MINUTES OF MEETING - Commerce Committee - 55th Assembly Session - April 19, 1969

Present: Wood, Mello, Bowler, Capurro, Espinoza, Torvinen

Absent: T. Hafen

Meeting was convened at 12:15 to consider AB-522 and SB-452.

<u>AB-522</u> - Allows resale price maintenance contracts for alcoholic beverages

Mello moved to indefinitely postpone; Espinoza seconded; motion carried with Bowler voting "no".

<u>SB-452</u> - Prohibits credit sales to delinquent retailers of intoxicating liquors

Torvinen moved a do pass. Chairman Wood said that in order to conform with the Federal regulation that there should be an amendment to "30 day credit from date of delivery". Mello questioned the need for the bill.

Wood: The state levies the tax against the wholesalers and as such, a state becomes involved and therefore has some responsibility toward the protection or extension of credit because it is partially state's money. There is a reluctance among the wholesalers and distributors to take their problems to the Federal government and their contention is that they prefer to resort to the State law instead of Federal law.

Espinoza: I think it is ridiculous to place the State of Nevada in a position to be a collection agency, especially for liquor.

Mello: The main reason was because they had some large accounts they were afraid they would lose because there was another person ready to pick up the paper. I don't believe that distributors will lose their franchies. I don't know of any except Lucky that did.

Bowler: There are three of us here that recall the old famous 306 bill which was passed for the wholesalers; we passed it against the objections of the retailers and larger resort association hotels in Las Vegas; they didn't oppose because they didn't have the money to pay their bill; it was that their records were not set up to handle. As the retail sales bill was lost, I am going to have to vote "no" here also.

Mello: I'm not opposed to these people; they are good businessmen. I think this is special legislation. I was told by one of them early this morning that if this didn't go through, they would enact the Federal law.

Torvinen moved a do pass (without amending); he withdrew his motion. Capurro moved a do pass with amendments; Torvinen seconded; Capurro. Torvinen, Wood voted "yes"; Espinoza, Mello, Bowler voted "no". The bill did not pass as it lacked a constitutional majority.
