SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to public health.  
(BDR 40-16)

FISCAL NOTE: Effect on Local Government: May have Fiscal Impact.  
Effect on the State: Yes.

CONTAINS UNFUNDED MANDATE (§§ 1, 2, 14, 15)

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets ~~omitted material~~ is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to public health; providing certain powers and duties in certain circumstances to a district health department in certain larger counties relating to public health in licensed gaming establishments; requiring the Department of Health and Human Services to establish minimum standards for cleaning in public accommodation facilities in certain counties; requiring the Department to adopt regulations requiring such a facility to adopt protocols and plans concerning the prevention of and response to SARS-CoV-2; providing for inspection of such facilities for compliance with such requirements; limiting the civil liability of certain businesses conducted for profit, governmental entities and private nonprofit organizations for personal injury or death resulting from exposure to COVID-19; authorizing the Secretary of State to suspend the state business license of a person that does not comply with certain health standards related to COVID-19; requiring the transfer of certain money to certain health districts for enforcement purposes; making an appropriation; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

**Legislative Counsel's Digest:**

- 1 Existing law: (1) creates a health district in a county whose population is 700,000  
2 or more (currently only Clark County); and (2) authorizes the board of county



3 commissioners and the governing bodies of any towns or cities in a smaller county  
4 to create a health district. (NRS 439.361, 439.362, 439.370) Existing law provides  
5 for the creation of a district health department in a health district. (NRS 439.362,  
6 439.370) **Sections 1 and 2** of this bill: (1) require a district health department in a  
7 county whose population is 100,000 or more (currently Clark and Washoe Counties),  
8 upon the request of the Nevada Gaming Control Board, to advise the Board  
9 concerning public health matters relating to licensed gaming establishments in the  
10 health district; and (2) authorize such a district health department, upon the request  
11 of the Board, to enforce regulations adopted by the Board concerning matters of  
12 public health against such an establishment.

13 **Sections 3-15** of this bill generally: (1) require the Director of the Department of  
14 Health and Human Services and district boards of health in a county whose  
15 population is 100,000 or more (currently Clark and Washoe Counties) to adopt by  
16 regulation requirements to reduce and prevent the transmission of SARS-CoV-2 in  
17 public accommodation facilities in those counties which apply only during the  
18 duration of a declaration of a public health emergency due to SARS-CoV-2 and  
19 during other periods in which conditions concerning the prevalence of SARS-CoV-  
20 exist; and (2) provide for the enforcement of those regulations.

21 **Section 11** of this bill requires the Director to adopt regulations requiring a public  
22 accommodation facility to establish standards for the cleaning of public  
23 accommodation facilities that are designed to reduce the transmission of SARS-CoV-  
24 2. **Section 12** of this bill requires the Director to adopt regulations requiring each  
25 public accommodation facility to establish protocols to: (1) limit the transmission of  
26 SARS-CoV-2; and (2) train staff concerning the prevention and mitigation of SARS-  
27 CoV-2 transmission.

28 **Section 13** of this bill requires the Director to adopt regulations requiring each  
29 public accommodation facility to establish, implement and maintain a written SARS-  
30 CoV-2 response plan that provides testing and time off for employees who have been  
31 exposed to SARS-CoV-2 or are experiencing the symptoms of COVID-19. **Section**  
32 **13** authorizes: (1) the Nevada Gaming Control Board to require a public  
33 accommodation facility under its jurisdiction to submit a copy of its written SARS-  
34 CoV-2 response plan to the Board; and (2) the health authority to require a public  
35 accommodation facility that is not under the jurisdiction of the Board to submit a  
36 copy of its written SARS-CoV-2 response plan to the health authority. **Sections 13,**  
37 **32 and 33** of this bill provide for the confidentiality of those plans. **Section 14** of this  
38 bill requires the Director to adopt regulations prohibiting a public accommodation  
39 facility from retaliating against an employee for participating in proceedings related  
40 to **sections 3-15** or seeking enforcement of those provisions.

