Re: Assembly Bill 84 (2019 Legislative Session) – 2024 Annual Report

Assembly Bill 84 (2019 Legislative Session) authorized “the State Board of Finance [to] issue general obligation bonds of the State of Nevada in a total face amount of not more than \$217,000,000 to protect, preserve and obtain the benefit of the property and natural resources of the State of Nevada.” Assembly Bill 84 also requires an annual “report regarding all program and projects that received money from the [Consolidated Bond Interest and Redemption Fund] account...during the immediately preceding calendar year.” This is the Conserve Program Annual Report for Calendar Year 2024.

Conserve Nevada Bond Status:

The Nevada Legislature provided for the issuance of \$20,000,000 in general obligation bonds with the passage of Assembly Bill 492 (2021). An additional \$43,309,936 was authorized for issuance with the passage of Assembly Bill 1 of the 34th (2023) Special Session. On October 26, 2021, the Board of Finance authorized the issuance of \$15,000,000 in open space bonds. The Treasurer's Office closed these bonds on December 7, 2021. An additional bond totaling \$5,000,000 was issued on December 7, 2022, completing the bond sales authorized through AB 492. In November 2023, the Board of Finance authorized the issuance of \$43,309,936 in bonds in accordance with AB 1 (2023). These bonds were sold on November 6, 2023. To date the Conserve Nevada Program has received a total of \$65,623,254.93 in bond proceeds.

Overview of Current bonds Funds:

Conserve Nevada Program recipients have expended \$20,214,355.79 in bond proceeds to date. In coordination with the Treasurer’s Office the program has focused on the expenditure of older bond proceeds prior to the expenditure of newer bonds. This is done to avoid arbitrage penalties on bond proceeds. Arbitrage rules require tax exempt bonds to expend 85% of their proceeds within three years of issuance. Bond 2021C and 2021D reached their three years from issuance on December 7, 2024. These bonds met the 85% expense threshold.

Nevada Division of State Parks (NDSP):

NDSP was allocated \$30,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84. To date \$14,362,985.11 in bond proceeds have been obligated by NDSP through Bond 2021C, 2022F, and 2023B. NDSP has expended \$5,556,806.09 in bond proceeds to date. A majority of funding currently authorized for the Nevada Division of State Parks is dedicated to the Valley of Fire Visitors Center Construction (\$8,000,000).

- Cave Creek Dam Restoration (1600-17): Over the lifetime of the project the Nevada Division of State Parks has expended \$1,600,000.00 on Cave Creek Dam (FY2024: \$215,340.35). This project provides partial funding to stabilize and reconstruct Cave Creek Dam at Cave Lake State Park. Cave Creek Dam is owned by the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW). The 32-acre reservoir supports fishing, boating, swimming, hiking, camping, and various other outdoor recreation activities in White Pine County. The dam’s replacement is a partnership between NDSP, NDOW, and State Public Works and will restore outdoor recreation and fishery activities at the lake.



- Ice Age Fossils State Park Phase 2 (2100-03): NDSP has expended \$2,017,845.57 on this project (FY2024: \$890,215.14). This funding is being matched with \$3,500,000 from the Helmsley Charitable Trust. This funding is being utilized for the design and development of park trails and trail amenities, construction of boardwalks, interpretative displays, picnic pavilions, overlooks, shaded seating areas, and landscape around the visitor center and trailheads. Ice Age Fossils State Park is a 315-acre park that features a portion of the upper Las Vegas Wash that is rich in paleontological and historical resources. During the Pleistocene this park was home to species like the Columbian mammoth, American lion, camelops, ancient llamas, dire wolves, and ground sloths. Abundant fossils were discovered on this site as part of the "Big Dig" in 1962-1963.



- Valley of Fire Visitors Center Design/Engineering (3400-03): NDSP has expended \$1,085,540.00 (FY2024: \$280,792.54) towards the design of the new Valley of Fire Visitor Center. This project is the first phase to design and construct a new visitor center at Valley of Fire State Park. This design would address increased visitation, the park's natural resource scarcity, public safety, and would provide a new interpretive center to educate and welcome a new generation of visitors and Nevadans alike to Valley of Fire State Park.



