SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS

COMMISSION ON SPECIAL LICENSE PLATES

Nevada Revised Statutes 482.367004

Following is a summary of the recommendations adopted by the Commission on Special License Plates at its March 3, 2008, meeting for transmittal to the 75th Session of the Nevada State Legislature.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO DRAFT LEGISLATIVE MEASURES

- 1. Draft a bill amending Chapter 482 of *Nevada Revised Statutes* (NRS) to allow Nevada's Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), with respect to any special license plate that is issued pursuant to NRS 482.3667 to 482.3825, inclusive, and for which an additional fee is imposed for the issuance of the special license plate to generate financial support for a charitable organization, to issue a special license plate for a motorcycle upon application by a person who is entitled to such a plate. However, a special license plate for a motorcycle may not be combined with a personalized prestige plate. (Assembly Bill 109 [BDR 43–958, replaces BDR 43–364])
- 2. Draft a bill amending subsection 3 of NRS 482.367004 to require that legislators serving on the Commission be paid a salary and compensated for their travel and per diem expenses. (Assembly Bill 110 [BDR 43-959, replaces BDR 43-365]).
- 3. Draft a bill amending Chapter 482 of NRS to require that each charitable organization, not including a governmental entity whose budget is included in the *Executive Budget*, that receives revenue from a special license plate provide a list of officers, current mailing address, and current telephone number to the Commission on Special License Plates and the DMV on or before September 30 of each year. If the organization fails to provide this information to the Commission on Special License Plates or the DMV, the Commission may require that: (a) the DMV suspend the collection of all additional fees collected on behalf of the charitable organization; and (b) the DMV suspend the production of the particular design of special license plates from which the charitable organization receives additional fees, if the DMV is still producing that design. (BDR 43–366)

RECOMMENDATION TO DRAFT A LETTER

4. Draft a letter to each County Treasurer informing them that they may, on a quarterly basis, receive fees collected for animal appreciation special license plates for vehicles registered in that county (pursuant to subsection 5 of NRS 482.379175).

REPORT TO THE 75TH SESSION OF THE NEVADA STATE LEGISLATURE BY THE COMMISSION ON SPECIAL LICENSE PLATES

I. INTRODUCTION

The Commission on Special License Plates is a permanent Commission authorized under the provisions of *Nevada Revised Statutes* (NRS) 482.367004 (Appendix A) to approve or disapprove applications for special license plates, as defined in NRS 482.367008, and the issuance of the special license plates by the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV). During the 2007-2008 Legislative Interim period, the Commission held three meetings, including a work session. All meetings were open to the public. The three public hearings were conducted through simultaneous videoconferences between the Grant Sawyer State Office Building in Las Vegas and the Legislative Building in Carson City.

The Commission consists of five voting members and three nonvoting members. The voting members must be legislators, including the legislators who served as chairmen of the Assembly Committee on Transportation and the Senate Committee on Energy, Infrastructure and Transportation during the most recent legislative session. The Legislative Commission appoints the voting members for a term of two years, commencing on July 1 of each odd-numbered year, and vacancies must be filled in the same manner. The nonvoting members are the directors of the DMV, the Department of Public Safety, and the Department of Cultural Affairs, or their designees. Members of the Commission serve without salary or compensation for their travel or per diem expenses.

II. OVERVIEW

The plain metal tags that have adorned registered vehicles for decades, providing a means to identify a vehicle and its owner, were once easily distinguishable between states' standard issue designs. Currently, several states offer more than 100 different designs to allow people to demonstrate their support for special causes, professional sports teams, or identify themselves as a member of a certain organization. Special license plates differ in design from the standard state license plate and include both special interest fundraising plates and other types of plates.

Special license plates that generate revenue for certain causes have become more widespread in Nevada since the first fundraising plate was approved in 1989. The Commission on Special License Plates was established in 2003 to provide another means of authorizing the plates outside of the limited 120-day legislative session. There are presently 25 special license plates authorized, which raise funds for certain causes and are available to the general public (see Appendix B for a list of special license plates and the funds, prepared by the DMV). These license plates are considered special license plates per NRS 482.367008.

