### INTRODUCTION

In 2003, the Nevada Legislature created the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security (NCHS) in response to the terror attacks against the United States on September 11, 2001. As described in Chapter 239C of the Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS 239C), the NCHS is tasked with several responsibilities directed toward making recommendations to the Governor, the Legislature, local governments, private business, and citizens about actions and measures that may be taken to protect the citizens and visitors to this State from potential acts of terrorism and related emergencies.

### The duties of the NCHS include:

- Making recommendations to the Governor, Legislature, State agencies, local governments, businesses, and private citizens about actions to be taken to protect against terrorism;
- Making recommendations, through the Division of Emergency Management, on the use of money received by the State from homeland security grants or related programs;
- Proposing goals and programs to counteract acts of terrorism;
- Ensuring the safety of Nevada's residents and the critical infrastructures of the State by identifying the susceptibility of those infrastructures to terrorist acts;
- Examining the use and deployment of response agencies;
- Reviewing the interoperability of the State's communications systems and the efficacy of emergency (911) telephone systems, including establishment of a State plan for the compatibility and interoperability of the State's information and communication systems for response agencies and advising the Governor about such systems with particular emphasis on public safety radio systems;
- Coordinating between government agencies to avoid duplication; and
- Submission of an annual briefing to the Governor on the assessment of the State's preparedness, including an assessment of response plans and vulnerability assessments of utilities, and public and private entities.

To summarize, the NCHS has the responsibility to advise the Governor and the Legislature on any and all means that will improve the safety and security of the State, our residents, and visitors.

To meet this responsibility, the NCHS continues its close partnership with the Nevada Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Management and Office of Homeland Security. The resulting cooperation has allowed the NCHS to move forward in its defined duties that are outlined in the following pages of this report.



### OVERVIEW AND COMMISSION ACTIVITIES REPORT

January 1, 2018 to December 31, 2018

The Nevada Commission on Homeland Security (NCHS) continued to support funding of risk-based counter-terrorism and public safety programs and projects in Nevada. The overall amount of federal homeland security grant funding available to Nevada to address preparedness and prevention activities increased in Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2018 from the prior year. In FFY 2018, Nevada received a total allocation of \$8,980,000 for the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) representing a \$2,390,000 increase from the FFY 2017 HSGP funding allocation.

Nevada's FFY 2018 HSGP award included \$3,980,000 allocated to the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) in addition to \$5,000,000 allocated to the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI).

### COMMISSION (NCHS) MEETING OVERVIEW

The NCHS met in regular session six times in 2018.<sup>1</sup> Throughout this series of meetings, the NCHS heard reports and briefings from local, state, federal, and private sector officials including status updates on current HSGP funded projects and direction to stakeholders on efforts to address local and statewide preparedness efforts. The NCHS did not hold, nor approve, any closed sessions in 2018.

### **JANUARY 29, 2018**

In preparation for the upcoming FFY 2018 HSGP process, the NCHS received an overview of the HSGP process, previously established FFY 2017 priorities, and the development of FFY 2018 priorities. This overview emphasized the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) as well as the Statewide Preparedness Report (SPR) as drivers to the FFY 2018 HSGP process, and the upcoming Nevada Homeland Security Working Group (HSWG) and Urban Area Working Group (UAWG) process. Using this information, NCHS members were asked to provide individual input to rank-prioritize core capabilities for the FFY 2018.

The NCHS set project and capabilities priorities for the FFY 2018 HSGP funding allocation in line with federal grant guidance and Presidential Policy Directive 8 (PPD-8) which describes the Nation's approach to preparing for threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United

States. The objective of PPD-8 is to facilitate an integrated, all-of-nation risk informed, capabilities based approach to preparedness. This is done through a shared responsibility throughout all levels of government, including the private sector, nonprofits, and individual citizens. PPD-8 depends on close involvement of state and local government and stakeholders to work with the federal government to strengthen the security and resilience of the United States through systematic preparation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the Nation, including acts of terrorism, cyberattacks, pandemics, and catastrophic natural disasters.

The primary sources of information assisting in this ranking of priorities came from the 2017 SPR, which is an annual self-assessment of state preparedness capabilities. Using the 2017 SPR data, and analyzing the perceived gaps, risks, and needs relative to the core capabilities, the NCHS unanimously voted to approve the establishment of five priorities for Nevada's HSGP process to use in the identification of eligible projects for FFY 2018 HSGP funding. The top five priorities that were established by the NCHS, ranked highest to lowest, are:

The NCHS was briefed by the HSWG Co-Chairs on recommendations for improving emergency management and homeland security in Nevada with an emphasis on a new paradigm of statewide effort aligned with resilience in addition to an initial plan on how to start such a process. In an effort to ensure Nevada's efforts are strategic, adaptable, and collaborative, several factors framed the development of these recommendations. First, the lessons learned from the unprecedented 2017 disasters in Nevada, and the direction by Governor Sandoval instructing the Nevada Division of Emergency Management (DEM) to align its mission and vision with the 100 Resilient Cities initiative presented in the Governor's 2016 strategic plan, "Generations to Come: Nevada's Strategic Planning Framework.". Both factors address Nevada's complex challenges, and the recommendations presented to include the qualities of resilient systems. The recommendations included a mix of Commission directives, executive order, budgetary items, and legislative items or a combination of each category as follows:

- Reflective organizations and systems to embrace changing landscapes with internal features allowing evolution as necessary;
- Robust systems, designs, and organizations developed and supported with adequate resources to address existing and potential threats and hazards;
- Redundant systems plan for additional capacity to be employed during times of prolonged disruption or shock;
- Flexibility in mechanisms inherent to a system allowing for changes when conditions change;

- Resourceful systems comprised of individuals that can quickly achieve goals in the face of procedural or method disruption;
- Inclusiveness aimed at community resilience through seeking and obtaining input from as broad an audience as possible; and
- Integration and alignment of public, private, and other entities toward a single goal and vision.

The NCHS, upon review of the recommendations, instructed the HSWG Co-Chairs to provide documentation to include necessary directives, executive orders, budgetary items, and legislative items for review at the next meeting. The NCHS was also briefed on the current status of the State's response in updating Resort Emergency Plans per Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 463.790. Lastly, the NCHS was briefed by the UAWG Chair on the potential need for NCHS support for the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) Ranking and UASI initiatives affecting annual HSGP funding for the Las Vegas Urban Area. Challenges with this process were emphasized, and the NCHS voted to support suggestions provided by the UAWG Chair and the Sheriff of Clark County to be shared, through the Governor's office, to the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) for consideration.

### **FEBRUARY 28, 2018**

The NCHS was briefed by the HSWG Co-Chairs on recommendations for improving emergency management and homeland security in Nevada expanding on information delivered to the NCHS on January 29, 2018, addressing the paradigm shift to resilience. Included in the briefing were the following recommendations and considerations:

- A directive requiring a new paradigm of resilience aligning statewide homeland security and emergency management efforts;
- An executive order establishing the "Implementation of Nevada's Statewide Resilience Strategy";
- Budget considerations for DEM personnel and operations; and
- Initial legislative recommendations ahead of the 2019 Legislative Session.

The NCHS voted unanimously in support of the directive as presented, the EO with minor amendments to existing HSWG member structure, budget recommendations as presented for the \$6.7 Million option, and legislative changes as presented.

