# Statutes Implicated

- NRS 179.245 sealing for eligible convictions
- NRS 179.247 vacatur for eligible convictions
- NRS 179.255 sealing for dismissed and declined cases, acquittals
- NRS 179.259 sealing after completing re-entry program
- NRS 179.271 sealing for de-criminalized offense
- NRS 179.285 restoration of civil rights
- NRS 453.3365 sealing of certain controlled substance offenses

#### NRS 179.271 - Decriminalized Offenses

- Written Request to the Court
- Court notifies prosecuting attorney who has 10 judicial days to object
- If no objection, Court must grant sealing
- If objection, Court must hold a hearing. Prosecuting attorney can present evidence to show no good cause to grant sealing.
- No fees may be charged by court or "agency of criminal justice."

# Record Sealing or Vacatur. What's the Difference?

#### **Record Sealing**

The record is physically removed from a record system and the proceedings are deemed to have never occurred.

#### Vacatur

The record is physically removed from a record system and proceedings deemed to have never occurred.

#### **PLUS**

- Judgment is vacated.
- Accusatory pleading is dismissed.

# What's the Difference?

#### **Record Sealing Statute**

Can be used by anyone

#### **Vacatur Statute**

 Can only be used by human trafficking and involuntary servitude victims

# What's the Difference?

#### **Record Sealing Statute**

- Typical Candidates must meet the statutory waiting periods of staying out of trouble depending on the level of conviction
  - Between 1 and 10 years

#### **Vacatur Statute**

Trafficking and Involuntary Servitude Survivors have NO STATUTORY WAITING PERIODS for qualifying offenses BUT must exercise "due diligence" once he/she has ceased being a victim of trafficking or involuntary servitude OR sought services for victims of trafficking or involuntary servitude.

# Eligible Charges Record Sealing under "245"

- Everything except:
  - A crime against a child → defined in NRS 179D.0357
  - A sexual offense → includes 17 specific offenses
  - Invasion of the home with a deadly weapon pursuant to NRS 205.067;
  - Felony DUI/DWI → 3<sup>rd</sup> offense
  - DUI/DWI resulting in substantial bodily harm or death
  - Vehicular homicide resulting from DUI/DWI driving
  - Operating a Vessel Under the Influence → motorboat, vessel, water skis, surfboard
  - Operating a Vessel Under the Influence resulting in substantial bodily harm or death; Homicide by Vessel

# Eligible Charges for Vacatur under "247"

- Prostitution or solicitation for prostitution, provided that the person was not alleged to be a customer of a prostitute
- Loitering for the purpose of solicitation or prostitution (local laws)
- Everything other than "a crime of violence"

#### "Crime of violence" means:

- (1) Any offense involving the use or threatened use of force or violence against the person or property of another; or
- (2) Any felony for which there is a substantial risk that force or violence may be used against the person or property of another in the commission of the felony.

## Top Reasons Petitions Are Denied

- Petitioner has not met statutory time periods.
- Petitioner's "current, verified records received from the Central Repository for Nevada Records of Criminal History" are not "current"
- Many judges maintain a judicial preference to have a prosecutor's stipulation to enable the rebuttable presumption.
- Prosecutors have "all-or-nothing" stipulation policies\*\*

\*\* Some prosecutors' offices have taken a trauma-informed approach and have stipulated to partial vacatur/sealing for trafficking victims.

#### Process

**Criminal History** Fingerprinting SCOPE Report Law Enforcement Prosecutor Agency **Petition Drafted Stipulations** Certification Agency Mail Court Order Compliance File with Court to Each Agency Letters

# Costs

#### **Typical Candidate**

- Fingerprinting \$15 \$20
- Criminal History Report \$27
- SCOPE ~ \$15 per arresting agency
- Filing with Court \$50 \$270
- Costs of copies, mailing, and return mail

#### Trafficking Survivor

- Fingerprinting \$15 \$20 \*\*
- Criminal History Report \$0
- SCOPE ~ \$15 per arresting agency \*\*
- Filing with Court \$50 \$270 \*\*
- Costs of copies, mailing, and return mail

\*\* These should all be \$0 pursuant to NRS 179.245(9) passed last session.
