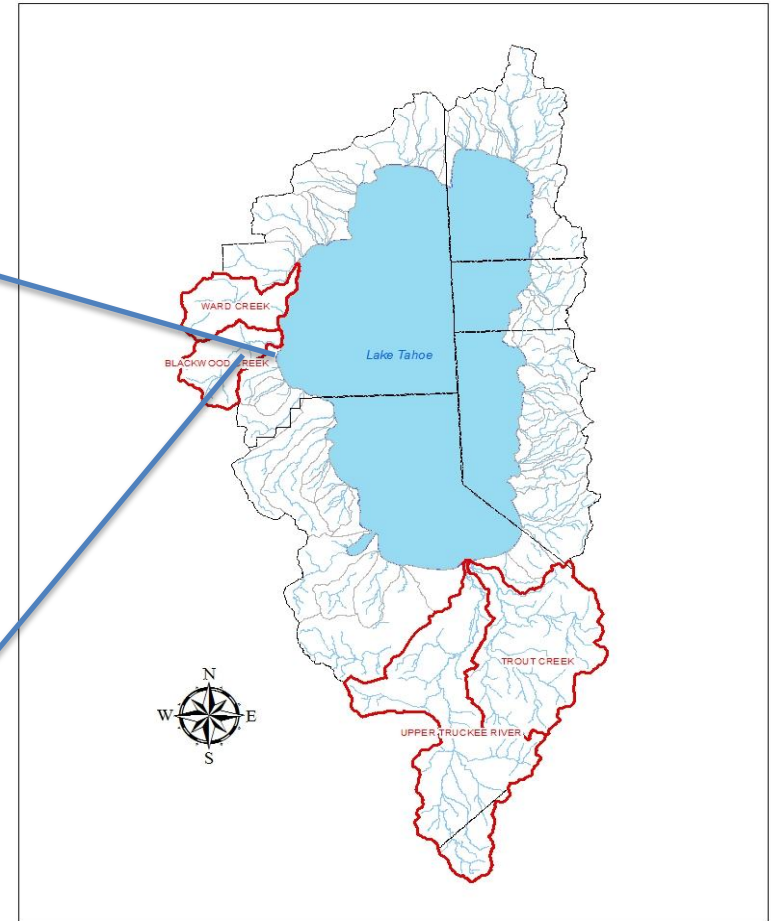

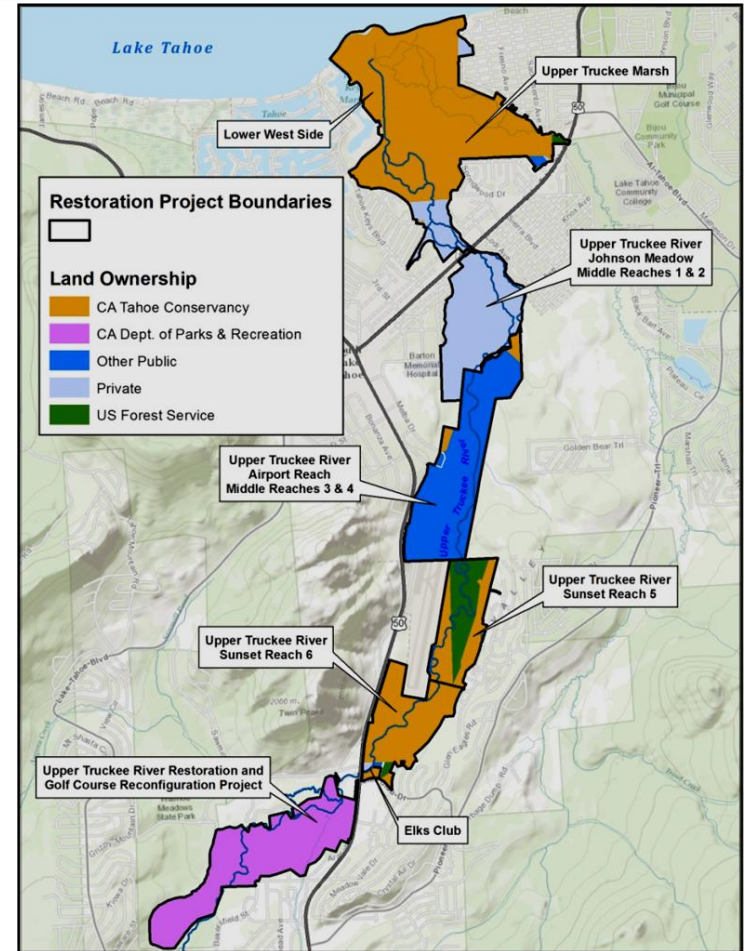
## Ward and Blackwood Creek Restorations Completed