### MAY 9, 2018

The NCHS convened to address school safety in Nevada with the following emphasis:

Update on DEM efforts pertaining to school emergency response plans to include, 1) legislative requirements mandating the annual review, update, and dissemination of school Emergency Response Plans (ERP), 2) DEM's role in the receipt and housing of county, charter, and private school ERPs in addition to support and coordination services, 3) current compliance statistics, and 4) recommendations to extend the School Safety Task Force beyond the EO period established and ERP update and plan exercise requirements;

- Briefing on grant funding availability to address school security by the Nevada Department of Administration's Office of Grant Procurement, Coordination, and Management emphasizing federal focus on mental health programs and discretionary funding attached to such programs;
- Briefing on the progress of the initial report of the EO 2018-5, Statewide School Safety Task Force by the Nevada Superintendent of Public Instruction addressing school safety law and short term recommendations in addition to the formation of subcommittees tasked with identifying security issues involving physical infrastructure, resource officers, law enforcement, emergency management, threat assessments, social development, behavioral and mental resources, training, community coordination, and student support;
- Briefing on the Special Law Enforcement Summit on School Safety hosted by the Office of the Nevada Attorney General on March 14, 2018 with the aim to examine legal issues, existing security measures, and response to violent threats; and
- Briefing on the SafeVoice Nevada Program as a tool providing an anonymous reporting system to address school safety issues through real-time feedback and interaction.

### **JUNE 18, 2018**

The NCHS was briefed on the current status and deliverable outcomes of the HSGP awarded cybersecurity projects from 2015 through 2017 including current balances, expenditures, and deobligations with emphasis on those 2016 HSGP cyber-related projects showing significant balances ramifications of non-performance, and concerns over having to deobligate funding associated with such projects. As a result, the NCHS requested recommendations from DEM to address stalled projects as well as potential recipients for any deobligated funding.

The Chair of the NCHS's Finance Committee briefed the NCHS with an overview of the June 13, 2018, Finance Committee meeting to reallocate HSGP funding for two Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD) project change requests to address a mass communication system for use by public entities in Clark County. The NCHS approved the project requests contingent upon DHS approval, UASI approval, and an additional 30-day review by LVMPD to examine existing capabilities within the City of Las Vegas's system.

An overview was provided on the current status of the 2018 HSGP process and funding allocation recommendations to include advisory committee recommendations from the Cyber Security Committee (CSC), Nevada Public Safety Communications Committee (NPSCC), and additional allocation recommendations from the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group (HSWG), Urban Area Working Group (UAWG), and ultimately the Finance Committee. The NCHS voted to unanimously adopt the 2018 Finance Committee recommendations to fund 28 SHSP and 4 SHSP/UASI split projects in addition to accepting the UASI recommendation to fund 15 UASI-only projects as presented by the UAWG. This allowed the State Administrative Agency (SAA) to submit the 2018 Nevada HSGP application to DHS on June 18, 2018, representing a combined HSGP Investment Justification (IJ) totaling \$8,531,000.00. The funded investments are as follows (See Appendix C for more detail):

### **AUGUST 15, 2018**

The NCHS was briefed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction on the Interim Report and Recommendations approved by the Statewide School Safety Taskforce on July 13, 2018, including recommendations for consideration in the next Legislative biennial budget cycle. The HSWG Co-Chairs presented the Statewide Resilience Strategy as a requirement of Executive Order 2018-4, Implementation of Nevada's Statewide Resilience Strategy. The NCHS discussed and reviewed the document, and with minor amendments, voted to unanimously support the Statewide Resilience Strategy. Additional presentation and discussion ensued as the NCHS heard details on the development of a multi-jurisdictional Complex Coordinated Terrorist Attack (CCTA) full-scale exercise (FSE) scheduled for November 2019 designed as a three-day statewide FSE with focus on intelligence and information sharing between fusion centers, law enforcement, and emergency management agencies, translation of information into actionable response, interdiction activities, and response and recovery efforts stemming from the proposed FSE events that will occur in southern and northern Nevada. Lastly, the NCHS was presented with current and proposed HSGP policy affecting grant-funded project accountability. The discussion included accountability measures that allow the SAA to more effectively manage grant funding for those projects that do not produce measurable outcome. The NCHS was presented with grant projects that have not produced measurable outcomes or have shown other deficiencies, and voted to recommend where de-obligated funding should be directed.

### **OCTOBER 19, 2018**

The NCHS was provided an update on resilience transition efforts as a requirement of Executive Order (EO) 2018-4. Discussion included updates on the establishment, appointment status, and ongoing meeting schedule of the Resilience Commission in addition to ongoing recommendations and objectives to address resilience in Nevada. The Administrator of the Nevada Department of Public Safety, Office of Cyber Defense Coordination, briefed the NCHS on the 2018 Office of Cyber Defense Coordination annual report submitted as a requirement of NRS 480.932.

The NCHS membership was amended to include the appointment of Patricia Wade, Wade Development in December 2018. Additionally, the Commission accepted the resignation of Troy Wade, Wade Associates, in April 2018. Pursuant to NRS 239C.130 (1), the Commission fulfilled its statutory quarterly meeting requirement during the reporting period.

DEM maintains a website with current and past meeting dates, agendas, and meeting minutes for the all public bodies that are administered by the Division, including the NCHS. The website can be accessed via DEM Public Meeting Website.

The NCHS continues its service to the people of Nevada though its vision and mission statements to provide "A safe Nevada for its citizens and visitors free from risks, vulnerabilities, and threats," and "To advise the Governor on actions, measures, and funding relating to homeland security for the State of Nevada."

### STATEWIDE RESILIENCE STRATEGY

### **OVERVIEW**

The Statewide Resilience Strategy is an effort to transform and refine Nevada's emergency management and homeland security efforts. This strategy is intended to improve all of Nevada's grant, budgetary, and policy systems by removing silos and overlap and ensuring maximal transparency, predictability, and accountability for the Department of Public Safety's (DPS) Division of Emergency Management (DEM) and its statewide partner. Reviewed and approved by the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security (NCHS), DEM has been pursuing this strategy through the restructuring outlined below since September of this year.

### **BACKGROUND**

Calendar year 2017 was an unprecedented year for emergencies and disasters in Nevada, from back-to-back floods resulting in Presidential Major Disaster Declarations in January and February, to the mass shooting incident in October in Las Vegas. The Co-Chairs of the Homeland Security Working Group (HSWG) presented lessons learned from this unprecedented year to the NCHS in December of 2017, and recommended a paradigm shift in emergency management and homeland security policies, operations, and systems in the state. The NCHS agreed, and by February of 2018, approved four significant policy items: 1) a policy directive requiring DEM to pursue a transition to a resilience paradigm; 2) an executive order requiring the development of a Statewide Resilience Strategy, and other requirements; 3) initial legislative recommendations; and 4) budget requests for DEM. The executive order required that the strategy be developed by June 30, 2018.

