Dear Governor Lombardo:

The Nevada Silver Haired Legislative Forum was created by the Legislature under *Nevada Revised Statutes* (NRS) <u>427A.313 through 427A.400</u> to identify and act upon issues of importance to aging persons. During the 2023-2024 Legislative Interim, Forum members heard presentations on homelessness in Nevada, particularly the situation for unhoused seniors and currently available supportive services.

According to testimony from expert witnesses, 31 percent of extremely low-income renter households in Nevada belong to older adults. Since 2020, older adults are particularly overrepresented among those experiencing chronic homelessness. Further, unhoused seniors experience higher rates of age-related health challenges that impact activities of daily living, such as cognitive impairments, depression, vision impairment, and increased risk of falls. Individuals subjected to homelessness are also at greater risk for experiencing mental illness and being exposed to significant health hazards and communicable diseases often acquired from living on the streets.

Forum Members learned that homelessness among seniors is on the rise, driven by factors such as fixed incomes, rising costs of living, and insufficient access to affordable housing options. Perhaps more concerning—in terms of available affordable housing—Nevada only has 14 units available per 100 extremely low-income households when compared with the national average of 34 affordable housing units per 100.

During testimony, a recommendation was made to create a rent stabilization fund for seniors. This type of fund source would provide low-income seniors with a stipend to absorb annual rent

increases and ensure senior citizens on fixed incomes are not disproportionately affected by rising rental costs.

At its final meeting and work session on <u>August 7, 2024</u>, the Forum voted to send this letter to various government entities to express its support for greater coordination and consolidation of efforts to address the growing need for safe, secure, and stable housing for Nevada seniors, and advance further discussion to establish a rent stabilization fund for seniors who meet specific income thresholds.

Prioritizing the development of affordable housing can make a significant impact on seniors' well-being and stability—and that of the surrounding community. Access to safe, affordable housing is fundamental to improving health outcomes, reducing homelessness, and fostering economic growth for our state.