41 **Section 31** of this bill exempts the regulations that the Director is required to  
42 adopt in **sections 11-14** from the requirements of the Nevada Administrative  
43 Procedure Act concerning the adoption, amendment or repeal of regulations.  
44 However, **section 10** of this bill requires the Director to allow any interested person  
45 to comment on the adoption, amendment or repeal of those regulations. **Section 10**  
46 also prohibits the Director from adopting regulations more stringent than necessary  
47 to carry out the requirements of this bill. **Section 15** of this bill requires a district  
48 board of health of a health district in a county whose population is 100,000 or more  
49 to adopt regulations that are substantively identical to the regulations adopted by the  
50 Director in **sections 11-14** and to subsequently amend or repeal its regulations in a  
51 conforming manner. **Section 14** provides for the enforcement by the health authority  
52 and the Nevada Gaming Control Board of the regulations adopted pursuant to and  
53 other provisions of **sections 11-15**. **Sections 16-22** of this bill make conforming  
54 changes.

55 **Section 29** of this bill provides that certain businesses conducted for profit,  
56 governmental entities and private nonprofit organizations are immune from civil  
57 liability for personal injury or death resulting from exposure to COVID-19, if the



58 business, governmental entity or private nonprofit organization substantially  
59 complied with controlling health standards. **Section 29** also: (1) requires the  
60 complaint in any such civil action to be pled with particularity; and (2) provides that  
61 such immunity does not apply if the business, governmental entity or private  
62 nonprofit organization violated controlling health standards with gross negligence  
63 and the gross negligence was the proximate cause of the personal injury or death.  
64 **Section 29** requires the court, as a matter of law, to determine substantial compliance  
65 with controlling health standards. **Section 34** of this bill provides that these  
66 procedures apply to any cause of action or claim that accrues before, on or after the  
67 effective date of this bill and before the later of: (1) the date on which the Governor  
68 terminates the emergency described in the Declaration of Emergency for COVID-19  
69 issued on March 12, 2020; or (2) July 1, 2023.

70 **Section 30** of this bill authorizes the Secretary of State to suspend the state  
71 business license of a person holding a state business license who does not comply  
72 with controlling health standards. **Section 30** requires the Secretary of State to  
73 provide notice of the suspension to the person. **Section 39** of this bill provides that  
74 the authority to suspend a state business license expires by limitation on the later of  
75 the following dates: (1) the date on which the Governor terminates the emergency  
76 described in the Declaration of Emergency issued on March 12, 2020; or (2) July 1,  
77 2023.

78 **Section 33.5** of this bill makes an appropriation from the State General Fund to  
79 the Legislative Fund for the costs of the 32nd Special Session.

80 **Section 35** of this bill transfers certain money to the applicable health districts to  
81 enforce **sections 3-15** and the regulations adopted pursuant thereto. **Section 36** of  
82 this bill requires the Director and applicable district boards of health to adopt the  
83 regulations required by **sections 11-15** by a prescribed date.

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THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN  
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** NRS 439.366 is hereby amended to read as follows:  
2 439.366 1. The district board of health has the powers, duties  
3 and authority of a county board of health in the health district.

4 2. The district health department has jurisdiction over all public  
5 health matters in the health district.

6 3. *The district health department:*

7 (a) *Shall, upon the request of the Nevada Gaming Control*  
8 *Board, advise and make recommendations to the Board on public*  
9 *health matters related to an establishment that possesses a*  
10 *nonrestricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0177 or a*  
11 *restricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0189 in the*  
12 *health district.*

13 (b) *May, upon the request of the Nevada Gaming Control*  
14 *Board, enforce regulations adopted by the Board concerning*  
15 *matters of public health against an establishment that possesses a*  
16 *nonrestricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0177 or a*  
17 *restricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0189 in the*  
18 *health district.*



1     **4.** In addition to any other powers, duties and authority  
2 conferred on a district board of health by this section, the district  
3 board of health may by affirmative vote of a majority of all the  
4 members of the board adopt regulations consistent with law, which  
5 must take effect immediately on their approval by the State Board of  
6 Health, to:

7     (a) Prevent and control nuisances;

8     (b) Regulate sanitation and sanitary practices in the interests of  
9 the public health;

10    (c) Provide for the sanitary protection of water and food supplies;

11    (d) Protect and promote the public health generally in the  
12 geographical area subject to the jurisdiction of the health district; and

13    (e) Improve the quality of health care services for members of  
14 minority groups and medically underserved populations.