- Valley of Fire Visitors Center Construction (3401-03): NDSP has expended \$823,130.30 of the \$8,000,000 obligated towards the construction of the Valley of Fire Visitors Center (FY2024: \$26,217.10, FY2025 (TD): \$796,913.20). This funding is being matched with \$7,000,000 from the Helmsley Charitable Trust. Groundbreaking for this project was on April 22, 2024.



Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW):

The Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) was allocated \$30,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84. To date \$6,850,001.09 in bond proceeds have been appropriated to NDSP through B21C, B22F, and B23B. To date NDOW has expended \$6,483,771.10.

- Cave Creek Dam Restoration (4000-17): Nevada Department of Wildlife has expended \$4,005,147.39 (TD) on Cave Creek Dam (FY2024: \$2,221,348.40, FY2025(TD): \$1,164,151.01). This project provides partial funding to stabilize and reconstruct Cave Creek Dam at Cave Lake State Park. Cave Creek Dam is owned by the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW). The 32-acre reservoir supports fishing, boating, swimming, hiking, camping, and various other outdoor recreation activities in White Pine County. The dam's replacement is a partnership between NDSP, NDOW, and State Public Works and will restore outdoor recreation and fishery activities at the lake.



- Desert Creek Ranch Conservation Easement (4001-11): NDOW has expended \$50,000.00 on this project. This project leveraged \$8,885,417 in partner match funding. The project conserves an essential piece of private land for long-term conservation of the Bi-State sage-grouse distinct population segment and other wildlife species of Western Nevada. The Desert Creek Ranch is composed of 1,228 acres of irrigated pasture, meadow and riparian systems that provide significant breeding and brood rearing habitat for the Bi-state sage grouse. A lek is located on the property.



- Spring Creek Partial Recirculating Aquaculture Feasibility Study (4014-05): NDOW has expended \$123,613 on this project. (FY2024: \$113,213.00, FY2025(TD): \$10,400.00) This project would fund the design and engineering of a partial recirculating aquaculture system. This would allow for the filtering and reuse of water in the fish rearing process. In addition to conserving water this system is critical during drought periods when there are low flows in Spring Creek and Snake Creek.



- Mason Valley Fish Hatchery Cooling Tower (4013-11): NDOW has expended \$260,000 on this project (FY2024: \$213,750.00, FY2025(TD): \$46,250.00). Mason Valley Fish Hatchery is located within the Mason Valley Wildlife Management Area north of Yerington. The cooling tower at the facility is utilized for the aeration and cooling of water that comes into the hatchery. The cooling tower is currently at the end of its useful life. This project will refurbish the existing cooling tower. This work will include media replacement, motors, bearings, belts and bushings, clean and seal of five Baltimore Air Coil cooling towers. This major overhaul will ensure the continued operation of the hatchery.

Las Vegas Springs Preserve:

The Las Vegas Springs Preserve was allocated \$30,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84. To date \$4,588,051.41 in bond proceeds have been appropriated to the Springs Preserve through B21D and B23C. The Springs Preserve has expended \$2,495,767.11. These funds have been allocated toward the design phases of the interior and exterior remodel of the Springs Preserve OriGen Museum. The current funding includes design and plans for a future remodel. This includes major thematic and museum updates to include education around the Colorado River, sustainability, and the development of an immerse maker space area for youth education.

- OriGen Museum East & Middle Exhibit Design/Engineering (5000-03): The Springs Preserve has expended \$1,999,999.40 (FY2024: \$978,867.91, FY2025(TD): \$361,608.99) on this project. The interior remodel of Springs Preserve OriGen building- East and Middle galleries will substantially overhaul two gallery spaces within the OriGen building. This improvement project will result in exhibition space(s) that feature educational and immersive experiences focused on science and sustainability in Southern Nevada. Explorations will

include Mojave Desert ecosystems, adaptations, and conservation, as well as the Colorado River's vital role as a threatened natural resource for Southern Nevada and the West.