### STATEWIDE RESILIENCE STRATEGY

The executive order required that the Statewide Resilience Strategy cover a number of requirements, including refining DEM's public body structure and its grant structure. It also required the development of finalized legislative recommendations, which would be considered by the NCHS during the summer of 2018. The Co-Chairs of the HSWG developed a four-part strategy for state resilience, which is intended to achieve the transition to resilience required by the objective, as well as the specific requirements within the executive order. The four components of this plan are outlined below:

- Strategy is the Resilience Commission. This body serves as the central advisory body for all policy and grant funding decisions pursued by DEM. It is created by absorbing a number of the 34 public bodies previously administered or supported in some way by DEM. The Resilience Commission not only advises on grants and policy, but also develops an annual State Resilience Goal and related Objectives in order to align their work and decisions. The Resilience Commission has been meeting monthly since October of 2018, and has been working towards these goals.
- COMPONENT 2, LOCAL AND TRIBAL RECOVERY COLLABORATION: This component of the Statewide Resilience Strategy serves two purposes. First, it allows DEM, state, local, and tribal partners to identify short-, medium-, and long-term gaps and resources to drive statewide recovery efforts through alignment with the State Disaster Recovery Framework and six Recovery Support Functions (RSF). Second, through RSF 1, this component will communicate with the Resilience Commission regarding what grant, policy, and operational resources are required to improve Nevada's ability to recover from emergencies and disasters.
- COMPONENT 3, LOCAL AND TRIBAL PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE COLLABORATION: This component of the Statewide Resilience Strategy also serves two purposes. First, it allows DEM, state, local, and tribal partners to identify short-, medium-, and long-term gaps and resources in order to drive statewide preparedness and response efforts through alignment with the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan and 17 Emergency Support Functions (ESF). Second, through DEM, this component will communicate with the Resilience Commission regarding what grant, policy, and operational resources are required to improve Nevada's ability to prepare for and respond to emergencies and disasters.
- COMPONENT 4, ONGOING ANNUAL ASSESSMENT: This component requires that the Resilience Commission regularly assess its ability to achieve its goals and objectives, and to provide a platform for making policy and budgetary recommendations for the future. This ongoing annual assessment will be considered through the monthly meetings of the Resilience Commission and result in an annual report on accomplishments, challenges, and recommendations.

### **CONCLUSION**

DEM has implemented this transformation since September of 2018, and is continuing to refine the approach in 2019. A key aspect of implementing this transformation is the passage of the legislative recommendations approved by the NCHS during their quarterly meeting in August of 2018. These recommendations are being pursued through eight bills to be considered during the 2019 legislative session. They are as follows:

- ASSEMBLY BILL 71: Makes various changes concerning expenditures related to disasters and emergencies.
- SENATE BILL 15: Provides for the establishment of incident management assistance teams.

- **SENATE BILL 34:** Revises provisions related to emergency management.
- **SENATE BILL 35:** Creates the Nevada Resilience Advisory Committee.
- **SENATE BILL 66:** Revises provisions relating to emergency management.
- **SENATE BILL 67:** Revises provisions governing local emergency management.
- **SENATE BILL 68:** Provides for the expedited granting of certain provisional registrations to volunteer providers of health or veterinary services during an emergency declaration.
- **SENATE BILL 69:** Revises provisions relating to emergencies and cybersecurity.

### NCHS COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES REPORT

This section of the Annual Report of Governor summarizes the activities of the committees established by the NCHS including the Critical Infrastructure Committee (CIC), Nevada Critical Infrastructure Protection Plan Subcommittee (NCIPP), Cyber Security Committee (CSC), CSC Subcommittee, Finance Committee, Legislative and Bylaws Committee, and State Homeland Security Strategy (SHSS) Advisory Committee. Additionally, it includes the Governor's Executive Order Committees that advise and make recommendations to the NCHS including the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group (HSWG), the Nevada Public Safety Communications Committee (NPSCC), NPSCC Grants Subcommittee, NPSCC Statewide 911 Coordinator Subcommittee, the Nevada State Citizen Corps Council, and the Resilience Commission. The last section summarizes the health preparedness activities of the Nevada Division of Public and Behavioral Health and the Nevada Hospital Association. The agendas for all public meetings of the NCHS, its committees, subcommittees, and advisory committees are located in *Appendix D*.

# CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE NEVADA CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION PLAN SUBCOMMITTEE

The Critical Infrastructure Committee (CIC) has been historically tasked with ensuring that the critical infrastructure assets of the State of Nevada are identified, properly cataloged, and protected in order to assist in decreasing any compromise of the critical infrastructure system that could potentially have a debilitating impact on the state either directly, through interdependency, or cascading effects from acts of terror or natural hazards.

The CIC conducted reviews of federal Critical Infrastructure Protection (CIP) guidance and programs to ensure they are in line with state and local strategies and reported to the NCHS on the critical infrastructure (CI) programs within Nevada and how well these programs correlate with DHS guidance and the NCHS intent. Additionally, the CIC conducted periodic reviews of state and federal law to identify gaps and obstacles affecting CI protection efforts and makes recommend changes in state or local law to the Commission as appropriate.

### NEVADA CRITICAL INFRASTRUCTURE PROTECTION PLAN (NCIPP) SUBCOMMITTEE

The National Infrastructure Protection Plan (NIPP) sets forth a broad framework in which critical infrastructure can be identified, and plans can be developed ensuring that such infrastructure is

protected. As part of that strategy to manage risk as part of the overall framework protecting the resiliency of the nation's critical infrastructure and key resources, the NIPP recognized key roles that states must play in the identification and securing of critical infrastructure within their own borders. Building on this framework, the NCIPP Subcommittee, as a subcommittee under the CIC, is tasked to provide a roadmap for the State of Nevada, local government, and the private sector to ensure the safety and security of critical infrastructure and key resources vital to Nevada.

The NCIPP Subcommittee was historically responsible for the review and necessary revision of the Nevada Critical Infrastructure Protection Plan (NCIPP) as a requirement associated with grant compliance. Due to changes in grant compliance requirements, and the move to model Nevada after the NIPP, the work of the CIC Subcommittee on the NCIPP was indefinitely suspended several years ago.

The CIC, nor the NCIPP, met during this reporting period, and s a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the CIC and the NCIPP Subcommittee functions were dissolved in 2018.

# CYBER SECURITY COMMITTEE CYBER SECURITY COMMITTEE SUBCOMMITTEE

The Cyber Security Committee (CSC) has been historically tasked with the responsibility for providing advice and recommendations to the NCHS on Nevada's cybersecurity risk, cyber-threat preparedness posture, statewide cybersecurity plans and projects, cyber related training and exercises, and enhancement of security awareness through education, public awareness, and engagement with public and private sector partners. The CSC appointed membership encompassed expertise in cybersecurity, information technology, and critical infrastructure from multiple jurisdictions including federal, state, county, city, and private industry. The CSC met two times in regular session during 2018.<sup>2</sup>

### **JANUARY 24, 2018**

The CSC was briefed by the Chief of DEM with an overview of the 2018 HSGP process to include timelines, requirements, and status of current cyber-related projects in addition to establishing the CSC's priorities and objectives for reviewing HSGP projects in 2018. An overview of existing HSGP cyber-related projects was discussed from FFY 2015-2017 including reported expenditures of projects within each given year. The Chair of the CSC briefed the body with information on the positive response and review by the NCHS of the Initial Report of the Cyber Security Committee on December 6, 2018. Also discussed was the Final Report of the Cyber Security Committee including input on updates and additional recommendations for the CSC's consideration.

