The Division of Measurement Standards ensures quality of motor fuel and lubricants and consistency in commercial transactions by regulating devices used to determine weight and volume.




Division of Food and Nutrition

Nevada Agriculture


Number of Farms in Nevada



Food Insecurity

"A person is food insecure when they lack regular access to enough safe and nutritious food for normal growth and development and an active and healthy life." $^{\rm 1}$

2016 - 2019

- 1 in 8 Nevadans were food insecure.
- The food insecurity rate was 11.1% 12.1%.

- Nevada ranked 8th nationally in overall food insecurity rates.



Implementation

With help from our partners, like FBNN and Three Square, the Division of Food and Nutrition offers support of nutrition for the citizens of Nevada through the following federal nutrition and feeding programs:



Child & Adult Care Food Program

Uses United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) funds to provide nutritious meals and snacks in child and adult day care centers, family and group day care homes for children, and in before-and-after school programs.

5,133,447 Meals & Snacks Served in SFY 2022



Summer Food Service Program

This program bridges the gap when school lets out for the summer by providing free nutritious meals to children 18 and under residing in low-income areas through USDA funds when school is not in session.

1,974,904 meals served in SFY 2022



Farm-to-School Program

This program connects students to Nevada farmers and fresh, healthy, local foods. It provides resources and training to get local foods into classrooms and lunchrooms through farmer-classroom connections and school gardens.



Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program

This program uses USDA funds to increase the availability of fresh fruits and vegetables in elementary schools, leading to increased consumption of fruits and vegetables by students.

\$3,221,347 Federal Funds were **distributed** in Nevada in SFY 2022



National School Lunch Program (NSLP)

This program provides students with nutritious lunches through USDA funds to schools and school districts. Participants are encouraged to select fresh fruits and/or vegetables, whole grain rich choices, and low-fat or non-fat dairy with the NSLP meal patterns.

39,596,452 lunches served in the 2022 - 2023 school year



School Breakfast Program

This program provides students with nutritious breakfasts through USDA funds to schools and school districts to promote learning readiness and health eating behaviors.

20,729,776 breakfasts were served in the 2023 school year.



Special Milk Program

This program uses federal funds to provide milk to children that do not participate in other federal meal service programs in schools and childcare centers.

98,567 milks served in the 2023 school year



Child Nutrition Commodity Support

This program provides USDA purchased foods for the Child and Adult Care Food program, the National School Lunch Program, and the Summer Food Service Program with \$22,038,838 USDA dollars spent in SFY 2022.



Emergency Food Assistance Program

This program provides USDA Foods to food banks, food pantries, and soup kitchens for distribution to low-income households and individuals throughout Nevada.

17,238,932 pounds of food were distributed to an average of 132,000 households per month.



Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations

Delivers USDA Foods to low-income households and individuals living on Tribal land or who are members of a federally recognized Tribe living in an approved area in Nevada using USDA funds.

Average number of individuals **served per month**: **270**SFY 2022



Nutrition Services Incentive Program

Offers USDA purchased foods as an alternative to cash in senior citizen centers throughout the state as part of the federal Older Americans Act. The program is administered by the Nevada Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS), Aging and Disability Services Division and NDA provides support through allocation and delivery of USDA Foods for those sites that choose to receive USDA Foods instead of cash.

Provided \$25,053 for USDA Foods in SFY 2022



Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Program

This program uses USDA funds to provide low-income seniors with coupon books to use as cash that can be exchanged for eligible foods at participating Nevada farmers' markets and roadside farm stands to increase consumption, production, and distribution of fresh, locally-grown fruits and vegetables and supplement the nutritional needs for Nevada seniors.

Served more than **4,650 seniors** and provided Nevada farmers with an additional **\$128,581** in **income** between May and September of 2022.



Senior Nutrition and Wellness Program

Previously known as the Commodity Supplemental Food Program as referred to by the USDA, this program offers monthly food packages for seniors who are 60 years of age and older with incomes at or below the 130% of poverty levels to improve the health of low-income seniors.

Average number of **seniors served** per month: **5,178** SFY 2022



State Processing Program

This program works with commercial food processors to convert raw bulk USDA foods into more convenient end products like apple sauce, chicken nuggets or string cheese.

For the 2022-2023 school year, this program **SAVED school districts \$8,833,467** through processed USDA Foods.



Home Feeds Nevada (HFN)

This is a food purchasing and distribution program to help Nevada become more food secure and create economic opportunity for Nevada agriculture producers.

NDA purchases nutritious, local foods and distributes them through designated food banks to food insecure populations.



HFN Program Update

Since the program started in 2022 HFN has purchased

\$3,521,882

worth of food from local farmers, ranchers, and processors.

Home Feeds Nevada

HFN is a high-profile program that continues to increase in popularity with small and medium sized producers and processors and has statewide reach down into underserved communities in rural, tribal, and urban food deserts. Many of these participants now depend on this program to keep their farms going. It is imperative that funding is secured to continue this program that helps so many Nevadans.



How HFN Continues

- Senate Bill 370 states that the NDA Director may solicit and accept any gift, grant or donation for the program, but no fiscal note is attached.
- Initially, the NDA used Federal ARPA funds under the Local Food Purchase Assistance (LFPA) grant from the USDA. The remainder of these funds will be expended by 6/30/2024 or 12/31/2024 if an extension is granted.
- We are currently utilizing \$2M in State ARPA funds allocated in SFY 2022.
- Once these funds are depleted the NDA will hit a funding cliff unless additional funding is gifted, granted, or donated.
 - NDA is looking into sources of other funds, but currently has received no gifts, grants or donations for this program.