- New funding for both monitoring and projects

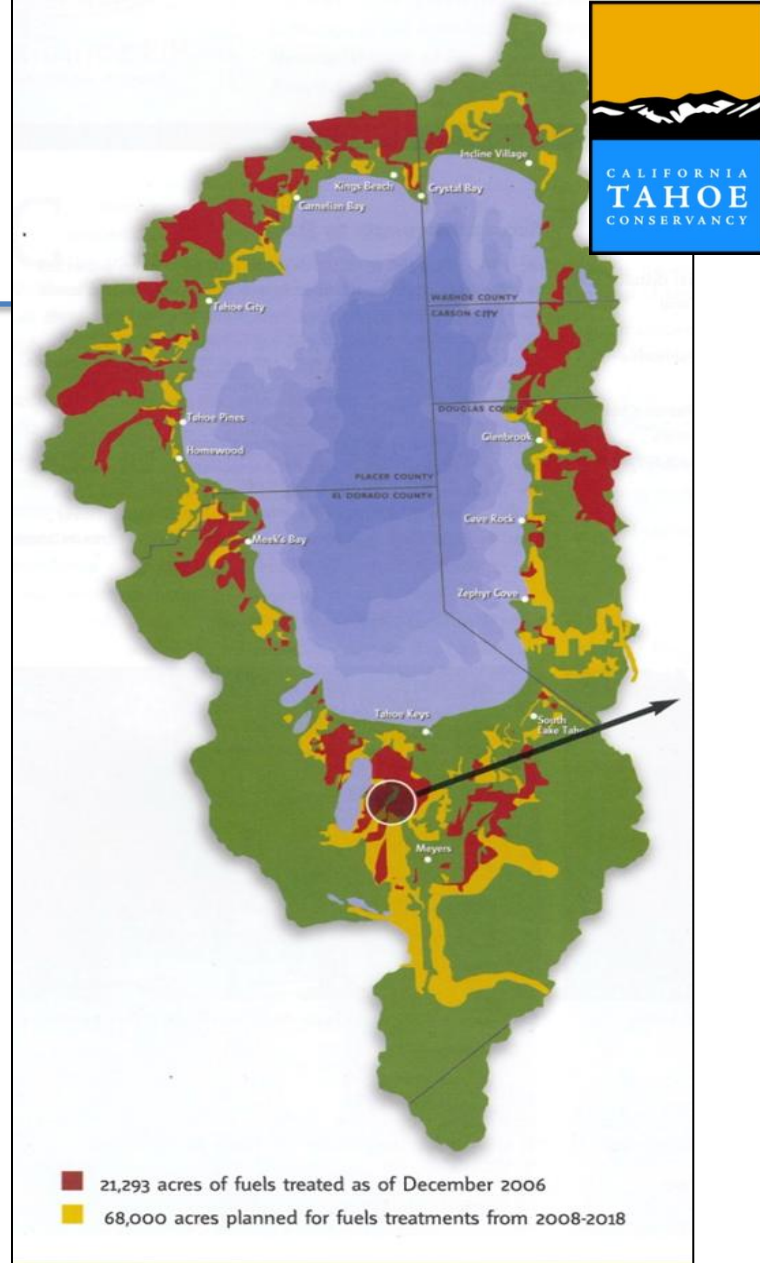

