NOTICE AND INTENT TO ADOPT REGULATIONS

THE NEVADA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO NAC 555.010 PERTAINING TO THE CLASSIFICATION OF WEEDS

Need and purpose of the proposed amendments:

The noxious weed list prevents economically and environmentally damaging weeds from entering the state in seed or nursery stock. It also allows the Department to take action on any infestation discovered in the state.

Economic effect of these proposed amendments on the businesses which it is to regulate:

1. Adverse effects:

2. Beneficial effects:

Preventing the entry of noxious weeds and taking quick action to eradicate any incipient infestations benefits the public. Noxious weeds cause severe economic and environmental losses to occur when they become established.
