





Priority Watersheds



Ward and Blackwood Creek Restorations Completed












Upper Truckee River

- Interagency strategy under development






Water Quality

Nearshore/AIS








Public Access

 - Sugar Pine to Meeks Bay










Land Acquisition and Restoration








- Conservancy launching TLC Program to acquire aging properties on sensitive land