- OriGen Museum West Gallery and Outdoor Design/Engineering Phase 1 (5001-03): The Springs Preserve has expended \$465,767.71 on this project (FY2025(TD): \$495,767.71). The remodel of OriGen Museum Complex at the Springs Preserve is a capital improvement project that will substantially overhaul three gallery spaces and outdoor exhibit space. The improvement project will result in exhibition spaces that feature educational and immersive experiences focused on the challenges facing natural resources, told through the story of the Colorado River, and the science and technology needed to address those challenges.



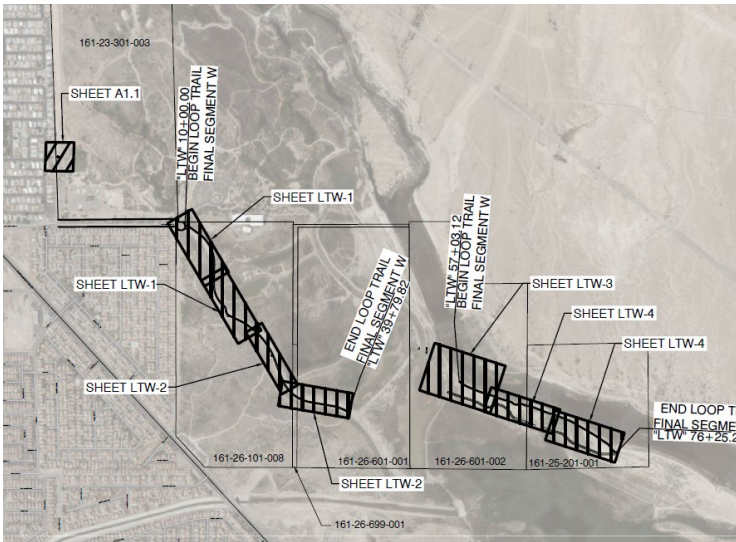
- Design Development of Interior/Exterior Remodel of Springs Preserve OriGen Building – West Exhibit Gallery and Outdoor Exhibit Space Phase 2(5002-03): Springs Preserve has obligated \$2,000,000 towards this project. During the design development phase of the West Gallery and Outdoor Exhibit Space an exhibit design firm will work with the Springs Preserve, focus groups, scholars, media specialists, graphic designers, lighting specialists, and exhibit fabricators, to develop the concept, schematics and design of the museum’s west gallery and outdoor exhibit space. The goal of this phase is to develop explorative experiences that engage visitors in scientific principles that support effective resource management, conservation, and sustainability. Visitors will leave these experiences with a better understanding and/or piqued interest in how science plays a critical role in current and future resource conservation and protection. Exhibition spaces will include cutting-edge, multi-media interactives as well as hands-on manipulatives that allow for immersive experiences and deeper exploration into myriad topics within the exhibition themes.



Clark County Wetlands Parks and Lower Las Vegas Wash:

Clark County was allocated \$10,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84 for the Clark County Wetlands Park and the Lower Las Vegas Wash. To date \$3,000,000 in bond proceeds have been appropriated to Clark County Wetlands Park from bond B21C, B22F, and B23B. Clark County Wetlands Park has expended \$598,682.74.

- Wetlands Loop Trail Phase 1 (6000-03): The Clark County Wetlands Parks has expended \$598,682.74 of \$2,000,000. (FY2024: \$486,609.23, FY2025(TD): \$112,073.21) This project would design the final 4.9-mile paved segment of the Wetlands Loop Trail and would begin construction on 1.7 miles of paved asphalt trail.



- Wetlands Park Barrier & Rock Enhancement (6001-03): The Clark County Wetlands Park has obligated \$1,037,770 to install barriers, fencing, and rock to protect the wetlands and natural resources. This barrier will prevent motorized vehicles from entering sensitive areas of the park.



Nevada Division of Museums and History (NDMH):

The Nevada Division of Museums and History was allocated \$30,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84. To date \$26,309,936.70 in bond proceeds have been appropriated to the Division of Museums and History through B21D and B23C. The Division of Museums and History has expended \$2,086,648.45. A majority of funding currently allocated to the Division of Museums and History is allocated to the Boulder City Railroad Museum Visitors Center.

