# The Mission of Disability Resource Centers

- Disability Resource Centers ensure all students with disabilities are afforded the opportunity to access the same information, engage in the same interactions, and be empowered to enjoy the same college experience as students without disabilities by:
  - Promoting self-advocacy
  - Ensuring students with disabilities are afforded reasonable accommodations
  - Assisting the campus community in providing accessible facilities, courses, events, etc.
  - Supporting a campus culture of inclusion

#### Student Use

- NSHE-wide, approximately 5% of students taking credit-bearing classes are registered with the DRC on their campus.
- ▶ DRCs also serve students who are enrolled in non-credit bearing classes such as High School Equivalency, Workforce Development, and Community Education classes.
- Frequency of student use depends on student need and services provided. Some students meet with DRC personnel infrequently. Others may meet with personnel regularly for a variety of reasons including:
  - Training in academic success skills, including assistive technology
  - Guidance in navigating through the college culture
  - Mediation with faculty regarding accommodations and other issues

This is the first year we have attempted to collect graduation rates for students using DRC services and not all institutions were able to produce this metric. In order to be consistent and comparable, graduation rates for students using DRC services were based on the parameters for collecting data for IPEDS: first-time, full-time, degree-seeking students.

### Coordination With Campus Resources

- ▶ Students who are registered with the DRCs engage with all campus programs and resources to address issues from avoiding excess credits, to accessing tutoring and other services to improve their academic success. For example:
  - Advising: all students are encouraged to visit with advisors to ensure the classes they are taking are appropriate for their declared major.
  - Financial Aid: students with disabilities must meet the same requirements as peers without disabilities to receive Federal Financial Aid. DRCs can approve a reduced credit load as an accommodation for some situations (insurance, housing, Millennium Scholarship).
  - ► Tutoring: per the ADA and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act, tutoring is not considered a reasonable accommodation. However, students with disabilities have access to tutoring provided by other departments. DRCs often provide training to tutors on strategies for working with students with specific disabilities.

## Workforce Placement Program Rates

- Workforce placement data is most typically gathered at the department or program level to determine if graduates are working in their field of study.
- ▶ Students who use DRC services have access to the same job search and placement assistance as their peers.
- ► UNLV, WNC, and TMCC have third party cooperative agreements with DETR-BVR (CareerConnect programs) and do collect workforce placement as a performance measure for the agreement.
- ▶ UNR participates in the Workforce Recruitment Program. WRP is a recruitment and referral program that connects federal and private sector employers nationwide with highly motivated college students and recent graduates with disabilities who are eager to prove their abilities in the workplace through summer or permanent jobs.

#### Student Satisfaction

- ► Four institutions, CSN, TMCC, UNLV and UNR conduct student satisfaction surveys. All four institutions report student satisfaction rates above 90%.
- ▶ When students are not satisfied with services provided by DRCs, students are encouraged to follow the complaint process for the institution.
- Much like Office of Civil Rights (OCR) complaints, audits, and compliance reviews, complaints provide us with the opportunity to look critically at our process and make changes to improve services.
