ADOPTED TEMPORARY REGULATION OF THE COMMISSION ON PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS IN EDUCATION

AUTHORITY: NRS 391.019

NAC 391.378 Qualifications for Teaching Pupils Who Have Autism. (NRS 391.109, 391.032) [[Effective through June 30, 2005.]] Effective through June 30, 2008.

- 1. Before teaching pupils, ages 3 to 21, inclusive, who have autism, a person must hold:
 - (a) An endorsement issued pursuant to this section; or
- (b) A special license with an endorsement in special education prescribed in NAC 391.343, 391.350, 391.356, 391.360, 391.363, or 391.370 and must complete a program of preparation leading to licensing in this field within 3 years after beginning to teach such pupils.
- 2. To receive the endorsement, the person must:
- (a) Have completed a program of preparation for teaching pupils who have autism, which has been approved by the Board;
- (b) Hold a license or certificate, issued by another state, with an endorsement to teach pupils who have autism:
- (c) Hold a bachelor's or master's degree in the education of pupils who have autism and have completed 8 semester hours of student teaching, equivalent field experience or 1 year of verifiable teaching experience in special education; or
 - (d) Have:
- (1) Met the requirements for endorsement prescribed in NAC 391.343, 391.350, 391.360, 391.360, 391.363, or 391.370;
 - (2) One year of verifiable teaching experience with pupils who have autism; and
 - (3) Completed course work in the following areas:
 - (I) Behavior management;
 - (II) Speech and language development;
 - (III) Assistive technology, or alternative or augmentative communication;
 - (IV) Characteristics of pupils who have autism; and
 - (V) Curriculum development or methods and strategies for teaching pupils who have autism.

[1. Before teaching pupils, ages 3 to 21, inclusive, who have autism, a person must hold an endorsement issued pursuant to this section.

INFORMATIONAL STATEMENT

The following statement is submitted for adopted amendments to Nevada Administrative Code 391:

1. A description of how public comment was solicited, a summary of public response, and explanation how other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Notice of Workshop to Solicit Comments on Proposed Regulations was sent to approximately 100 individuals and educational organizations. One workshop was held on March 10, 2005. There were comments from the public.

The Notice of Intent to Act Upon a Regulation for public hearing and adoption of the proposed revisions to NAC 391.036 were sent to approximately 100 individuals and educational organizations. The public hearing was conducted on March 10, 2005, to provide the opportunity for comments by affected parties and the public. There were comments from the public. The Commission adopted the proposed regulation.

3. A description of how comment was solicited from affected businesses, a summary of the response and an explanation how other interested parties may obtain a copy of the summary.

Comments were solicited through the workshop notice of February 3, 2005, and the public hearing notice of February 3, 2005. At the March 10, 2005 Workshop to Solicit

Comments, there were public comments to the proposed language revisions. At the March 10, 2005 Public Hearing there were public comments to the proposed language.

Summary of Comments: Workshop/Public Hearing Comments:

- a) Mary Ann Gibbs, Clark County School District, indicated that there is a shortage of autism teachers and the Autism Option Program will sunset on June 30, 2005 and encouraged the Commission to extend the date for the Autism Option Program. Ms. Gibbs stated that there is high need for the Autism Option Program. Ms. Gibbs stated that the Option Program is working well in Clark County.
- b) Gloria Dopf, Deputy Superintendent for the Nevada Department of Education, on behalf of the Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) requested that the Commission consider an extension of the sunset clause until June 30, 2008 and then to review how the Program is impacting the Districts.
- c) Kyle Higgins, Special Education Program at UNLV, stated that licensed teachers who have a resource room license are then enrolled in the Autism Option Program. In the past three years, 94 individuals have completed the Autism Option Program. The Program is a one year program and individuals are mentored during that period.

The Commission on Professional Standards in Public Education adopted the proposed regulation language at the public hearing held March 10, 2005. The reason for adopting the amendment to the regulation was to extend the sunset date to June 30, 2008 to continue the Option Program for Autism.

The beneficial economic effect allows school districts to continue to hire teachers and place them in a Option Program for Autism and this allows licensed teachers to remain in those classrooms. There is <u>no</u> estimated economic effect on the public, either adversely or beneficially, nor immediate or long term.
