Annual permits for food establishments and Plan review fees for food establishments

BED AND BREAKFAST FACILITIES

NAC 446.850 Applicable requirements.

- 1. A bed and breakfast facility which exceeds the capacity of 10 persons must comply with the provisions of NAC 446.845 to 446.860, inclusive, and all the requirements of NAC 446.050 to 446.625, inclusive *and NAC 446.830*, which are applicable to its operation.
- 2. If, in the opinion of the health authority, an imminent hazard to the public health will not result, a bed and breakfast facility which does not exceed the capacity of 10 persons and which does not fully comply with all the requirements of NAC 446.050 to 446.625, inclusive, may operate if the preparation and service of food are restricted and deviations from full compliance are covered by the provisions of NAC 446.845 to 446.860, inclusive.

SMALL BUSINESS IMPACT STATEMENT

Amendments to Fees by the Bureau of Health Protection Services Contained in Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 446.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO EXISTING REGULATIONS provide for fee increases to allow the Bureau of Health Protection Services (BHPS), a bureau within the State Health Division to recover the new and increased costs associated with issuing annual permits and reviewing plans for food establishments.

This is the Small Business Impact Statement required under Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 233B.0608 and 233B.0609. A small business is defined in Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 233B.0382 as a "business conducted for profit which employs fewer than 150 full-time or part-time employees." This statement only applies to businesses meeting the aforementioned definition.

The State Board of Health's (SBOH) policy in addressing fees for business operators regulated under its authority is to minimize the impact by having fees decreased where possible and increased where necessary in a graduated schedule based upon actual cost of performing work.

The proposed amendments NAC 446 will change fees associated with permits and plan reviews for food establishments. Annual permit fees for food establishments will increase from \$115 to \$150 for the first 40 seats plus \$1.50 for each additional seat and for each window of a drive-in from \$30 to \$55. Annual permit fees for a caterer will increase from \$115 to \$125. New fees for a kitchen in a bed and breakfast, a school, and a jail, prison or other correctional facility is \$50; a new annual permit fee for a kitchen in a child care facility serving more than 10 individuals is \$25 for a kitchen in a school. A permit fee for a barbeque will be \$110, for a kitchen operated by a religious, charitable or non-profit organization of less than 500 square feet is \$115, and of greater than 500 square feet is \$130. Fees for wholesale or retail services for food increase from \$115 to \$150 for an area of less than 1,000 square feet, \$180 to 210 for 1,000 to 3,000 square feet, \$280 to \$300 for more than 5,000 square feet. A new fee for temporary food establishments operated by a religious, charitable or non-profit organization not on its own premises is \$25. A fee of \$70 per label will be charged for reviewing a label for a food processing establishments. Fees for mobile units will be increased as follows: for an annual permit from \$100 to \$125; for reviewing plans from \$100 to \$155; and for reviewing remodeling plans, from \$60 to \$135. A new fee for a "certificate of free sale" will e charged at \$20 per certificate.

Background

The Health Division receives no funding from the federal government for the purposes of administering the regulations pertaining to food programs. Funding for this purpose is appropriated by the Nevada State Legislature. However, this State funding does not cover the actual costs by BHPS performing these statutory responsibilities. To meet this funding shortfall, the Nevada State Legislature has historically required that regulated entities pay an annual permit fee to the BHPS. In State Fiscal Year 04 (July 1, 2003 - June 30, 2004) and State Fiscal Year 05 (July 1, 2004 - June 30, 2005), the Legislature has budgeted a fee increase of approximately \$104,000 to merely cover the existing level functions performed by this section of BHPS.

The proposed amendments are necessary to provide additional supplemental funding for the BHPS. The impact to operators of food establishments will be an increase in their permit costs and better service due to environmental health specialists being better equipped and better trained.

1. A description of the manner in which comment was solicited from affected small businesses, a summary of their response and an explanation of the manner in which other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Letters were sent to all affected establishments as well as those known interested individuals and local health authorities advising them of the potential fee changes and providing notice of public workshops. Copies of the proposed amendments will be posted at the Health Division's web site. Public workshops will be held in October 2003; copies of proposed amendments will be provided to those individuals and businesses, which have requested direct service.

2. The estimated economic effect of the proposed regulation on the small business which it is to regulate including, without limitation, both adverse and beneficial effects and both direct and indirect effects.

Direct Adverse and Beneficial Effects

A possible direct adverse effect may be that some small businesses may experience increased costs for permits, and for plan reviews of proposed or remodeled. A beneficial direct effect is that establishments will be provided with better equipped and better trained environmental health specialists that conduct their plan reviews and inspections.

The estimated direct and indirect beneficial economic effects of the proposed fee changes on affected small businesses cannot be quantified. The direct beneficial effect cannot be determined. The overall indirect effect of the proposed fees will provide adequate funding for better protection of the health and safety of the public by providing better equipped and better trained inspectors, thereby decreasing the risk to public health and subsequently decreasing associated medical costs, pain and suffering, and a negative impact on local economies that could result.

Direct and Indirect Costs

The estimated direct adverse economic effect of the proposed fee increases on establishments is not expected to be large and will primarily occur in the plan review process and the annual permits for establishments. Indirect costs may be incurred by the customers of those establishments in that the costs might be passed through rates/fees for service or products. Costs would be determined on a case-by-case basis.

3. A description of the methods that BHPS considered to reduce the impact of the proposed regulation on small businesses and statement regarding whether the agency actually used those methods.

In considering methods to reduce the impact of the proposed regulation on small businesses as required by NRS 233B.0608 2 (b) (1), the agency shall consider simplifying the proposed regulation.

This fee proposal does not propose new regulations for compliance other than creation of some new fees as described above. The impact of these fee increases on small businesses has been minimized or eliminated to the extent possible. New fees are implemented, or existing ones increased in those areas where BHPS has experienced or expects increased activity and, therefore, increased costs.

In considering methods to reduce the impact of the proposed regulation on small businesses as required by NRS 233B.0608 2 (b) (2), the agency shall consider establishing different standards of compliance for a small business.

This fee proposal does not propose new regulations for compliance.

In considering methods to reduce the impact of the proposed regulation on small businesses as required by NRS 233B.0608 (2)(b)(3), the agency shall consider modifying a fee or fine set forth in the regulation so that a small business is authorized to pay a lower fee or fine.

The use of per seat fees is built into the fees of food establishments. Thereby the smaller establishments will pay a smaller fee than the larger establishments. The fee is based upon actual time and effort spent by staff conducting the oversight of the environmental health program.

4. The estimated cost to the agency for enforcement of the proposed regulation.

The estimated cost to the agency for enforcement of the proposed regulation is minimal and will be handled through the existing administrative process.

5. Total amount BHPS expects to collect from any fees and the manner in which the money will be used.

The total amount of revenue expected to be collected from this fee proposal is estimated at \$686,245 (\$1,590), an increase of about \$178,835 (1,470) over existing revenue.

6. An explanation of why any duplicative or more stringent provisions than federal, state or local standards regulating the same activity are necessary.

The proposed fee changes do not overlap or duplicate any federal, state or local regulations.