15    ~~4.~~ **5.** Before the adoption, amendment or repeal of a  
16 regulation, the district board of health must give at least 30 days'  
17 notice of its intended action. The notice must:

18    (a) Include a statement of either the terms or substance of the  
19 proposal or a description of the subjects and issues involved, and of  
20 the time when, the place where and the manner in which interested  
21 persons may present their views thereon;

22    (b) State each address at which the text of the proposal may be  
23 inspected and copied; and

24    (c) Be mailed to all persons who have requested in writing that  
25 they be placed on a mailing list, which must be kept by the board for  
26 such purpose.

27    ~~5.~~ **6.** All interested persons must be afforded a reasonable  
28 opportunity to submit data, views or arguments, orally or in writing,  
29 on the intended action to adopt, amend or repeal the regulation. With  
30 respect to substantive regulations, the district board of health shall set  
31 a time and place for an oral public hearing, but if no one appears who  
32 will be directly affected by the proposal and requests an oral hearing,  
33 the district board of health may proceed immediately to act upon any  
34 written submissions. The district board of health shall consider fully  
35 all written and oral submissions respecting the proposal.

36    ~~6.~~ **7.** The district board of health shall file a copy of all of its  
37 adopted regulations with the county clerk.

38    **Sec. 2.** NRS 439.410 is hereby amended to read as follows:

39    439.410 1. The district board of health has the powers, duties  
40 and authority of a county board of health in the health district.

41    2. The district health department has jurisdiction over all public  
42 health matters in the health district, except in matters concerning  
43 emergency medical services pursuant to the provisions of chapter  
44 450B of NRS.



1 3. *The district health department in a county whose population*  
2 *is 100,000 or more but less than 700,000:*

3 (a) *Shall, upon the request of the Nevada Gaming Control*  
4 *Board, advise and make recommendations to the Board on public*  
5 *health matters related to an establishment that possesses a*  
6 *nonrestricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0177 or a*  
7 *restricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0189 in the*  
8 *health district.*

9 (b) *May, upon the request of the Nevada Gaming Control*  
10 *Board, enforce regulations adopted by the Board concerning*  
11 *matters of public health against an establishment that possesses a*  
12 *nonrestricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0177 or a*  
13 *restricted gaming license as described in NRS 463.0189 in the*  
14 *health district.*

15 4. In addition to any other powers, duties and authority  
16 conferred on a district board of health by this section, the district

4 ~~16.1~~ 7. Each district board of health shall file a copy of all of its  
5 adopted regulations with the county clerk of each county in which it  
6 has jurisdiction.

7 **Sec. 3.** Chapter 447 of NRS is hereby amended by adding  
8 thereto the provisions set forth as sections 4 to 15, inclusive, of this  
9 act.

10 **Sec. 4. 1.** *The provisions of sections 4 to 15, inclusive, of this*  
11 *act apply to a county whose population is 100,000 or more.*

12 *2. The regulations adopted pursuant to sections 11 to 15,*  
13 *inclusive, of this act and, except as otherwise provided in subsection*  
14 *3, the powers, requirements and prohibitions set forth in provisions*  
15 *of sections 4 to 15, inclusive, of this act apply:*

16 *(a) During any period in which a public health emergency due*  
17 *to SARS-CoV-2 has been declared by the Governor and remains in*  
18 *effect; or*

19 *(b) Each day on which:*

20 *(1) The rate of positive test results for SARS-CoV-2 in the*  
21 *county reported by the Division of Public and Behavioral Health of*  
22 *the Department exceeds 5 percent in any rolling 14-day period in*  
23 *the 90-day period immediately preceding that day; or*

24 *(2) The number of new COVID-19 cases in the county*  
25 *reported by the Division of Public and Behavioral Health of the*  
26 *Department exceeds 100 new cases per 100,000 residents in any*  
27 *rolling 14-day period in the 90-day period immediately preceding*  
28 *that day.*

29 *3. The provisions of subsection 2 do not apply to the*  
30 *requirements relating to the adoption, amendment or repeal of*  
31 *regulations pursuant to sections 11 to 15, inclusive, of this act.*