As of December 31, 2008, there were 199,738 active special license plates, and the plates had generated \$22,265,048 in revenue. The most widely issued plate has been the Las Vegas Commemorative plate with 76,987 active plates as of December 31, 2008, which has generated \$7,531,694. Revenue from the special license plates that is returned to the organizations is generated through an initial issuance fee of \$15 to \$25 and a renewal fee of \$10 to \$20, depending on the design, and these fees are in addition to all other applicable registration and license fees and governmental services taxes.

III. HISTORY AND TYPES OF SPECIAL LICENSE PLATES IN NEVADA

The 1931 Nevada Legislature enacted Senate Bill 59 (Chapter 202, *Statutes of Nevada*), which was a comprehensive transportation measure that required the registration of motor vehicles, trailers, and semitrailers and provided for the imposition of vehicle registration fees. The bill required that one license plate be furnished for each registered motorcycle and semitrailer, and two license plates be provided to each motor vehicle and trailer. The Motor Vehicle Fund (NRS 482.180) was established by the measure as a separate account in the State Treasury. The bill provided for "suitable distinguishing plates" for public-owned vehicles that were exempt from the registration fees, and it designated the Secretary of State as the "Vehicle Commissioner" of the small State with a population of approximately 90,000.

The distinguishing plates for public-owned vehicles may have been Nevada's first special license plates, but there are now many different types of special license plates. Following is a table of the license plates associated with military or public service, or membership or affiliation with certain groups. The table includes the statute authorizing the plate, and the year of initial adoption listed in chronological order.

B. Fundraising Plates

The first license plate to generate revenue for a specific cause or organization was authorized in 1989. The 1989 Nevada Legislature approved Assembly Bill 878 (Chapter 540, *Statutes of Nevada*), which authorized the issuance of a special license plate to commemorate the 125th anniversary of Nevada's admission into the Union. The issuance of new commemorative license plates ceased as of October 31, 1990, and the issuance of replacement commemorative license plates ceased as of June 30, 1995. The commemorative plates were not limited to any certain membership; however, other special license plates that generate revenue for a specific organization limit issuance to a certain membership. Below are the special license plates that are available only to a specific population and generate revenue for an organization or cause, listed in chronological order of legislative approval.

The 1993 Legislature authorized the second special license plate to raise funds for a designated organization, with the additional fees earmarked for academic and athletic scholarships to students of the University of Nevada, Reno (UNR), and the University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV). Below are all of the license plates that were legislatively approved after 1989 to generate funds for an organization or cause and available to the general public regardless of any specific membership.

There are also special license plates associated with certain classes and types of vehicles: antique vehicles, classic rods, classic vehicles, fire trucks, and street rods. Souvenir license plates (NRS 482.3824), which are substantially similar to the particular special license plate, may be produced by the DMV to generate financial support for a charitable organization.

In 2003, the Legislature created the Commission on Special License Plates as another option for the authorization of special license plates in addition to direct legislative authorization. This method is known as direct application and petition to the DMV. The Legislature placed a 25-design cap on the production of special license plates and a mechanism to cease issuance of low-demand plates. It is important to note that in 2007, Senate Bill 481 (Chapter 235, *Statutes of Nevada*) requires that the Commission must approve or disapprove any application for a special license plate authorized by an act of the Legislature. Further, the Legislature pledged that if a new special license plate is authorized by an act of the Legislature after January 1, 2007, the license plate may not be issued by the DMV unless the Commission approves the application for the new plate.

Following are all of the license plates that were approved by the Commission after 2003 to generate funds for an organization or cause and available to the general public regardless of any specific membership:

IV. <u>ACTIONS BY THE COMMISSION ON SPECIAL LICENSE PLATES</u> DURING THE 2007-2008 INTERIM

A. Applications Considered by the Commission

Completed applications for special license plates received by the DMV are forwarded to the Commission for consideration. The statutory criterion (Subsection 5 of NRS 482.367004) for approval of special license plate applications is for the Commission to consider, "without limitation, whether it would be appropriate and feasible for the Department to, as applicable, design, prepare or issue the particular special license plate."

The Commission held three meetings during the interim: March 3, 2008; April 14, 2008; and January 15, 2009. At the March and January meetings, the Commission did not consider any pending applications for special license plates since the 25-design cap on the production of special license plates had been met. The DMV reported that none of the active special license plates fell below the minimum number of active required registrations.

