 - Point In Time Count
 - 46.5% decrease in 2022
 - 21% decrease in 2023





Housing Affordability and Supply: Toolbox

Planning and Zoning: Alternate permitting processes and development standards

Incentives: Soft subsidies and flexible policies

Funding: Direct subsidy and no/low interest financing



Housing Affordability and Supply

Two Washoe County Strategic Plan priorities:

- 1) Spur creation of affordable housing
- 2) Increase and diversify overall housing supply

Accomplish by:

- Streamlining planning/permitting processes
- Softening standards that create unnecessary barriers
- Establish incentives
- Implement easy wins and maintain forward momentum
- Small efforts leading to larger cumulative impact



Housing Affordability and Supply

Four initial "priority packages"

- 1) Focus on accessory dwellings and manufactured homes
- 2) Make it easier to create missing middle and multi-family housing
- 3) Create incentives specific to affordable housing projects and "starter homes" (ex. softening parking standards; offering density bonuses)
- 4) Establish program to offset/waive development fees for qualifying projects
- Streamline planning and permitting processes throughout
- Increase regional coordination



Challenges needing support

Funding:

- Permanent Supportive Housing
 - Washoe County Affordable Housing Trust Fund
 - Permanent funding for Permanent Supportive Housing Services
- Tenancy Support
- Offsets to allow waivers/reductions in development fees

Other Challenges:

Barriers to funding (reporting requirements, etc.)
