Notice of the Hearing for the (adoption/amendment/repeal) of Regulations of the Nevada Board of Wildlife Commissioners

The Board of Wildlife Commissioners will hold a public hearing at 9:00 a.m., Friday, January 16, 1998, at the Henderson City Council Chambers, 240 Water Street, Henderson, Nevada. The purpose of the hearing is to receive comments from all interested persons regarding the adoption of regulations (**CGR 262**) pertaining to Chapter 503 of the Nevada Administrative Code.

- 1. **The need for and purpose of the proposed regulation:** Proposes to classify the common crow as an upland game bird so a hunting season and bag limit can be established for that species.
- 2. Text of the proposed regulation: (Attached)
- 3A. The estimated economic effect of the regulation on the business which it is to regulate:
 - (a) Adverse effect–No adverse economic affects are anticipated from this action.
 - (b) Beneficial effect-Additional recreation use-days would be generated if this action leads to an established crow season in Nevada.
 - (c) Immediate effect-None.
 - (d) Long term effect—Slight reduction in agricultural depredation losses from crows.
- B. The estimated economic effect of the regulation on the public which it is to regulate:
 - (a) Adverse effect-None, since this action only lists the crow as a game species.
 - (b) Beneficial effect—Could provide several thousand additional hunter recreation days if this actin leads to a crow season.
 - (c) Immediate effect-None.
 - (d) Long term effect-None.
- 4. Estimated cost to the Division of Wildlife for enforcement of the proposed regulation: Less than \$1,000 per year.
- 5.