B. Hearing to Determine Whether Nevada Ducks Unlimited, Inc., Is or Is Not in Compliance With the Filing Requirements

During the March 3, 2008, meeting, members of the Commission also received a report from the Legislative Auditor concerning the charitable organizations that receive revenue from the issuance of special license plates. The Legislative Auditor reported that one charitable organization, Nevada Ducks Unlimited, Inc., had: (1) not filed the required balance sheet; (2) engaged in improper financial practices; and (3) failed to use adequate methods and procedures to ensure that additional fees imposed in connection with the issuance or renewal of a special license plate are expended only for the benefit of the intended recipient. The Commission voted to notify Nevada Ducks Unlimited, Inc., that it was not in compliance with the filing requirements.

Nevada Ducks Unlimited, Inc., requested a hearing to discuss the determination made by the Commission that it was not compliant with the filing requirements. On April 14, 2008, the Commission met and upheld its determination that Nevada Ducks Unlimited, Inc., did not comply with the filing requirements. The Commission requested that the DMV withhold additional fees generated by the registration of the charitable organization's license plate until the Legislative Auditor provided a report that Nevada Ducks Unlimited, Inc., complies with the financial reporting requirements required by law.

V. FINAL RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMISSION

At its work session on March 3, 2008, the Commission on Special License Plates considered four recommendations relating to special license plates in Nevada. The Commission adopted three recommendations for bill drafts and one recommendation to send a letter. Following is a summary of the recommendations adopted by the Commission on Special License Plates at its meeting for transmittal to the 2009 Session of the Nevada Legislature.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO DRAFT LEGISLATIVE MEASURES

A. Special License Plates and Motorcycles

Assembly Bill 278 (Chapter 88, *Statutes of Nevada*) of the 2007 Legislative Session required the Commission on Special License Plates to study the feasibility of the design, preparation, and issuance of special license plates for use on motorcycles. The results of the study, which included consulting with the DMV, indicate that it is possible for special license plates to be placed on motorcycles.

Therefore, the Commission approved the following recommendation:

Draft a bill amending Chapter 482 of NRS to allow Nevada's DMV, with respect to any special license plate that is issued pursuant to NRS 482.3667 to 482.3825, inclusive, and for which an additional fee is imposed for the issuance of the special license plate to generate financial support for a charitable organization, to issue a special license plate for a motorcycle upon application by a person who is entitled to such a plate. However, a special license plate for a motorcycle may not be combined with a personalized prestige plate. (Assembly Bill 109 [BDR 43–958, replaces BDR 43–364])

B. Member Salary and Per Diem Expenses

Testimony indicated that the Commission on Special License Plates is the only statutory committee of the Legislature whose members do not receive salary or per diem expenses for serving on the Commission.

Therefore, the Commission approved the following recommendation:

Draft a bill amending subsection 3 of NRS 482.367004 to require that legislators serving on the Commission be paid a salary and compensated for their travel and per diem expenses. (Assembly Bill 110 [BDR 43–959, replaces BDR43–365])

C. Annual Submission of Current Contact Information by Organizations With Existing Special License Plates to the Commission on Special License Plates and the Department of Motor Vehicles

Members of the Commission noted an organization may make changes to its officers, mailing address, or telephone number, which result in inaccurate contact information on file with the Commission and the DMV. Members stated that many of the organizations sponsoring a special license plate receive thousands of dollars each year from revenue generated by the sale of the plate and, therefore, it is important that the Commission have the most current contact information for each charitable organization. Members noted that each organization with an existing special license plate should submit a list of officers, current mailing address, and current telephone number to the Commission and the DMV on or before September 30 of each year.