- Boulder City Railroad Museum Visitors Center Advance Planning (7000-03): The NDMH has expended \$1,292,376.34 (FY 2024: \$191,466.37) on this project. The Boulder City Railroad Museum & Visitor's Center advanced planning is being managed by State Public Works and consists of development of construction documents for a 9,700 square-foot visitors center,

orientation plaza, train loading platform and facility parking for the State Railroad Museum in Boulder City. This facility will accommodate visitor services, ticketing, an information center, retail sales, museum interpretive space, and staff offices. This world-class museum will provide a new connection between Boulder City and Henderson and will become part of the gateway to outdoor recreation resources in the area in collaboration with the Boulder City Adventure Center.



- East Ely Railroad Museum Freight Depot Advanced Planning (7001-17):
This project was budgeted for \$837,089.00 and has expended \$716,869.82 (\$193,189.18 FY2024). This project is being managed by State Public Works and will complete the planning and design phase for the remodel and renovation of the East Ely Freight Barn. This remodel will include community events space, artifact storage, and exhibit space, and will include structural fire protection, building insulation, and an HVAC update for the building. The East Ely Railroad Freight Barn is 12,865 square feet and was constructed in 1906. It served as part of the Ely Depot of the former Kennecott Mine Railway until 1983.



- Nevada State Museums Deferred Maintenance Projects (7002-19):
This project was budgeted for \$291,755.00 and has expended (FY2024: \$72,787.89). This project would replace outdoor lighting at the Lost City Museum; repaint Union Pacific dining car 4813 at the Boulder City Railroad Museum; re-design the Carson City Railroad Museum store; install a jib crane at the Carson City Railroad Museum; repair archive shelving at the Nevada Historical Society; repair the HVAC at the Nevada State Museum in Carson City; replace a door at the Nevada State Museum in Carson City; restore windows at the East Ely Depot; mobilize and move collections at the East Ely Depot; and improve security systems at the Nevada State Museum Las Vegas.



- Boulder City Railroad Museum Visitors Center Construction:
This project has \$23,309,936 in bond funding budgeted. To date this project has expended \$4,614.40 (FY2024: \$482.65, FY2025(TD): \$4,131.75). This project faced bidding delays due to a bid bust. The project broke ground on December 16, 2024, and is being managed by State Public Works. This project will need to be completed by 2026 to avoid arbitrage.



Nevada Division of State Lands Historic Buildings:

The Nevada Division of State Lands was allocated \$5,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84. To date \$2,000,000 in bond proceeds from B21D have been appropriated to the Division of State Lands.

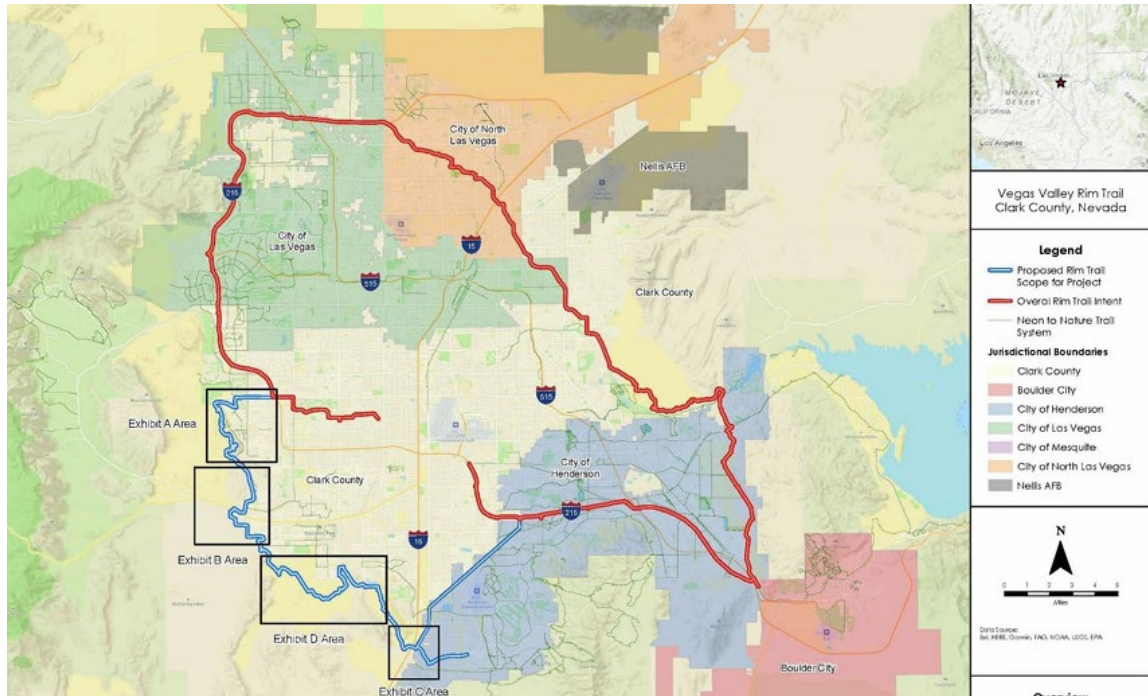
- Caliente Depot Exterior Restoration (8000-10): The City of Caliente has expended \$2,000,000.00 on this project. This project is to restore the Caliente Railroad Depot. Built in 1923 and designed by architects John and Donald Parkinson (who also designed Union Station in Los Angeles, California). The Caliente Depot served as the midway point for the Los Angeles and Salt Lake Railroad (later: Union Pacific Railroad). This depot included a passenger waiting room, railroad offices, a lunch counter, ticket office, and hotel. Restoration work will focus on the exterior restorations of the stucco, replacement of the original east arcade, structural repair of soffits and columns, restoration of windows and doors, and would bring the Depot back to its original paint colors and historic appearance.