### **APRIL 19, 2018**

The CSC was briefed on the draft of the Final Report of the Cyber Security Committee. The committee reviewed and amended the report, and in a unanimous decision, approved the report to be forwarded to

the NCHS for final approval. The CSC also received an overview of the HSGP process for FFY 2018 to coincide with the review and ranking of cyber security projects submitted for consideration. A total of six HSGP projects came before the CSC, with project representatives allowed to brief on their respective projects. Upon review and discussion on each project, members of the CSC rank-prioritized the projects based on established objectives and priorities:

The results of the CSC FFY18 HSGP project rankings were reviewed by the HSWG for consideration in final project rankings for FFY 2018.

### CYBER SECURITY COMMITTEE SUBCOMMITTEE

The Cyber Security Committee Subcommittee (CSC Subcommittee) was created in October 2017 and tasked with the review and build out on the deliverables necessary to complete the Final Report of the Cyber Security Committee due in the spring of 2018. The CSC Subcommittee met two times in 2018<sup>3</sup>.

### **FEBRUARY 27, 2018**

The CSC Subcommittee met to review and discuss the Initial Report of the Cyber Security Committee recommendation buildout and the process that would be used to amend the report for final submission to the NCHS for approval. Topics of discussion included summarization of HSGP project analytics, compliance efforts, community and state impacts in addition to reflection on what the CSC has accomplished for the betterment of cybersecurity efforts in Nevada, and instruction for current amendments and further input to be brought back to the CSC Subcommittee for review.

### **APRIL 3, 2018**

The CSC Subcommittee met again to further review and discuss the recommendation buildout within the Initial Report of the Cyber Security Committee, and made final recommendation changes which were unanimously approved to be moved to the CSC for review as the Final Report of the Cyber Security Committee on April 19, 2018.

The membership of the CSC was amended by the retirement of Shannon Rahming, Nevada Department of Administration, in March 2018. The CSC Subcommittee saw no membership changes in 2018. As a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the functions of the CSC and the CSC Subcommittee have been absorbed by the Resilience Commission.

### FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee reviews various Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) and related subgrant applications, program change requests, deobligation requests, reobligation requests, and makes recommendations to the NCHS on use of these funds. The Finance Committee works DEM in its role as the State Administrative Agency (SAA) administering homeland security grants (SAA). NRS 239C.170 requires the establishment of a Finance Committee to assist the NCHS in its duties by reviewing these programs and making recommendations to the NCHS. The Finance Committee met once in 2018.<sup>4</sup>

### **JUNE 13, 2018**

The Finance Committee met to review the 2018 HSGP process including advisory funding recommendation rankings provided by the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group (HSWG) and the Urban Area Working Group (UAWG). Based on evaluation of all 2018 HSGP proposals, the Finance Committee voted to unanimously approve the recommendation to fund a total of 28 SHSP and SHSP/UASI combined projects in addition to 15 UASI-only projects encompassing \$8,531,000 in HSGP project requests forward to the NCHS for final approval. Additionally, the Finance Committee reviewed two HSGP project change requests, NCHS-139 and NCHS-140, from Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (LVMPD) requesting line-item changes in FFY 2016 projects addressing a mass communication system for use by all public entities in Clark County.

The following table summarizes the 2018 HSGP award to Nevada. *Appendix C provides additional detail on the 2018 HSGP and prior year grant awards*:

Pursuant to Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 239C.170 (1), the Finance Committee undertook a vote to elect a new Chair and Vice-Chair. Stacey Giomi, Nevada Health Centers, was elected Chair, and Sheriff Joseph Lombardo, LVMPD, was elected Vice-Chair.

The Finance Committee membership was amended to include the appointment of Greg Herrera, Washoe County Sheriff's Office, in January 2018.

### LEGISLATIVE AND BYLAWS COMMITTEE

The Legislative and Bylaws Committee did not meet in 2018. As a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the body was dissolved in 2018.

### STATE HOMELAND SECURITY STRATEGY (SHSS) ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The State Homeland Security Strategy (SHSS) Advisory Committee did not meet in 2018. As a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the body was dissolved in 2018.

### EXECUTIVE ORDER ADVISORY COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES REPORT

### NEVADA HOMELAND SECURITY WORKING GROUP

The Nevada Homeland Security Working Group (HSWG) was redesigned in 2018 pursuant to the creation of Executive Order 2018-4, Implementation of Nevada's Statewide Resilience Strategy. Signed by Governor Sandoval on March 12, 2018, the Co-Chairs of the HSWG were tasked with the continuation of efforts applied to address recovery from Nevada's unprecedented emergencies and disasters in 2017, expansion of foundational statewide preparedness efforts, and alignment of efforts to increase resilience with a focus on capability sustainment throughout the state. As part of the redesign, the HSWG makeup and focus changed to include the following:

- A reduction of overall membership to 17 strategic member representatives to ensure a focus on capability sustainment, addressing immediate needs, and maintaining an efficient process; and
- The requirement of the HSWG Co-Chairs to develop a specific and prioritized list of needs ahead of the 2018 HSGP process in addition to the identification of capacities and capabilities to sustain.

With the changes noted above, the role of HSWG continued to bring together subject matter experts from state agencies, law enforcement, tribal representatives, first responder organizations, local government, and private sector partners to participate in an open and collaborative vetting process to select projects eligible to receive HSGP funding for the current FFY. Under the HSGP, and for the HSWG process, two funding streams including the State Homeland Security Program (SHSP) and Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) are considered when funding Nevada's HSGP projects.

Although the HSWG primarily focuses on projects with statewide impact requesting SHSP funding, it also considers UASI funding requests having similar statewide impact. The HSWG makes a project funding recommendation to the Finance Committee, and in turn, the Finance Committee reviews project recommendations and after consideration passes the final project recommendations to the NCHS for final consideration and approval. The NCHS met on June 18, 2018, and approved the final recommendation of the Finance Committee to fund FFY 2018 HSGP projects as recommended by the HSWG.

The HSWG met twice in regular session in 2018.<sup>5</sup> Both meetings were video-conferenced between Carson City and Las Vegas, with the State Emergency Operations Center as the primary venue for both meetings. The membership of the HSWG was not amended in 2018. *Please refer to Appendix E for further details on EO 2018-4*.

As a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the function of the HSWG has been absorbed by the Resilience Commission. The HSWG, upon completion of its duties in 2018, will sunset effective December 31, 2018.

### **APRIL 23, 2018**

The HSWG met prior to the release of the FFY 2018 HSGP guidance and federally established grant allocation for Nevada to review a total of 40 projects consisting of SHSP and SHSP/UASI combined project requests totaling \$8,321,138.09. Project requests were submitted by project managers representing various state agencies, local government, tribal entities, and non-profit agencies. All projects represented were described as having statewide or combined statewide/urban area impact.

