

AUTHORITY: §1, NRS 703.025, 704.210 and 704.741.

A REGULATION relating to energy; designating renewable energy zones; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Section 1. Chapter 704 of NAC is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to read as follows:

1. The Commission designates as renewable energy zones those zones identified on the following map:



- 2. A person may petition the Commission to request a revision to the designated renewable energy zones.
- 3. As used in this section, "renewable energy zones" has the meaning ascribed to it in NRS 704.741.

NOTICE OF ADOPTION OF REGULATION

The Public Utilities Commission adopted regulations assigned LCB File No. R146-09, (Docket No. 09-07011) which pertain to chapter 704 of the Nevada Administrative Code on December 21, 2009. A copy of the regulations as adopted is attached.

The PUC determined that the proposed regulations do not impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a small business or restrict the formation, operation or expansion of a small business. In making this determination, the PUC adopted the findings of the Regulatory Operations Staff, which conducted a Delphi Method exercise to determine the impacts. The Delphi Method is a systematic, interactive, forecasting method based on independent inputs of selected experts.
