EMERGENCY REGULATION OF THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE DIVISION OF STATE PARKS OF THE STATE DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION AND NATURAL RESOURCES

(Effective for 120 days after December 4, 2012)

Section 1. NAC 407.055 is hereby amended to read as follows: Fees for use of parks. (NRS 407.0475, 407.065)

1. Except as otherwise provided in NAC 407.050 and 407.052, or unless waived, the Division will charge and collect the following fees for the use of parks:

- 2. A person who pays an entrance fee pursuant to subsection 1 is not authorized to use the facilities of the park from 10 p.m. until 6 a.m. unless he also pays the camping fee for the park.
- 3. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the Division will charge and collect from each person who rides a bicycle or horse, walks or enters by vessel into a park an entrance fee of \$1. The Division will charge and collect from each person who rides a bicycle into Spooner Management Area an entrance fee of \$2.
- 4. Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, the Division will not charge a fee for any vehicle that is towed into a park to provide transportation within the park.
- 5. The Division will charge, in addition to any other fee imposed pursuant to this chapter, a fee of \$2 for each watercraft in excess of two that is transported into the park by a single vehicle.
- 6. If a person purchases an annual permit to a park for a vehicle, the person may purchase at the same time a second annual permit to the same park at a discounted price equal to one-half of the price of the annual permit. The annual permit purchased at a discounted price must be for a vehicle registered to the same owner at the same residence as the owner of the vehicle for which the permit was purchased at regular price.

Statement of Emergency

NAC 407.055 Fees for use of parks (NRS 407.0475, 407.065)

For Lake Tahoe Nevada State Park, Spooner Lake, Off-Season Daily Park Entrance Fee

Current:

Spooner Lake, Entrance Fee Per Vehicle

\$8 per vehicle, \$2 per bike for vehicles with more than 4 bikes. No entrance fee charged if the concession for cross-country skiing is in operation.

Proposed:

\$8 per vehicle, April 15 – October 15 (on-season rate).

\$5 per vehicle, October 16 – April 14 (off-season rate).

\$2 per bike for vehicles with more than 4 bikes.

Remove stipulation for charging no fees if the cross-country skiing concession is operating.

JUSTIFICATION: The Spooner Lake unit of Lake Tahoe Nevada State Parks has been operated, in part, by a private concession. The concessionaire is Spooner Lake Inc. (winter time operation) and Flume Trail Bikes (summer time operation). This concessionaire has been in place for a number of years but the owner of the concession has elected not to accept the optional 5 year extension of his lease. As a result, the current concessionaire will end his lease operation at the Spooner, December 31st, 2012. As a result of the decision by Spooner Lake Inc. not to operate a concession at Spooner Lake, this winter the park will be operated by existing park employees and will not include the grooming of cross-country ski trails. During the upcoming winter, visitors will be surveyed as to their interests and level of amenities they would like to see in the future. It is anticipated the general public would appreciate access to park for various winter activities but may not need or be willing to pay for the level of trail grooming provided in the past. It is also believed that it is no longer financially feasible to provide an extensive snow grooming program. The staff at Lake Tahoe Nevada State Park are currently developing a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a replacement (summer only) concession but at this point are not planning on providing the same level of winter services. The initial comments from the public seem to indicate a high degree of interest in having winter access with fewer amenities but at a reduced rate. With the loss of a winter concession, comments from the public and the winter fee charged at Sand Harbor and Cave Rock, a fee reduction is being requested. Since it is not possible to make a permanent change in the fees without going through the NAC revision process, it would not be possible to adjust the fees for the upcoming season without requesting emergency authorization through the Governor, something we feel will be represent what is being offered and likely result in more park visitors.

Therefore, I request the Governor of the State of Nevada endorse this Statement of Emergency so that State Parks can adjust fees effective December 1, 2012.
