Distinguished Committee Members:

On behalf of the nearly six million children in the U.S. with food allergies, the Food Allergy & Anaphylaxis Network (FAAN) and the Food Allergy Initiative (FAI) submit this letter in support of a request for legislation requiring schools to stock epinephrine auto-injectors in case of anaphylactic emergencies.

As you may know, it's now estimated that roughly two children in every classroom have a food allergy. This well-documented rise in the prevalence of food allergy among children requires our immediate attention. What's more, studies show that up to 25 percent of epinephrine administrations in school settings involve students whose food allergies were *previously undiagnosed*.

Food allergic reactions can range from mild to severe. The most severe reaction — anaphylaxis — is potentially life-threatening, and must be treated immediately with epinephrine, the only medication that can reverse the symptoms of anaphylaxis. Published studies clearly show that food allergy-related deaths result when there is a delay in the administration of epinephrine, or when epinephrine was not given at all. Schools must be prepared to act quickly in anaphylactic emergencies. Every second counts.

A stock epinephrine law would enable schools to equip epinephrine auto-injectors, allowing trained school personnel to access this lifesaving medication in emergencies in which a student does not have a prescribed device. This requirement could *save a child's life*.

Tragically, in the last two years, two students have died after experiencing fatal anaphylaxis while at school. Neither student had a prescribed epinephrine auto-injector at school.

We cannot allow another student to die because they did not have a prescribed epinephrine on campus.