As an additional requirement, projects with a cyber security component were directed for technical advisory review and ranking by the CSC, and those projects with a communications component were directed to the NPSCC and the NPSCC Grants Subcommittee for technical advisory review and ranking. This process ensures the submitted projects fit within the technical parameters of the proposed core capability. In a parallel and separate process for reviewing those projects with a UASI funding component, the UAWG reviewed a total of 26 UASI or UASI/SHSP combined project requests totaling \$7,649,300.80. As a final request from both of the HSWG and UAWG meetings, project managers were asked to make voluntary reductions or to withdraw projects that did not require FFY 2018 funding. Following are summaries of agendized items for HSWG meeting on April 23, 2018:

- Presentation of sustainment priorities for the FFY18 HSGP process based on recommendations developed during the ongoing after-action review process for events in 2017 as well as a prioritized list of homeland security capacities and capabilities that were essential for sustainment funding in 2018;
- Discussion on the HSGP and HSWG status, process, and timeline to include the current status of HSGP guidance, award, and federal application timelines and deadlines with additional overview of the HSWG process to include project proposals, requirements for line-item detailed budgets and investment justifications. Additionally, discussion was presented on advisory inputs from the CSC, and identification of investment justification (IJ) leads who will write the final IJ for the purpose of submitting the final DHS grant application for 2018;
- Review of the April 18, 2018, UAWG meeting including an overview of the UASI and UASI/SHSP split projects reviewed by the UAWG, strategies used during the process, updates on the current status of the Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) rankings, and potential funding consequences as a result of such ranking and/or state funding allocations; and
- Review of all HSGP SHSP and SHSP/UASI projects submitted to DEM for FFY18.

### **JUNE 6, 2018**

The HSWG met for a final time after the release of the FFY18 HSGP Notice of Funding Release to hear from project managers who had voluntarily reduced or withdrawn projects for consideration. In addition, the advisory rankings from the NPSCC were provided for consideration. Upon review and discussion of proposed changes, and taking into consideration the advisory recommendations as presented at this meeting from the CSC meeting on April 23, 2018, and the NPSCC meeting on May 10, 2018, the HSWG rank prioritized a total of 34 projects representing both SHSP and combined SHSP/UASI funding requests. Each voting member participated in a recorded voting process selecting 28 projects staying within the allowable SHSP funding allotment. In a parallel and separate process for

reviewing and rank-prioritizing those projects with UASI funding stream requests, the UAWG recommended funding 15 additional projects comprised of UASI-only projects falling within the allowable UASI funding allotment. Both the HSWG and UAWG recommendations were forwarded to the NCHS Finance Committee on June 13, 2018, for review. Following are summaries of agendized items for HSWG meeting on June 6, 2018:

- Discussion on the THIRA process and the DHS FFY18 HSGP Notice of Funding compliance requirements;
- A summary review of the May 31, 2018, UAWG meeting;
- Communications-specific review of HSGP communications projects for FFY 2018 discussed during both the May 10, 2018, NPSCC Grants Subcommittee meeting and the NPSCC meeting on the same day to include advisory rankings for consideration;
- Cybersecurity-specific review of HSGP cybersecurity projects, or those projects with a cybersecurity element, for FFY 2018 during the CSC meeting on April 19, 2018, to include advisory rankings for consideration;
- Allowance of the HSWG members, the SAA and UAA (and their respective staffs), an opportunity to ask questions of each project proposer on their respective project proposal focusing on any modification(s) made to proposed projects since the previous HSWG meeting and budget reduction potential based on financial information submitted;
- Presentation and discussion on the HSWG Co-Chair's FFY18 sustainment recommendations per EO 2018-4;
- Individual project evaluation and ranking by HSWG members for each project proposal to create a prioritized list and funding recommendation for the Finance Committee; and
- A vote to accept the prioritized and finalized FFY 2018 HSWG Recommended Project and Funding List with the direction to the SAA to submit the list to the Finance Committee.

The HSWG recommendations for the allocation of SHSP and SHSP/UASI combined funding requests totaled \$4,734,122.00 and the UAWG recommendations for the allocation of UASI-only funding requests totaled \$3,796,878.00. The combined HSGP funding recommendation totaled \$8,531,000.00. Of the total HSGP projects initially submitted in the 2018 process, 47 out of 62 project investments submitted were approved for consideration of funding by DHS, either at the originally requested amount, or at a reduced amount that significantly affected the capacity of the projects to provide capability change within Nevada.

With recommendation approval granted by the Finance Committee on June 13, 2018, and concurrent approval by the NCHS on June 18, 2018, the submission of Nevada's 2018 HSGP Grant Application to the DHS was completed on June 19, 2018, ahead of the federal deadline. The HSWG successfully completed its duties for FFY 2018.

Membership of the HSWG remained constant in 2018 per EO 2018-4.

# NEVADA PUBLIC SAFETY COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE (NSPCC) NPSCC GRANTS SUBCOMMITTEE NPSCC STATEWIDE 911 COORDINATOR SUBCOMMITTEE

Upon Executive Order (EO) 2014-01 on January 8, 2014, Governor Sandoval established the creation of the Nevada Public Safety Communications Committee (NPSCC) with the purpose of serving as advisory to the Commission, the SAA, and the Statewide 911 Coordinator regarding public safety communication and interoperability. The NPSCC serves as the governance board for the State and Local Implementation Grant Program (SLIGP).

The NPSCC membership may consist of a total of 15 voting members and three non-voting members as stipulated in Executive Order 2014-1. Nonvoting members consist of the Chief of Emergency Management (State Administrative Agent, SAA), the Statewide Interoperability Coordinator (SWIC), as well as a representative from the Department of Homeland Security, Federal Emergency Management Agency, or First Responder Network Authority. The NPSCC met three times in regular session in 2018.<sup>6</sup>

### **FEBRUARY 27, 2018**

The NPSCC was briefed on changes to the VFIRE and VHF radio frequencies throughout the country and the issues that are being faced between Nevada agencies and neighboring states. Discussion was presented on the importance of bringing awareness to these changes and the best solution to address this issue. The NPSCC appointed new membership to the NPSCC Grants subcommittee, and was presented with a review of the FFY18 HSGP process. In a unanimous vote, the NPSCC adopted compliance and objective protocols for review of all FFY18 HSGP projects in addition to receiving updates on the Nevada Shared Radio System and the First Responder Network Authority.

### MAY 10, 2018

The NPSCC reviewed the results of the May 10, 2018, NPSCC Grants Subcommittee meeting pertaining to the vetting and rank-prioritization of FFY18 HSGP cybersecurity projects. In a unanimous vote, the NPSCC voted to approve the recommendations as presented, and the results of the ranking were presented to the HSWG for consideration in the final funding recommendation to the Finance Committee.

### **JUNE 12, 2018**

The NPSCC was presented with an overview of the HSGP and changes within that grant requiring adaptation at the urban area level to ensure the quality of projects submitted and funded. As a result of additional projects submitted to the FFY 2018 process, the NPSCC reviewed several projects including a mass communication system and a multi-assault counter terrorism action capability project for the urban area to determine if those projects met the established communications criteria set by the NPSCC. The NPSCC voted to approve that both projects met established priorities.

### NPSCC GRANTS SUBCOMMITTEE

The NPSCC Grants Subcommittee is tasked with the review and ranking of HSGP projects containing communication components. The recommendations of the NPSCC Grants Subcommittee are reviewed, amended, or approved by the NPSCC, and then submitted to the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group for consideration of final HSGP rankings. The NPSCC Grants Subcommittee met one time in 2018.<sup>7</sup>

### MAY 10, 2018

The NPSCC Grants Subcommittee met to review ten FFY18 HSGP communication project proposals. Results from the vetting and rank prioritization of these projects were as follows:

During 2018, the NPSCC Grants Subcommittee membership was amended to include the appointments of Sandra Barfield, Nevada APCO, Michael Mattoon, City of Henderson Police Department, William Olsen, NV Energy, and Vincent Puglia, LVMPD. Scott Taylor, Mesquite Police Department, was named as Chair.