Several new parks have helped to revitalize communities



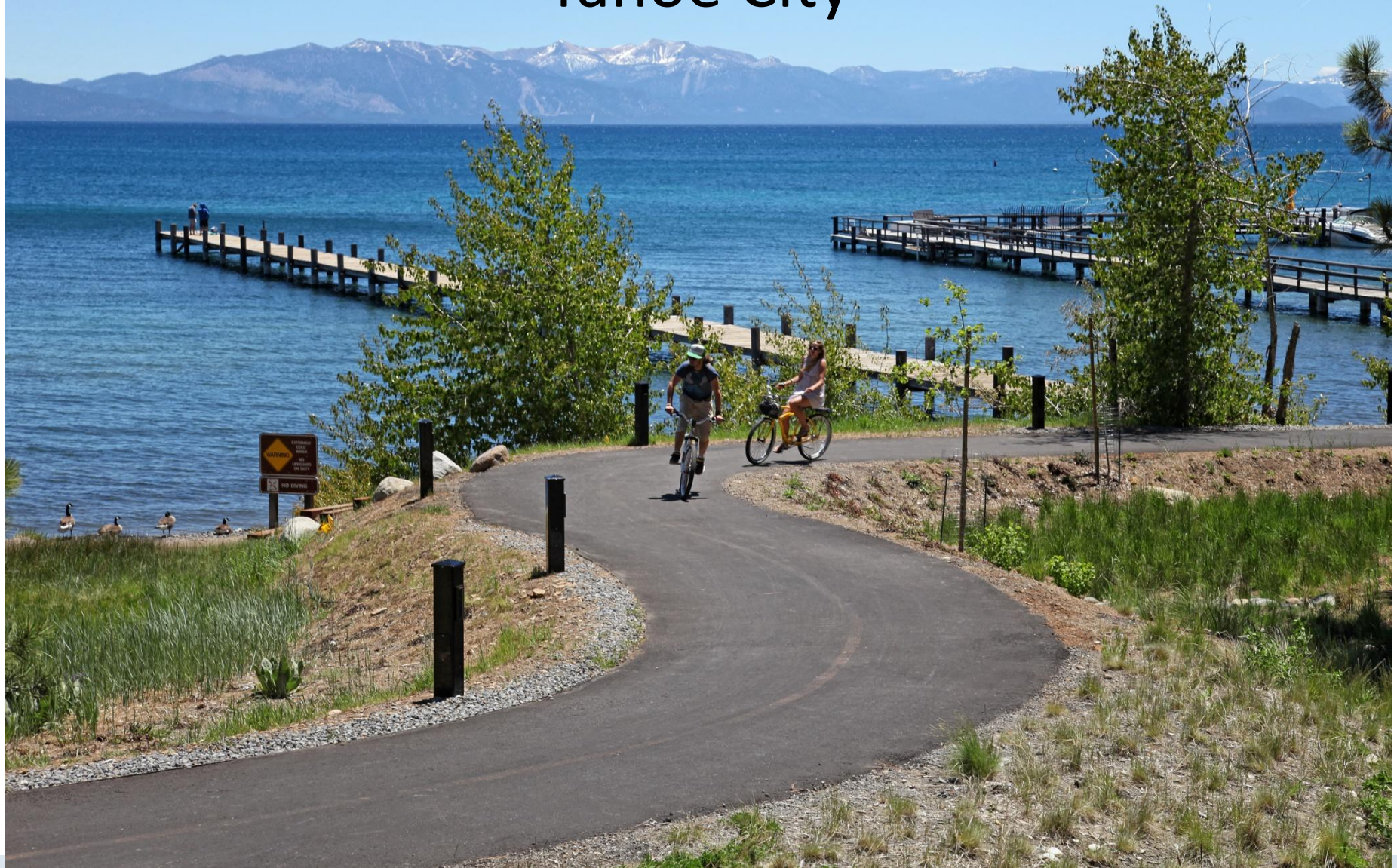
# Recreation