Clark County Vegas Valley Rim Trail:

Clark County was allocated \$10,000,000 in bond authority under AB 84 for design and construction of the Las Vegas Valley Rim Trail. \$1,000,000 in bond proceeds from B21C and B22F were appropriated to Clark County. Clark County faced significant challenges in bidding the project out to a nonprofit. This was due to the specialization required for this project. Given the challenges faced by this project the initial funding award was reduced by \$588,050 to \$411,950 after discussions with County leadership. Clark County has expended \$411,950.00 to date and is seeking funding for the design engineering phase.

- Vegas Valley Rim Trail Phase 1 Planning (8500-03): Clark County has expended \$411,950.00 on this phase of the project. The Las Vegas Valley Rim Trail (VVRT) planning phase is being managed by Clark County Planning under contract to Get Outdoors Nevada (Outside Las Vegas Foundation). The project is developing a cohesive vision and planning document for the development of the VVRT. This document identifies potential trail alignments and preliminary right-of-way analysis, connectivity to the community, preliminary planning, and segment costs. Competitive Grants and Project Status:

Open Competitive Grants are authorized in AB 84, Sec. 2 (8-10). These subsections provide for \$10,000,000 in grant authority for projects on the Carson and Truckee River, \$5,000,000 for the Lake Tahoe Path System from Sand Harbor to Spooner Summit, and \$57,500,000 for open grants. Open grants can be utilized for wildfire mitigation/restoration, outdoor recreation facilities and trails, acquisition of land for conservation/recreation, protection of wetlands and riparian systems, and acquisition of sagebrush ecosystems credits. In December 2023 the program opened a call for grants. The program received 48 grant applications totaling \$18,599,063.22. The program has additionally received over 56 pre-applications for the next grant round. To date the program has awarded \$6,736,711.30 in competitive grants.

Open Grants: (\$5,638,214.30 awarded to date)

- Nevada Division of Forestry Monte Neva Paintbrush Acquisition (9600-17): This project has expended \$330,730.30. This project acquired 160 acres of land 28 miles North of Ely, NV. The property contains historic elements and a geologically unique hot springs. This site and the adjacent parcel are home to roughly 90% of known Monte Neva Paintbrush. The Monte Neva Paintbrush (*Castilleja salsuginosa*) is considered a critically imperiled plant and a candidate for potential federal listing. Monte Neva Paintbrush is native to Nevada and has been declared critically endangered and threatened with extinction by the State Forester Firewarden pursuant to NRS 527.010. In order to preserve and protect the species this site was acquired and will be managed by the Nevada Division of State Parks in conjunction with the Nevada Division of Forestry.



- Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation South Schell Acquisition (9601-17): This project has expended \$250,000.00. Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation (RMEF) in partnership with the Nevada Department of Wildlife (NDOW) leveraged this funding with \$1,290,000 from matching sources to purchase 1,719.87 acres in White Pine County. The property has invaluable wildlife habitat as it serves as crucial summer and transitional habitat for mule deer and elk, brood rearing habitat for sage-grouse, priority year-round habitat for blue grouse, and nesting habitat for a variety of migratory birds and raptors. The property consists of inholdings with the U.S. Forest Service (USFS) and Bureau of Land Management (BLM). It is within Hunt Unit 111 and a very small portion of 222. The property consists mainly of high elevation mountain shrub habitat, several large mahogany stands, and numerous seeps and springs. This property will be integrated into the Steptoe Valley Wildlife Management Area.

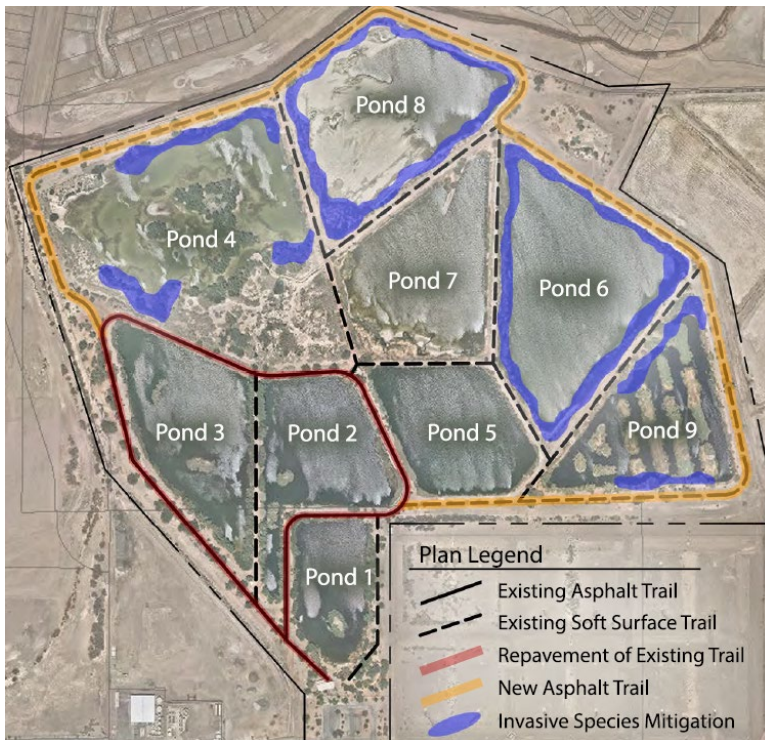


- Conservation Fund Leslie Steamboat Buckwheat Acquisition (9602-16): This project was awarded \$900,000.00. This project will acquire approximately 13.47 acres of land in Washoe County, Nevada. This acquisition will acquire habitat containing Steamboat buckwheat (*Eriogonum ovalifolium* var. *williamsiae*) a critical endangered plant species.
- The Nevada Land Trust Eastern Sierra Nevada Project Acquisitions (9603-18): This project was awarded \$ 682,500.00. This project establishes 3 conservation easements on forested properties along the Eastern Sierra Front to protect forest health and prime wildlife habitat. These easements are critical to mitigate fire risk and to protect watershed health.

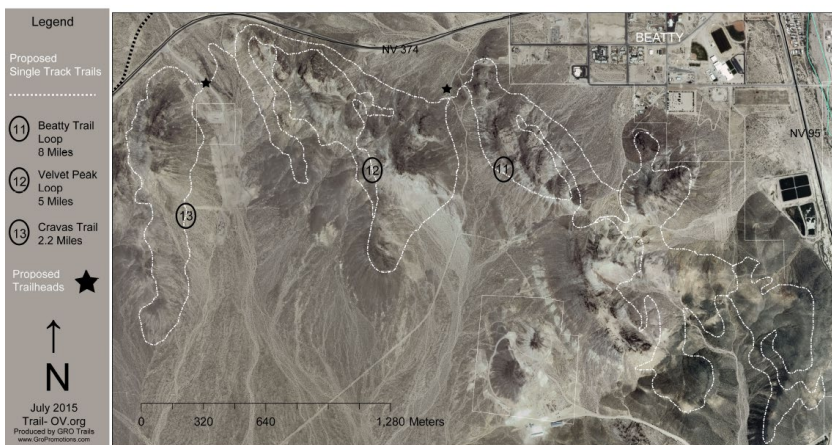


- City of Henderson Bird Viewing Park Trail Improvements (9604-03): This project was awarded \$400,000.00. The project area encompasses nearly 100 acres of basins, lagoons

