Informational Statement per NRS 233B.066

1. A clear and concise explanation of the need for the adopted regulation;

The Division of Public and Behavioral Health (Division) determined that existing Nevada Administrative Code (NAC) 450B needed to be reviewed with regulation additions and changes proposed. This amendment addresses expanding community paramedicine services, expanding the time in which an EMS provider must be found physically and mentally able to perform duties and expanding transporting time for trauma patients to trauma centers.

Expanding Community Paramedicine Services:

Existing regulations authorize the Division of Public and Behavioral Health (Division) to issue a service community paramedicine endorsement to permitted EMS agencies. However, many EMS agencies in rural Nevada rely on volunteer staff to meet demands of responding to 911 medical calls and do not have the available resources to provide the additional training required for EMS providers to obtain a community paramedicine endorsement. The purpose of this amendment is to expand the availability of these services by allowing a service community paramedicine endorsement to be issued to hospitals licensed by the Division pursuant to Nevada Revised Statute (NRS) 449.

Expanding EMS Providers Physical and Mental Capability for Performance Requirements: Existing regulation requires EMS providers to be found physically and mentally capable of performing duties within 6 months prior to applying for a license. This amendment proposes to expand the requirement to 12 months prior to license application to be consistent with National Fire Protection Association guidelines.

Expanding Transporting Trauma Patient Time:

Existing regulation prescribes criteria for transporting patients with injury to a trauma center and the time in which the transport must occur. This amendment proposes to adopt by reference the criteria in the "Guidelines for Field Triage of Injured Patients," published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Existing regulation further requires if a patient with an injury cannot be transported to a trauma center within 30 minutes, the patient is to be transported to the nearest hospital. Patients meeting trauma center criteria transported to a hospital without a trauma center are then transferred to a trauma center causing a delay in appropriate care. This amendment proposes to expand the 30 minutes to 2 hours to prevent the unnecessary transfer of a patient from a hospital to a trauma center.

No participants were present at the Elko or Las Vegas locations.

Ten people provided comment in Carson City, all in support of the proposed changes:

- Five people commented on the positive effects of hospitals providing community paramedicine services, particularly in rural communities.
- Four people commented the changes to the trauma center destination would benefit patients with trauma.
- One comment was specifically in support of the expanded time for providers to meet the physical and mental criteria for an Emergency Medical Services (EMS) provider license.

Nineteen people were noted on the Carson City location sign-in sheet as having attended the September 7, 2018, Board of Health meeting. A sign-in sheet was not used at the Las Vegas location because there was no public present. Pursuant to NRS 233B.0608 (2) (a), the Division requested input from currently permitted Emergency Medical Services (EMS) agencies. These agencies and Nevada Rural Hospital Partners were sent the proposed regulations and the small business impact questionnaire.

The Emergency Medical Systems Program posted the proposed regulation changes and the small business impact questionnaire to the EMS/Division website.

The questions on the Small Business Impact Questionnaire (SBIQ) were:

- 1) How many employees are currently employed by your business?
- 2) Will a specific regulation have an adverse economic effect upon your business? If so, please indicate the estimated dollar amount(s) you believe the adopted regulations will cost you over one calendar year with a brief explanation as to how the dollar amount was calculated.
- 3) Will the regulation(s) have any beneficial effect upon your business? If so, please include any cost savings you believe the adopted regulations will save you over one calendar year with an estimated dollar amount if applicable.
- 4) Do you anticipate any indirect adverse effects upon your business?
- 5) Do you anticipate any indirect beneficial effects upon your business?

Responses to the questionnaire:

Twelve business entities responded to the small business impact questionnaire. Eleven responses anticipate beneficial effects on their business. One response anticipated adverse effects on their business. The result of the small business impact questionnaire revealed mostly positive data for analysis.

- One EMS agency responded "yes" to a potential adverse effect asking how the 2-hour transport time to a trauma center would be determined. The agency was contacted and explained the EMS providers on the scene of the injury would determine the transport time. This explanation resolved their concerns with the proposed amendment.
- One EMS agency commented transporting patients to the current facility will benefit trauma patients.
- Rural hospitals responded positive to beneficial effects: unnecessary 911 calls and
 emergency room visits will be reduced; better care will drive more business as patients
 have a more positive experience; emergency room volumes and the associated excessive
 costs could be reduced.

The Division of Public and Behavioral Health Emergency Medical Systems Program has determined that the proposed amendments should not impose an economic burden upon a small business or prevent the formation, operation or expansion of a small businesses in Nevada.

No changes were necessary for these regulations.

There are no anticipated adverse economic effects on businesses which NAC 450B regulates or the public. The beneficial economic effect is anticipated to decrease the amount of unnecessary 911 calls and emergency department visits, which will in turn reduce the excessive costs incurred. These are both immediate and long-term benefits to businesses.

There is no cost to the Division anticipated for enforcement of the proposed regulations.