### NPSCC STATEWIDE 911 COORDINATOR SUBCOMMITTEE

The NPSCC Statewide 911 Coordinator Subcommittee (NPSCC 911 Subcommittee) is tasked with the development of the position-specific job functions, statewide requirements for such a position, support staff required, and identifying funding sources to create and maintain the position. The NPSCC 911 Subcommittee will advise the NPSCC on its recommendation for the position, and if approved, the position recommendation will move to the Commission for final consideration. The NPSCC 911 Subcommittee did not meet in 2018.

The NPSCC Statewide 911 Coordinator Subcommittee saw no membership changes in 2018.

As a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the functions of the NPSCC, NPSCC Grants Subcommittee, and the NPSCC Statewide 911 Coordinator Subcommittee were absorbed by the Resilience Commission in 2018.

### NEVADA STATE CITIZEN CORPS COUNCIL

The Nevada State Citizen Corps Council (the State Council) was created by Executive Order (EO) on February 25, 2009, and amended by EO 2011-26 on November 28, 2011. EO 2011-26 expired on June 30, 2015. The State Council was reestablished on February 24, 2016, by EO 2016-05, and will expire on December 31, 2018. As a result of the implementation of the Statewide Resilience Strategy, the function of the State Council has been absorbed by the Resilience Commission.

The State Council unified all the local Citizen Corps Councils into a coordinated statewide organization with a common goal to sustain and improve volunteer activities in the State of Nevada and to provide new and innovative ways to deliver important training to citizen volunteers. The functions of the coordinated activities of the multiple Citizen Corps Councils throughout Nevada and the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) programs continue to be supported administratively through DEM including a liaison from these stakeholders currently appointed to the Resilience Commission.

Following the tragic events that occurred on September 11, 2001, state and local government officials have increased opportunities for citizens to become an integral part of protecting the homeland and supporting the local first responders. A key component to ensuring a more secure and safer homeland consists of preparedness, training, and citizen involvement in supporting first responders. In January 2002, the President of the United States launched Citizen Corps, to capture the spirit of service that emerged throughout our communities following the terrorist attacks. The continued mission of Citizen Corps is to harness the power of every individual through education, training, and volunteer service to make communities safer, stronger, and better prepared to respond to the threats of terrorism, crime, public health issues, and disasters of all kinds.

Under the direction of Governor Sandoval, the role of the Nevada Citizen Corps Council was to "identify opportunities for local, state, and federal organizations to collaborate to accomplish the primary objectives of Citizen Corps." Additionally, the Council shall "engage in ongoing discussions to develop and support local Citizen Corps Councils and advance the national mission of Citizen Corps across the State." The State Council has divided Nevada into four geographic regions for the purpose of establishing a statewide Citizen Corps Program. The geographic regions are:

- Northern Region: Counties of Carson City, Churchill, Douglas, Lyon, Mineral, Pershing, Storey, and Washoe;
- North East Region: Counties of Elko, Eureka, Humboldt, Lander, and White Pine;
- **Southern Region**: Counties of Clark, Esmeralda, Lincoln, and Nye; and
- Tribal Lands.

Within these regions are the following recognized Citizen Corps Councils active in 2018:

- State of Nevada's Citizen Corps Council; and
- The Washoe County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) and Citizen Corps Council.

Nevada has Nevada-recognized active Citizen Emergency Response Teams (CERTs) in the following jurisdictions:

Carson City, Douglas County, Northeastern Nevada, Southern Nevada, Storey County, and the Washoe County [Regional].

### PRIMARY GOALS OF THE STATE CITIZEN CORPS COUNCIL

- An active State Citizen Corps Council chaired by NDEM supporting regional Councils and multiple Citizen Emergency Response Teams registered with the Department of Homeland Security.
- The 2018 Citizen Corps projects reflect a "Whole Community" approach with a focus on Public awareness and Youth Preparedness.

### ADDITIONAL GOALS AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE NEVADA CITIZEN CORPS PROGRAM INCLUDE:

- The Nevada State Citizens Corps Council met three times during 2018 prior to being merging into the Resilience Commission (January 18, May 7, and September 12, 2018);
- Membership during 2018 was amended to include the appointment of Battalion Chief Tom Raw, Carson City Fire Department and Cheryl Nagy, Preparedness & Recovery Coordinator for Clark County Office of Emergency Management. Resignations were accepted by Misty Richardson, Clark County Office of Emergency Management and Stacey Belt, Carson City;
- Continued public awareness and response training, to include preparedness and recovery, through training and exercises for citizens and volunteers which include prevention techniques and protocols;
- Procurement of necessary equipment and training materials required by FEMA to meet the standards for public awareness, prevention, response and recovery for all hazards;
- Create team leaders in each county/community to expand and enhance the education in the target capabilities for prepared awareness, education and prevention;
- Outreach to schools, businesses and local communities through prepared awareness, training and prevention which will assist them in recognizing, preparing for and responding to emergency incidents in their communities and to be deployed throughout the state upon request; and
- Continue organizing CERT train-the-trainer/program manager courses for Citizen Corps Leaders;
- Implement and support "You Are the Help until Help Arrives" initiative as a pilot in 2018 in multiple jurisdictions.

### **RESILIENCE COMMISSION**

The centerpiece for the Statewide Resilience Strategy is the Resilience Commission (Commission). Established through Executive Order (EO) 2018-4, Implementation of Nevada's Statewide Resilience Strategy, and the subsequent support from the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security, the Commission was created in 2018 serving as the central advisory body for all policy and grant funding decisions pursued by DEM. It is created by absorbing a number of the 34 public bodies previously administered or supported in some way by DEM. The Resilience Commission not only advises on grants and policy, but also develops an annual State Resilience Goal and related Objectives in order to align their work and decisions. The Resilience Commission met three times in 2018<sup>8</sup>.

### **OCTOBER 25, 2018**

The Resilience Commission (Commission) was briefed with an overview of EO 2018-4 and the Statewide Resilience Strategy and Legislative Recommendations report presented by the State Administrative Agent and the Urban Area Administrator. Discussion included the Commission makeup, requirements, and objectives in support of statewide resilience. Draft bylaws were presented for review, and approved unanimously. In an effort to familiarize the Commission with the functions and programmatic issues that this Commission would have input on moving forward, an overview of grant performance related to the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) and Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) was provided, anticipated monthly updates from those public bodies and disciplines with functions not absorbed by the Commission, and ongoing operations and planning updates. The Commission also addressed the development of an ongoing meeting schedule to address resilience. Additional topics of discussion included a presentation on the outline of the 2019 Resilience and Preparedness Report as a requirement of EO-2018-4, as well as a presentation on capacities that were recommended for sustainment during the 2019 HSGP cycle. Lastly, the Commission was provided an overview of the HSGP funding deobligation process in Nevada including current status of the grant and funding available.