and evaporating ponds for bird habitat. The project will support improved pathway accessibility through improvements to 2 miles of trail within the park. This will enhance access while improving this recreational resource.



- Storm OHV Beatty Trail Development (9605-13): This project was awarded \$100,000.00. This project seeks to complete the remaining planning and review for the construction of 65 miles of world class trails and trailheads in Beatty, NV. This project will serve as major economic development project and includes the initial construction of a segment of 15. 2 miles of trail near the town of Beatty.

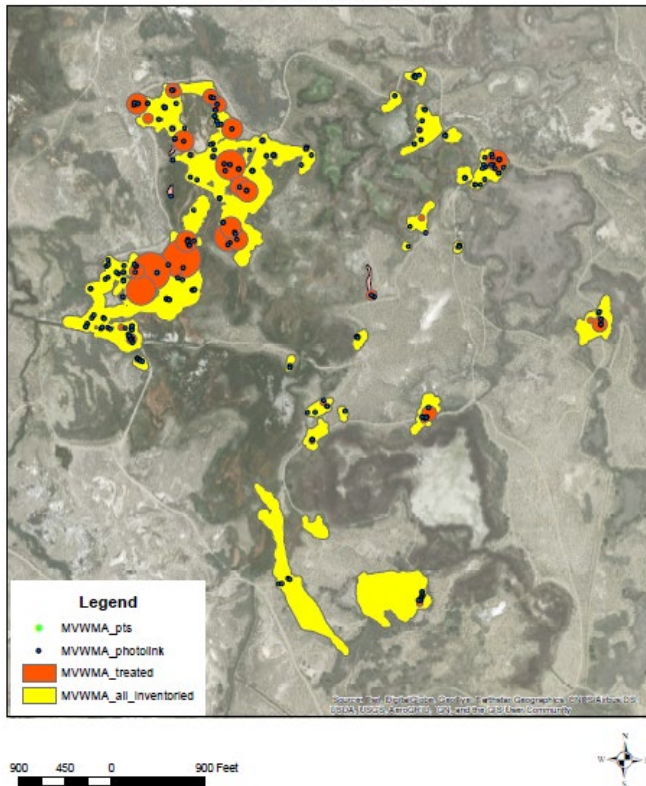


- Douglas County Fairgrounds Master Plan Development (9606-04): This project was awarded \$45,000.00. This project will support the development of a Douglas County Fairground Master Plan. This plan will include multi-use facilities hosting regional events. The complex will include a 1,500-seat grandstand, horse barn, pavilion, and other amenities for recreational and public usage. The 81-acre site is adjacent to 600 acres owned by the Bureau of Land Management, which may be available for site expansion and improved access to public lands.
- National Forest Foundation Tahoe Meadows Boardwalk Project (9607-16): This project was awarded \$107,528.37. The project will support the National Forest Foundation and its partnership with the Humboldt-Toiyabe National Forest (HTNF) to complete the reconstruction of the Upper Meadows Loop of the Tahoe Meadows Boardwalk. Located on the HTNF, the Tahoe Meadows boardwalk is a popular trail in the Carson Ranger District

