


HOW TO

REGISTER TO VOTE IN NEVADA



Nevadans have several options for registering to vote before or on election day, including automatic registration (with an opt-out option) when transacting business at the DMV.

MAKE SURE YOU HAVE VALID I.D. AND PROOF OF RESIDENCE.

Identification may include any ONE of the following:

- Nevada driver's license or I.D. card
- Passport

- Tribal or military I.D. card
- Social Security number

AND

Proof of residence may include any ONE of the following:

- Nevada driver's license or I.D. card
- Utility bill

- Property tax assessment
- · Rental agreement

Note: This is not intended as a complete list of acceptable documentation, and may not apply to same-day registration. For more details, see the Secretary of State's website.



CHOOSE A WAY TO REGISTER.

In person

Unless they opt out, Nevadans are automatically registered to vote when they transact business at the DMV.

Forms are also available and submittable at:

- Local election offices
- Various public assistance agencies
- College campuses

In addition, Nevadans may register in person at polling places on election day or during early voting.

Online

Register anytime before or on election day at: www.nvsos.gov/SOSVoterServices/start.aspx

By mail

<u>Download</u> or pick up a form, and mail it to your <u>local election official</u>.

Registration drives

You may submit your form through the drive or independently.

▶ Effective Absentee System for Elections (EASE)

Some Nevada voters—including voters who have disabilities, live abroad, are military members or families of military members, or are tribal members living on a reservation or colony—can use the <u>EASE</u>) to register. See the <u>Secretary of State's website</u> for more information.

RESPOND PROMPTLY IF CONTACTED BY AN ELECTION OFFICIAL.

Illegible handwriting, typos, and mistakes happen. If your local election official contacts you with questions or requests more information, responding promptly can ensure you are registered quickly and accurately.



CHECK YOUR VOTER REGISTRATION STATUS.

Your information should be accurate on the voter registration card you receive in the mail from your local election official. If there is an error, or if you do not receive a card, contact the appropriate county clerk's or registrar's office. You can also check your voter registration online through the <u>Secretary of State's website</u>.
