Background

Nevada Legislation and the Task Force

- Nevada Revised Statute 396 (NRS 396) and Senate Bill 347 (SB 347), passed during the 81st (2021) Legislative Session and effective June 9, 2021, mandated the convening of a Nevada System of Higher Education (NSHE) Task Force on Sexual Misconduct.
- Per the Task Force's recommendation, NSHE
 contracted The Center for Surveys, Evaluation,
 and Statistics (CSES) and the Grant Sawyer
 Center for Justice Studies (GSCJS) at the
 University of Nevada, Reno (UNR) to administer a
 survey to assess sexual misconduct at 7 of the 8
 institutions that enroll students.
- Effective July 1, 2023, the Task Force was subsequently renamed the Power-Based Violence Task Force (PBVTF) per Assembly Bill 245 (AB 245) and NRS 396.1415 passed in the 82nd (2023) Legislative Session. The aforementioned survey was revised to align with the new legislation.

Definitions

- Power-based violence refers to any form of interpersonal violence intended to pressure, control, intimidate, or harm another person through the assertion of power over the person. This term includes, without limitation, dating violence, domestic violence, family violence, gender-based violence, violence based on sexual orientation or gender identity or expression, sexual misconduct, sexual assault, sexual harassment, sexual exploitation, stalking, and observing another person who is naked or engaging in sexual activity without that person's consent.
- Sexual misconduct is a subset of power-based violence and is broadly defined as the use of power or control to intimidate or harass another person through unwanted intimate violence. Examples of sexual misconduct include intimate partner violence and stalking. Sexual misconduct occurs in the absence of consent. There are questions in the survey that address sexual misconduct in greater detail.
- Sexual assault is a subset of power-based violence and is defined as any sexual activity that happens without consent. There are questions in the survey that address sexual assault in greater detail.

AB 245/NRS 396.1415

- "Sec. 7.1. NRS 396.1425...to the extent that money is available, the Board of Regents may require each institution within the System to conduct a climate survey on power-based violence at the institution biennially."
- "2. A climate survey on power-based violence conducted pursuant to subsection 1 must include the questions developed by researchers employed at an institution within the System pursuant to NRS 396.142."

February 17, 2022

- Inaugural Task Force meeting
- Task Force officers elected
- Inventory of current instruments and data from NSHE institutions presented by institutional representatives

April 25, 2022

 Experts presented best practices for administering sexual misconduct surveys at institutions of higher education to the Task Force

October 12, 2022

- An expert from The Nevada Center for Surveys, Evaluation, and Statistics presented metrics and process for managing an NSHE wide survey to the Task Force
- An expert presented on the complexities of sexual assault and survivor interactions to the Task Force

• March 29, 2023

- The Task Force reviewed a draft of the survey instrument and recommended amendments
- The Task Force voted unanimously to recommend the survey instrument to the Board of Regents

June 9, 2023

- Board of Regents unanimously approved the survey instrument including revisions aligned with SB 245/NRS 396.1415
- The Acting Chancellor identified \$30,000 in Special Project funding for The Nevada Center for Surveys, Evaluation, and Statistics to administer the survey and to analyze results

Fall 2023

- The survey was administered to students at College of Southern Nevada, Great Basin College, Nevada State University, Truckee Meadows Community College, University of Nevada, Las Vegas, University of Nevada, Reno, and Western Nevada College
- No high school dual enrollment students were included, and only those students 18 years of age or older were permitted to participate in the survey

December 27, 2023

- First meeting of the new iteration of the Power Based Violence Task Force under SB 245/NRS 396.1415
- Task Force elected officers

Power-Based Violence Survey: Survey Participants

The final contact list, compiled from contacts provided from each NSHE institution, yielded 107,386 students. Of those students, 3,298 emails were duplicated, 1,160 emails bounced, and 4 emails failed to send. Therefore, a total of 102,924 students received the survey. Out of the students who received the survey, 5,644 students completed the survey. However, 147 students did not consent to completing the survey; therefore, their surveys were terminated immediately. Thus, 5,497 surveys had viable data. The response rate of this survey is 5.48%.

Power-Based Violence Survey: Brief Overview of Findings

- Generally, students at each institution reported positive perceptions of their campus leadership
- Overall, reports of unwanted sexual experience perpetration and victimization were low
- Generally, students from UNR reported the most experiences with being victims of, or witnessing, unwanted sexual contact or sexual assault
- UNR students also reported the most interest in preventing power-based violence through involvement in programs