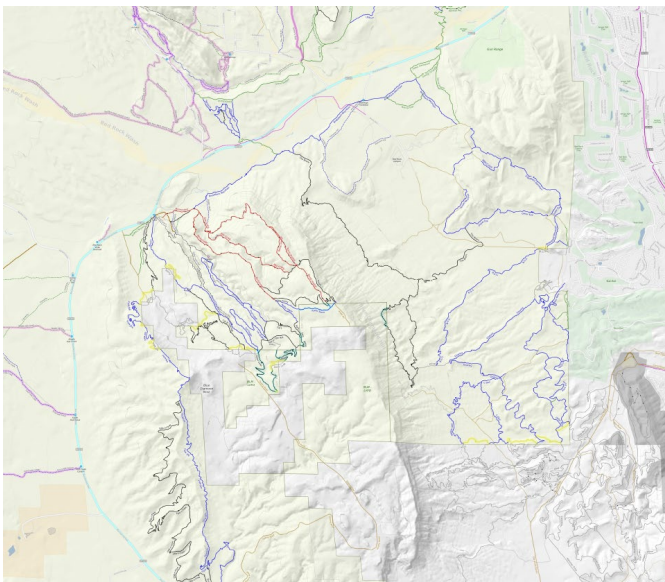


- Mason Valley Wildlife Management Area Tamarisk Mitigation Project (9608-11): This project was awarded \$29,999.24. This project will inventory, map, treat, and control tamarisk in the wetlands of the Mason Valley Wildlife Management Area managed by the Nevada Department of Wildlife. These activities will protect habitat and the wetland environment while enhancing the habitat for fishery, big game, and waterfowl.

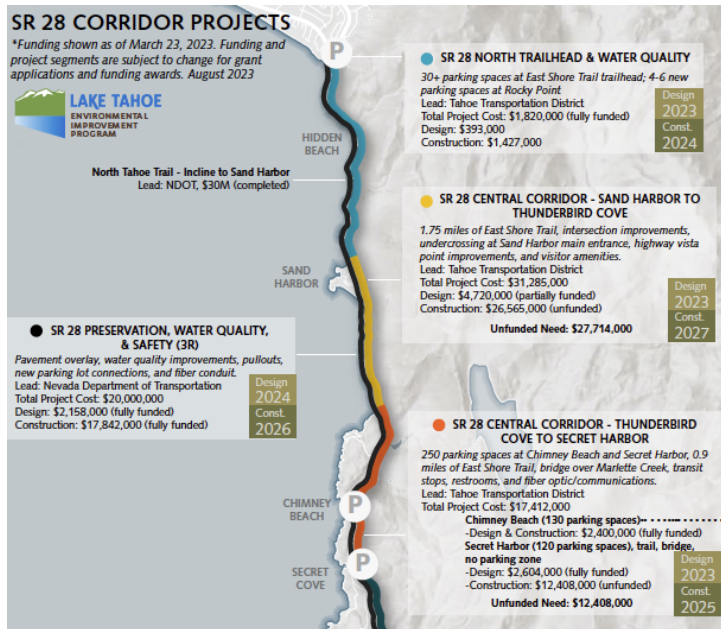
Mason Valley Wildlife Management Area

- Southern Nevada Mountain Bike Association Red Rock Trail Development (9609-03): This project was awarded \$100,000.00. This project will assist in development of the Redrock Canyon NCA Trail Network by supporting the adoption of nearly 101.5 miles of recreational trails. This will protect the environment while enhancing outdoor recreation for nearly 3 million visitors per year.



- Tahoe Transportation District East Shore Trail Thunderbird to Secret Harbor (9610-16): This project was awarded \$2,000,000.00. Funding would support a segment of the Lake Tahoe East Shore Trail. The segment from Thunderbird Cove to Secret Harbor. This funding would be matched with \$8,606,000 in partner funding.



Truckee River & Carson River Open Grants: (\$1,098,497 awarded to date):

- Washoe County Canepa Ranch Trailhead Development (8600-16): This project was awarded \$748,497.00. This project will support the construction of a trailhead that will provide public access to the Truckee River, adjacent public lands, and trails managed by the Forest Service. The project includes trailhead construction and design. The construction includes a new loop trail, a new ADA compliant river access trail, interpretive and wayfinding signs and kiosks, 2 ADA accessible restrooms, and landscaping and picnic areas.



- Carson Valley Conservation District (8601-04): This project was awarded \$350,000.00. This project will support five Carson River restoration projects. CVSD proposes to apply bioengineering treatments, sediment removal, bank shaping, rock riprap barbs, and bank protection to repair and restore the banks of the Carson River in designated project areas.
