Examples of Community Engagement

- -CEAB: Meeting with principals and district officials. Mission is to provide support to school administrators.
- -PTOs: Provide necessary fundraising for local schools; avenue for community engagement (Elementary School Printer Story)
- -Sporting Events are Community Functions
- Teacher/Community Engagement

Four Major Issues with Solutions

- Unavailability of Comparable Academic Programs/Experiences when compared to schools in the Las Vegas Valley
- 2. Special Education
- 3. Collective Bargaining/Teacher Needs
- 4. Transportation

Issue 1: Academics

Virgin Valley hindered by policies that make sense in Las Vegas Valley, but do not in the Virgin Valley

Ex 1: The Culinary Arts Class

Ex 2: Dual-Credit Classes

Ex 3: English Language Learners

Issue 1: Academics

Proposed Solutions:

- Allow community leaders to assist in vocational/technical training of students
- Allow meaningful communication between community leaders and school leaders
- Reduce red-tape of large Human
 Resources/Legal Department
 - Local control over ELL education

Issue 2: Special Education

"Numbers-based" needs assessment based on population of Las Vegas Valley has an extremely low probability of success in the Virgin Valley.

Example: Placement of Special-Needs Students

Issue 2: Special Education

Proposed Solutions:

- Allow for geographic placement
- Allow for age-based placement

Issue 3: Teacher Needs

Virgin Valley Teachers are subject to collective bargaining agreements that may create professional/familial burdens

Ex 1: Professional Training

Ex 2: Healthcare

Ex 3: Teacher Recruitment

Issue 3: Teacher Needs

Proposed Solutions:

Allow Virgin Valley teachers to be a Collective Bargaining Unit.

Issue 4: Transportation

Ineffecient transportation rules based on policies that work well in Las Vegas Valley

Ex 1: Bus Routes are based on Las Vegas Valley formulas

Ex 2: No extra funding for necessary additional travel

Ex 3: Access to special needs busses

Issue 4: Transportation

Proposed Solution:

Allow local control over transportation funding decisions, bus routes and access/purchasing of necessary equipment.

- -Virgin Valley does not have a parental engagement problem
- -Virgin Valley does not have a community engagement problem
- -Virgin Valley's increased involvement and control over community education will lead to statistically proven results and better opportunities for students
