CCHHS PHAT – Abstinence Only Program

- State Title V Abstinence Education Sub-grantee
- Evidence-based (delay in onset of sexual activity)
- Target Audience:
 - 9-12 year olds, and 13-15 year olds
 - Open to general population
 - Priority given to high-risk youth (Youth in foster care, alternative sentencing programs, etc.)

CCHHS PHAT – Abstinence Only Program: Year 1 Data

CCHHS PHAT – Comprehensive Curriculum

- State Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) Subgrantee (through NDPBH)
- Evidence-based program
- Pilot: May 1, 2014 September 30, 2014
- ▶ 30 Teens, ages 13–18
- Focus on high-risk youth (Youth in foster care, alternative sentencing programs, etc.)
- Utilize existing partnerships
- Build new partnerships

Barriers

- Initial partner organization apprehension
- Parent education
- Initial participant acceptance of program objectives

Successes

- Successful partnerships developed
- Curriculum presentations aid understanding
- Word-of-mouth has been key
 - Partner organizations
 - Parents
- Participants express acceptance of program objectives and enjoyment at the end of sessions

Moving Forward

- Expansion of programming to include PHAT –
 Comprehensive curriculum
- Increase partnerships with organizations to access target audience
- Lead or participate in projects to gather community data to guide further programs

Take Home Points

- Teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases among teens and young adults are still issues
- Role of Local Public Health is Prevention and care
 - Prevention of disease lessens the financial burden of treatment on the health care system