32 **Sec. 5.** *As used in sections 4 to 15, inclusive, of this act, unless*  
33 *the context otherwise requires, the words and terms defined in*  
34 *sections 6 to 9, inclusive, of this act have the meanings ascribed to*  
35 *them in those sections.*

36 **Sec. 6.** *“Director” means the Director of the Department of*  
37 *Health and Human Services.*

38 **Sec. 7.** *“Employee” means any natural person in the service*  
39 *of an employer operating a public accommodation facility who*  
40 *provides such service under any appointment or contract of hire or*  
41 *apprenticeship, express or implied, oral or written, whether lawfully*  
42 *or unlawfully employed.*

43 **Sec. 8.** *“Health authority” means the officers and agents of*  
44 *the district health department or, in a location that is not part of a*  
45 *health district, the officers and agents of the Division of Public and*



1 *Behavioral Health of the Department of Health and Human*  
2 *Services.*

3 **Sec. 9.** *“Public accommodation facility” or “facility” means a*  
4 *hotel and casino, resort, hotel, motel, hostel, bed and breakfast*  
5 *facility or other facility offering rooms or areas to the public for*  
6 *monetary compensation or other financial consideration on an*  
7 *hourly, daily or weekly basis.*

8 **Sec. 10.** 1. *Any regulation adopted, amended or repealed by*  
9 *the Director pursuant to sections 11 to 14, inclusive, of this act must*  
10 *not exceed or be inconsistent with the requirements of those*  
11 *sections.*

12 2. *The Director must allow any interested person a reasonable*  
13 *opportunity to submit written or oral comment concerning the*  
14 *amendment or repeal of a regulation pursuant to sections 11 to 14,*  
15 *inclusive, of this act.*

16 **Sec. 11.** 1. *The Director shall adopt regulations requiring a*  
17 *public accommodation facility to establish standards for cleaning*  
18 *that are designed to reduce the transmission of SARS-CoV-2. Those*  
19 *standards must require only the following and with no greater*  
20 *frequency than provided in this section:*

21 (a) *The use of cleaning products that are qualified by the United*  
22 *States Environmental Protection Agency for use against SARS-*  
23 *CoV-2 for the cleaning required by paragraphs (b) to (p), inclusive.*

24 (b) *Desks, tabletops, minibars that have been used after the most*  
25 *recent cleaning, interior and exterior handles of doors, faucets,*  
26 *toilets, nonporous headboards of beds, light switches, remote*  
27 *controls, telephones, keyboards, touch screens, bed linens, towels,*  
28 *bed scarves and other decorative items on beds in guest rooms to be*  
29 *cleaned every day that the room is in use unless the guest using the*  
30 *room declines in-room housekeeping.*

31 (c) *The following high-contact areas and items in locations*  
32 *used by the public and employees to be cleaned regularly*  
33 *throughout the day while in use:*

34 (1) *Fixtures with which guests and employees may be*  
35 *expected to have regular physical contact;*

36 (2) *Doors and door handles at exterior entrances;*

37 (3) *Door handles at interior entrances regularly accessed by*  
38 *guests and employees;*

39 (4) *Regularly used computer keyboards, touch screens,*  
40 *credit card readers, printers, telephones, light switches, ice*  
41 *machines, vending machines and other frequently used instruments*  
42 *and equipment; and*

43 (5) *Countertops and desks in entrance areas and other high-*  
44 *usage areas.*



1 (d) Glass surfaces, desks, tabletops, door handles and light  
2 switches in public areas to be cleaned regularly throughout the day  
3 while in use.

4 (e) Counters, desks, touch screens, keyboards, credit card  
5 readers and desktops in front desk areas to be cleaned regularly  
6 throughout the day while in use.

7 (f) Key cards and other types of keys for accessing rooms to be  
8 cleaned before those key cards or other keys are issued to another  
9 guest or removed from circulation for at least 24 hours after a guest  
10 checks out.

11 (g) Elevator buttons and rails in guest and service elevators to  
12 be cleaned regularly throughout the day if the elevator is in use.