Therefore, the Commission approved the following recommendation:

Draft a bill amending Chapter 482 of NRS to require that each charitable organization, not including a governmental entity whose budget is included in the *Executive Budget*, that receives revenue from a special license plate provide a list of officers, current mailing address, and current telephone number to the Commission on Special License Plates and the DMV on or before September 30 of each year. If the organization fails to provide this information to the Commission on Special License Plates or the DMV, the Commission may require that: (a) the DMV suspend the collection of all additional fees collected on behalf of the charitable organization; and (b) the DMV suspend the production of the particular design of special license plates from which the charitable organization receives additional fees, if the DMV is still producing that design. (BDR 43–366)

RECOMMENDATION TO DRAFT A LETTER

D. Animal Appreciation Special License Plates

The animal appreciation license plate funds are for the support of animal adoption and sterilization programs. Revenues from this license plate are distributed to counties throughout the State, based on sales in each county. The Legislative Auditor stated that during its annual review of financial information submitted by charitable organizations there were certain counties that have not received any revenue from this license plate, or the annual revenue is very small. Moreover, some counties were not familiar with certain requirements for animal appreciation funds or did not have adequate financial methods and procedures. The Legislative Auditor suggested to the Commission that it send a courtesy reminder to all counties receiving funds regarding these requirements.

Therefore, the Commission approved the following recommendation:

Draft a letter to each County Treasurer informing them that they may, on a quarterly basis, receive fees collected for animal appreciation special license plates for vehicles registered in that county (pursuant to subsection 5 of NRS 482.379175).

APPENDIX A

Nevada Revised Statutes 482.367004

NEVADA REVISED STATUTES

NRS 482.367004 Commission on Special License Plates: Creation; membership; term; service without salary or compensation; administrative support; duties.

- 1. There is hereby created the Commission on Special License Plates consisting of five Legislators and three nonvoting members as follows:
 - (a) Five Legislators appointed by the Legislative Commission:
- (1) One of whom is the Legislator who served as the Chairman of the Assembly Standing Committee on Transportation during the most recent legislative session. That Legislator may designate an alternate to serve in his place in his absence. The alternate must be another Legislator who also served on the Assembly Standing Committee on Transportation during the most recent legislative session.
- (2) One of whom is the Legislator who served as the Chairman of the Senate Standing Committee on Transportation during the most recent legislative session. That Legislator may designate an alternate to serve in his place in his absence. The alternate must be another Legislator who also served on the Senate Standing Committee on Transportation during the most recent legislative session.
 - (b) Three nonvoting members consisting of:
 - (1) The Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, or his designee.
 - (2) The Director of the Department of Public Safety, or his designee.
 - (3) The Director of the Department of Cultural Affairs, or his designee.
- 2. Each member of the Commission appointed pursuant to paragraph (a) of subsection 1 serves a term of 2 years, commencing on July 1 of each odd-numbered year. A vacancy on the Commission must be filled in the same manner as the original appointment.
- 3. Members of the Commission serve without salary or compensation for their travel or per diem expenses.
- 4. The Director of the Legislative Counsel Bureau shall provide administrative support to the Commission.
 - 5. The Commission shall approve or disapprove:
- (a) Applications for the design, preparation and issuance of special license plates that are submitted to the Department pursuant to subsection 1 of NRS 482.367002;
- (b) The issuance by the Department of special license plates that have been designed and prepared pursuant to NRS 482.367002; and
- (c) Applications for the design, preparation and issuance of special license plates that have been authorized by an act of the Legislature after January 1, 2007.
- In determining whether to approve such an application or issuance, the Commission shall consider, without limitation, whether it would be appropriate and feasible for the Department to, as applicable, design, prepare or issue the particular special license plate. The Commission shall consider each application in the chronological order in which the application was received by the Department.
 - 6. The Commission shall:
- (a) Approve or disapprove any proposed change in the distribution of money received in the form of additional fees. As used in this paragraph, "additional fees" means the fees that are charged in connection with the issuance or renewal of a special license plate for the benefit of a

particular cause, fund or charitable organization. The term does not include registration and license fees or governmental services taxes.

(b) If it approves a proposed change pursuant to paragraph (a) and determines that legislation is required to carry out the change, request the assistance of the Legislative Counsel in the preparation of a bill draft to carry out the change.

BDR 43-958 (Replaces BDR 43-364) Assembly Bill 109	Allows certain special license plates to be produced and issued for use on motorcycles.
BDR 43-959 (Replaces BDR 43-365) Assembly Bill 110	Requires compensation of Legislators serving on the Commission on Special License Plates.
BDR 43-366	Requires charitable organizations receiving proceeds from special license plates to periodically furnish updated information.
