




Collaborative Conservation Successes

Greater Sage-grouse conservation


- FWS decision in September 2015 that ESA listing not warranted for Greater Sage-grouse
- "Significantly reduced threats" due to collaborative conservation efforts
- · Continued coordination with local, state, and federal partners
- Leadership in habitat improvement and protection
- Providing the best science for informed decisions
- Sage-grouse lek attendance increased 19% from the previous year. Statewide population estimate between 60,000-80,000 birds.
- Native amphibian species conservation
 - Two candidate amphibians determined "not warranted" for ESA listing due to collaborative conservation
 - Columbia Spotted Frog in central and northern NV
 - Relict Leopard Frog in southern NV
 - 12+ years of effort with conservation partners
 - State, federal, local government and private landowners




FY 2016 NDOW Operations Funding By Source

- Winnemucca office is moving from a small office building to a larger one and the full-time staff is necessary to assist with the front desk.

License Simplification-Major Budget Initiative: 4461 – E550, BDR Number 17A7021147

Objective: Resource Management and State Support Services

Funding: Sportsmen Revenue FY18: \$72,450 FY19: \$0

- The Department embarked on a comprehensive process over the past one and a half years to develop a simplified license structure that provides the customer with less confusion, greater simplicity, and ease of compliance.
- > Objectives of this effort:
 - Reduce the number of licenses and stamp requirements (from 28 to 7).
 - Provide a license that includes all relevant stamps and privileges, limit the types of special licenses and combine licenses with similar privileges.
 - Increase simplicity (such as, hunters and angler will no longer need to determine if they need specific state stamps for trout angling or upland game hunting).
 - Reduce inadvertent errors resulting in citations (such as, not holding the appropriate stamp).
 - Remain revenue neutral. The costs above are programming costs to implement the changes.
 - Greater value to the customer as licenses will be valid 365 days from date of purchase.
 - Ability to increase share of federal grants by increasing license certifications.

Video Conferencing Equipment 4461 – E720

Objective: State Support Services

Funding: Sportsmen Revenue FY18: \$80,888 FY19: \$3,192

- Internal Department communications linking Reno Headquarters, Las Vegas and Elko Offices.
- Provides commission support and allows constituency to attend most meetings without the need for travel.
- Needed for Wildlife Commission meeting communications.
- The Department continues to explore venues that can support the video conferencing of the meetings of the Nevada Board of Wildlife Commission.

Technology Expansion4461 – E722



- Urban Bear program conversion of the seasonal position to full-time.
- Urban wildlife conflicts have been increasing, and this position is intended to augment existing personnel to improve public safety.
- Of the 2,493 calls received in FY 2016, 597 (24%) addressed bears.

Urban Wildlife Management, continued

- Emphasis on urban bear and urban coyote issues
- Federal U.S. Fish and Wildlife grants do not permit funding urban wildlife or human-wildlife conflict activities
 - Urban development issue, not a hunting or wildlife management issue
 - Current activity is limited to response to public safety threats
- Education and outreach
 - Information campaigns & seasonal positions
- Equipment and supplies
 - Tools for wardens and biologists
- Fund staff time spent on urban wildlife
 - 1,353 staff hours in FY 2016
 - 14,181 miles travelled in response
 - 2,493 calls



Scientific Database

4464 - E551

Objective: Efficient and Responsive State Government

Funding: Federal Funds FY18: \$37,500 FY19: \$37,500

Sportsmen Revenue FY18: \$12,500 FY19: \$12,500

- A unified scientific database to allow better access to science based data stored in a variety of forms.
- Better and easier access to data for loading into the unified system.
- The current lack of centralized data and a lack of a data input and output standard makes it impossible to adapt to new and emerging technologies and to efficiently manage data resources.

Funding: Federal Funds FY18: \$22,987 FY19: \$0

Sportsmen Revenue FY18: \$7,663 FY19: \$0

- On-site equipment needed to allow staff to obtain biological samples from deceased or hunter-harvested wildlife species.
- On-site equipment needed to allow staff to perform physical inspections on animals when circumstances require additional analysis.
- Increases ability for agency to test and detect financially important wildlife diseases like respiratory disease in bighorn sheep or chronic wasting disease in elk or deer.