### **NOVEMBER 20, 2018**

The Commission was presented an overview of Nevada Open Meeting Law covering Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) 241 with emphasis on noticing requirements, establishment of quorum, voting procedures, agenda items, and the production of minutes for each meeting. A presentation on the Commission meeting timeline was provided to include deliverables and benchmarks in preparation for ongoing monthly meetings due to the large-scale tasks involved with the Commission schedule. The Commission was briefed on the current emergency management strategic plan, and the development of resilience goals and objectives. In an effort to explain efforts on interfacing the Commission's efforts with those of strategic statewide efforts, an overview of the Nevada Disaster Recovery Framework, preparedness efforts in Nevada, and a presentation on the Nevada Hazard Mitigation Grant Program was provided for visibility.

### **DECEMBER 11, 2018**

The Commission was provided an update on current efforts applied to the Emergency Management Strategic Plan and the ongoing development of resilience goals and objectives. Emphasis was placed on how the Statewide Resilience Strategy works to implement its established goals and objectives, discussion on the next phases of strategic plan development, and alignment with the 100 Resilient Cities concept and developing input from these areas for incorporation into the strategic plan. An overview of the THIRA and SPR process was provided to include the relevance of processes, outreach efforts, collaborative stakeholder input, and the status of completion for 2018. A presentation on the past five years of HSGP funding deobligations was discussed including input from the Urban Area Working Group (UAWG) meeting on December 3, 2018 to address urban area deobligations. As part of the monthly meeting updates for those public bodies either absorbed by the Commission or outside of the

direct Commission process, presentations were made on Nevada's State Citizen Corps Council and Community Emergency Response Teams (CERT), Intrastate Mutual Aid Committee (IMAC), the 2018 Nevada Hazard Mitigation Post Fire funding opportunity, and an overview of Nevada recovery and preparedness efforts.

Awardees must be able to conduct the following activities: Coordinate emergency operations, standardize the incident command structure for public health, establish incident command structures for health care organizations and HCCs, ensure HCC integration and collaboration with ESF-8, and expedite fiscal and administrative preparedness procedures.
- 9. Awardees must maintain current all-hazards public health and medical emergency preparedness and response plans. Awardees must obtain input from HCCs and the public.
- 10. Awardees must be able to share situational awareness information across HCCs and public health systems, share emergency information and warnings across HCCs and jurisdictions, and conduct external communication with the public.
- 11. Coordinate HPP-PHEP Training and Exercise Programs using risk assessments, exercises, and actual operations to establish priorities for training and exercises. All exercises must be conducted according to Homeland Security Exercise and Evaluation Program (HSEEP).

- 12. Comply with Emergency System for Advance Registration of Volunteer Health Professionals (ESAR-VHP) guidelines.
- 13. Engage the State Office for Aging or equivalent office in addressing the emergency preparedness, response, and recovery needs of the elderly.
- 14. Must conduct inclusive risk planning for whole community, including for children; pregnant women; senior citizens; individuals with access and functional needs, including people with disabilities; individuals with pre-existing, serious behavioral health conditions and others with unique needs.
- 15. Solicit public comment on emergency preparedness plans and their implementation, including the establishment of an advisory committee or similar mechanism to ensure ongoing public comment.
- 16. Meet National Incident Management System (NIMS) compliance requirements.
- 17. Awardees must describe in an all-hazards plan how they will utilize Emergency Management Assistance Compact (EMAC) or other mutual aid agreements for medical and public health mutual aid.
- 18. Awardees must identify reliable information and communication systems and platforms for bed availability, EMS data and patient tracking, and provide access to HCC members and stakeholders.
- 19. Submit required progress reports and program and financial data.
- 20. Submit pandemic influenza preparedness plans.
- 21. Submit an independent audit report every two years to the Federal Audit Clearinghouse within 30 days of receipt of the report.
- 22. Provide performance measure data as requested to determine the need for further refinements to performance measures.
- 23. Meet evidence-based benchmarks required in Public Health Service (PHS) Act amended by Pandemic and All-Hazards Preparedness Act (PAHPA).

### **HPP SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS**

- 1. Each HCC must complete an annual Hazard Vulnerability Assessment.
- 2. Each funded HCC must complete a resource assessment.
- 3. HCCs must obtain de-identified data from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services emPOWER map every six months.
- 4. Each identified HCC must participate in at least one required exercise at either the regional or statewide level.
- 5. Each HCC must develop a continuity of operations plan by the end of Budget Period 3 (SFY20).
- 6. Awardees must ensure HCCs have redundant communications systems capable of sending Essential Elements of Information by the end of Budget Period 1 (SFY18).
- 7. Awardees must collaborate with Emergency Medical Services for Children (EMSC) program within the jurisdiction.

### PHEP SPECIFIC REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Awardees must describe how they obtain programmatic input from tribes regarding the context and implementation of jurisdictional public health emergency preparedness and response plans.
- 2. Provide CDC with situational awareness data generated through interoperable networks of electronic data systems.
- 3. Have in place fiscal and programmatic systems to document accountability and improvement.
- 4. Awardees must work with HCCs to meet needs of those in the community with unique healthcare needs or those that have electricity dependent medical devices.
- 5. Awardees must develop response plans for chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear, and explosive threats.
- 6. Comply with requirement to maintain an all-hazards public health emergency preparedness and response plan, submit required program progress reports and financial data.
- 7. Awardees must conduct training for incident command and support personnel, and drill and exercise the public health jurisdictional incident command structure.
- 8. Awardees must seek to increase the interoperability and functionality of epidemiological and public health informatics systems.
- 9. Awardees and local Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) jurisdictions must submit initial Operational Readiness Review (ORR) self-assessment data in Budget Period 1 (SFY18).
- 10. Awardees must coordinate with HHCs and other community partners to ensure proper tracking, transportation, handling, and storage of human remains.
- 11. Awardees must continue to create, maintain, support and strengthen routine surveillance and detection systems and epidemiological processes.
- 12. Awardees must submit an application letter signed by the jurisdiction's health official confirming the PHEP director, the epidemiology lead, and the public health laboratory director have provided input into plans, strategies, and investment priorities.
- 13. Manage CHEMPACK readiness program for chemical threat response.
- 14. Manage State Receive Stage and Store (RSS) sites to ensure State readiness to distribute Strategic National Stockpile (SNS) assets in a public health emergency.
- 15. Maintain Laboratory Response Network Biological (LRN-B) requirements and maintain the tools and resources for LRN-B participation.
- 16. Continue Level 2 chemical laboratory surge capacity activities.

### **PROPOSED ACTIVITIES:**

Priority Projects for SFY19 identified through a strategic planning partnership with Local Health Authorities, Nevada Hospital Association, Inter-Tribal Emergency Response Council, Nevada State Public Health Laboratory, emergency response partners and other partner agencies:

- 1. Community Resilience
- 2. Incident Management
- 3. Information Management
- 4. Surge Management
- 5. Countermeasures and Mitigation

### **FUNDING FORMULA:**

This formula was modified from SFY18 to SFY19. The funding formula was calculated to provide updated base funding allocation for the Local Health Authorities (LHAs) and Nevada Hospital Association (NHA) based on Full Time Equivalent (FTE) positions to provide public health and healthcare emergency preparedness activities common to all. The funding formula was also updated using current population estimates from the Nevada State Demographer.

