Grades 3-5 Smater Balance Summative Assessments

The 2017-2018 SBAC results showed that 20% of students in grades 3-5 were proficient in ELA compared to 22% in 2016-17 and 27% proficient in 2015-16. Overall strengths were noted in ELA Claim 3, Speaking & Listening, 80% at/near or above standard, compared to 78% in 2016-17, and 82% proficient in 2015-16. Proficiency levels in 2018 were also noted in Claim 4, Research & Inquiry, at 69%, in 2017- 53% were at/near or above standard, and 58% in 2016. Proficiency levels in 2018 in Claim 1, Reading, is 44%, in 2017- 45% were at/near or above standard, and 49% in 2016.

The percent of students proficient in math increased in 2018 from 17% from 20% in 2017, and 17% in 2016.

In 2018, 36% of 3rd-5th grade students were at/near or above standard in Math Claim 1, Concepts and Procedures whereas in 2017, 44% were proficient, and 1n 2016, 36% showed proficiency. The percent of students who were at/near or above standard in Math Claim 2, Problem Solving and Modeling & Data Analysis increase in 2018 to 74% from 70% in 2017, and 68% in 2016. The percent of students who were at/near or above standard in Math Claim 3, Communicating Reasoning increase in 2018 to 83% from 82% in 2017, and 77% in 2016.

The school's largest ethnic subgroup in 2017-18 was Black/African-American, 120 students tested, with a 18% proficiency rate in ELA, a decrease from the 22% in 2017 and 24% in 2016. In math, this ethnic group of 3rd-5th grade students 18% were at/near or above standard, an increase from the 19% in 2017 and the 13% in 2016. The Hispanic subgroup, 33 tested students, 18% were proficient in ELA, a decrease from 28% in 2016-17 and the 37% in 2015-16. In math, this ethnic subgroup only 12% proficient in 2018, a decrease from the 22% in 2017 and 26% in 2016.

Students with IEPs, 10 students tested, 10% were proficient in ELA compared to the 23% in 2017 and the 10% in 2016. The percent of students with IEPs proficient in math decreased from 10% in 2016, 15% in 2017 to 0 % in 2018. English Language Learners, 16 students, 11% were proficient in ELA in 2017-18, an increase from 9% in 2016-17 and 23% in 2015-16. In math, 0% were proficient in 2017-18, a decrease from 18% in 2017 and 15% in 2016.

On the ELA SBAC, fourth grade students were 33% proficient in 2018 showing an increase from the 2017 third grade's 23% in proficiency. Fifth grade students showed consistent decline in proficiency in ELA over three years, in 2016 third graders were 28% proficient, in 2017. Third grade students' proficiency points decreased steadily from 29% in 2016 to 23% in 2017 to 8% in 2018. Fourth grade students' percentage points decreased from 28% in 2016 to 16% in 2017, but increased in 2018 to 33%.

On the 2018 Math SBAC, fifth grade proficiency decreased to 8% over their previous year in fourth grade's 22% and in 2016 in third grade with 25%. Fourth grade decrease in 2018 to 22% form 2016 third grade's 27% proficiency. Third grade's proficiency increased from 25% in 2016 to 27% in 2017 but decreased to 20% 2018.

Fourth grade's proficiency increased from 18% in 2016 to 22% in 2017 and maintained the 22% in 2018. Fifth grade's proficiency increased from 5% in 2016 to 8% in 2017 and maintained the 8% 2018.

The book Fair will continue to use parent volunteers to provide access to quality literature. Members of our community will continue to receive books for their birthday.