### **DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDING:**

Funds are distributed to Local Health Authorities and other partners based on the funding formula and activities to meet capabilities and population needs for local jurisdictions.

### **FUTURE REQUIREMENTS:**

A matching requirement was implemented beginning in FY 2007. The match requirement is not less than 10% (i.e. \$1 for each \$10 of federal grant funds).

Beginning in FY 2009, eligibility for these federal funds required participation in ESAR-VHP.



# EXECUTIVE ORDER 2018-4 IMPLEMENTATION OF NEVADA'S STATEWIDE RESILIENCE STRATEGY



#### **Executive Order 2018-4**

### IMPLEMENTATION OF NEVADA'S STATEWIDE RESILIENCE STRATEGY

WHEREAS, Nevada experienced unprecedented emergencies and disasters during calendar year 2017;

WHEREAS, these incidents resulted in disruption and tragedy throughout Nevada, however, they also displayed Nevada's commitment to recovery and to building a stronger Nevada based on lessons learned from these incidents:

WHEREAS, Nevada's 2016 strategic plan, "Generations to Come: Nevada's Strategic Planning Framework," called for Nevada's emergency management vision to align with nationally-established resilience models;

WHEREAS, the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group was created by an Executive Order issued on March 3, 2008, and amended by Executive Order 2011-31 in December 15, 2011, and again by Executive Order 2015-32 on November 16, 2016;

WHEREAS, pursuant to these Executive Orders, the Chief of the Nevada Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Management and the Chair of the Las Vegas Urban Area serve as the Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group;

WHEREAS, Nevada's lessons learned from its unprecedented year, its commitment to recovering fully, and its established policy development and implementation framework through the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group can be combined to build and implement a plan for building statewide resilience; and

WHEREAS, Article 5, Section 1 of the Nevada Constitution provides: "The supreme executive of this State, shall be vested in a Chief Magistrate who shall be Governor of the State of Nevada."

NOW, THEREFORE, by the authority vested in me as the Governor by the Constitution and laws of the State of Nevada, it is hereby ordered as follows:

- 1. The Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group shall continue working to recover from the unprecedented events of 2017, expand the existing foundation for statewide preparedness, and align efforts for increased resilience ahead of the 2019 legislative and budget cycles. The Division of Emergency Management shall staff the processes outlined below under the direction of the Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group and under the guidance and oversight of the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security.
- Effective immediately, the Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group shall ensure that various grant sources are used as effectively and efficiently as possible in order to best recover from the emergencies and disasters in Nevada in 2017. This should include the following efforts:
  - a. Appointing a reduced number of members of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group for the 2018 Homeland Security Grant Program cycle, all of whom are voting members, in order to ensure focus on sustainment efforts, addressing immediate needs, and maintaining an efficient process. Unless they are representing agencies or regions that have not previously been appointed, appointees for the 2018 cycle will be members who have served on the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group previously, and all shall be notified of their appointment or reappointment by the Co-Chairs. Appointees may include representatives of the following jurisdictions, areas, or organizations:
    - i. DPS, Division of Emergency Management;

- ii. Clark County Office of Emergency Management;
- iii. Inter-Tribal Council;
- iv. Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department;
- v. City of Las Vegas;
- vi. City of Henderson;
- vii. City of North Las Vegas;
- viii. Washoe County;
- ix. Washoe County Sheriff's Office;
- x. Northeastern Nevada;
- xi. Southeastern Nevada;
- xii. Western Nevada;
- xiii. Central Nevada;
- xiv. Office of Cyber Defense Coordination;
- xv. Nevada National Guard;
- xvi. McCarran International Airport; and,
- xvii. Nevada Hospital Association.
- b. The Co-Chairs shall develop a prioritized list of specific needs ahead of the 2018 Homeland Security Grant Program cycle, which is to be based on recommendations developed during the ongoing after action review processes for events in 2017. Additionally, the Co-Chairs shall develop a prioritized list of homeland security capacities and capabilities that currently exist and are essential for sustainment for funding for the 2018 grant cycle. The Nevada Homeland Security Working Group shall consider these priorities when developing their recommendations to the Finance Committee of the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security.
- c. The policies and procedures of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group as established and amended through Executive Orders shall otherwise remain in effect.
- 3. The Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group shall build upon the existing foundation for statewide preparedness and the vision for statewide resilience by developing and updating plans for and implementing the following efforts:
  - a. The Nevada Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Management shall update the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan as well as the Response and Recovery Guide with review and input from federal, state, tribal, local, private sector, and non-profit partners by September 15, 2018.
  - Directors of state-level Department shall provide updates regarding capabilities to the Nevada Department of Public Safety, Division of Emergency Management regarding services and resources available during emergencies.
  - c. The Co-Chairs shall develop and implement a training program for the State Comprehensive Emergency Management Plan and the Response and Recovery Guide for Directors and identified key leaders for Department-level agencies within state government to be completed by December 31, 2018.
  - d. The Co-Chairs shall develop and implement a training program for the State Recovery Framework and agency roles during activation as Recovery Support Functions for Directors and identified key leaders for Department-level agencies within state government to be completed by December 31, 2018.
  - e. Under the authority of NRS 414.300, the Co-Chairs shall develop regulations for information sharing protocols for HIPAA-protected information and Personally Identifiable Information between federal, state, tribal, local, private sector, and non-profit partners during emergencies. These regulations shall include training requirements for state and local agencies to ensure understanding of the information sharing protocols.
  - f. The Co-Chairs shall also establish a state-specific certification standard for emergency managers in the state.
- 4. The Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group shall develop for approval by the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security a five-year resilience strategy to align statewide emergency management and homeland security initiatives through the following efforts:
  - a. Working with federal, state, tribal, local, private sector, and non-profit partners, the Co-Chairs of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group shall provide a statewide resilience strategy to the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security no later than July 1, 2018. The statewide resilience strategy shall include at a minimum the following items:

- Proposals for streamlining the numerous commissions, boards, and committees that advise the Division of Emergency Management through the creation of a statewide resilience commission.
- Proposals for streamlining various grants processes that impact emergency management and homeland security.
- Proposals for incentivizing local partners through grants and other preparedness opportunities to engage in local resilience models.
- iv. Proposals for a regional approach to resilience and preparedness, to include recommendations to fund a Regional Emergency Operations Center in the Las Vegas Urban Area.
- Proposals for partnership with institutions within the Nevada System of Higher Education.
- b. The Co-Chairs shall provide the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security a final list of legislative recommendations for consideration and approval for the 2019 Legislative Session in the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group Report due June 30, 2018.
- c. The Co-Chairs shall provide a comprehensive After Action Report of the Las Vegas mass casualty event to the Homeland Security Commission by October 1, 2018.
- d. The Co-Chairs shall provide to the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security a Resilience and Preparedness Report by October 15, 2018.
- e. The Co-Chairs will work with both Fusion Centers within the state to develop a joint threat assessment by November 15, 2018.
- f. The Co-Chairs shall provide the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment for both the state and the Las Vegas Urban Area, as well as the State Preparedness Report to the Nevada Commission on Homeland Security no later than December 31, 2018. These reports shall include specific reports by local, state, and tribal agencies, and shall coincide with the final report of the Nevada Homeland Security Working Group.