13 (h) Sinks, faucets, walls, toilets, toilet paper dispensers and door  
14 handles in employee and public restrooms to be cleaned regularly  
15 throughout the day while in use.

16 (i) Work surfaces, tables, utensils, counters, touch screens and  
17 keyboards in areas used for food preparation to be cleaned  
18 regularly throughout the day.

19 (j) Tables, desks, tabletops, door handles and light switches in  
20 shared offices, employee locker rooms and employee cafeterias to  
21 be cleaned regularly throughout the day while in use.

22 (k) Exercise equipment, weights, tables, countertops, chairs,  
23 lockers and benches in fitness centers to be cleaned regularly  
24 throughout the day while in use.

25 (l) Tabletops in meeting rooms to be cleaned while in use.

26 (m) Tables, bartops, menus and check presentation holders in  
27 bar and dining facilities to be cleaned after use by a guest.

28 (n) Touch screens and keyboards in bar and dining facilities to  
29 be cleaned regularly while in use.

30 (o) Soiled laundry to be cleaned as necessary.

31 (p) Laundry carts and hampers to be cleaned regularly  
32 throughout the day while in use.

33 2. A public accommodation facility shall not advise or  
34 incentivize guests to decline daily in-room housekeeping.

35 3. An employer operating a public accommodation facility  
36 shall conspicuously post at each employee entrance and on each  
37 bulletin board where the facility regularly posts official  
38 communications with employees:

39 (a) A one-page summary of the standards adopted pursuant to  
40 subsection 1; and

41 (b) A list of key contact persons at public health agencies.

42 4. An employer operating a public accommodation facility  
43 shall make available to employees or their bargaining  
44 representative a physical or electronic copy of the standards adopted  
45 pursuant to subsection 1 upon request at no cost.





1       **Sec. 12.** *The Director shall adopt regulations requiring each*  
2 *public accommodation facility to establish protocols to:*

3       1. *Limit the transmission of SARS-CoV-2. Such protocols,*  
4 *must include only the following:*

5       (a) *Methods to encourage, to the extent reasonably possible:*

6       (1) *Employees to remain at least 6 feet apart from other*  
7 *employees and guests during their work and while on break.*

8       (2) *Guests to remain at least 6 feet apart from employees and*  
9 *other guests.*

10       (b) *A requirement that employee breaks must be structured to*  
11 *allow social distancing to the maximum extent recommended by the*  
12 *Centers for Disease Control and Prevention of the United States*  
13 *Department of Health and Human Services.*

14       (c) *A requirement that workstations must be separated by*  
15 *physical barriers or structured to allow social distancing where*  
16 *practicable to the maximum extent recommended by the Centers for*  
17 *Disease Control and Prevention of the United States Department of*  
18 *Health and Human Services.*

19       (d) *Requirements concerning the frequency of hand cleaning*  
20 *for employees.*

21       (e) *A requirement that each employee be provided with access*  
22 *to a sink with soap and water for hand washing or hand sanitizer*  
23 *containing at least 60 percent alcohol within reasonable proximity*  
24 *to the work area of the employee.*

25       (f) *Policies providing for the availability of hand sanitizer*  
26 *containing at least 60 percent alcohol near locations where*  
27 *employee meetings are held, breakrooms and cafeterias for*  
28 *employees, front desks, bell desks, lobbies, entrances to food and*  
29 *beverage service and preparation areas, principal entrances to the*  
30 *facility and, in a resort hotel, on the casino floor, if:*

31       (1) *Those areas are not near hand washing facilities with*  
32 *soap and water; and*

33       (2) *A supply of hand sanitizer containing at least 60 percent*  
34 *alcohol is generally available.*

35       (g) *Policies for the distribution, at no cost to the employee, of*  
36 *masks and, where appropriate, gloves, based on public health*  
37 *concerns.*

38       2. *Train staff concerning the prevention and mitigation of*  
39 *SARS-CoV-2 transmission in the manner prescribed by the*  
40 *Director.*

41       **Sec. 13.** 1. *The Director shall adopt regulations requiring*  
42 *each public accommodation facility to establish, implement and*  
43 *maintain a written SARS-CoV-2 response plan designed to monitor*  
44 *and respond to instances and potential instances of SARS-CoV-2*



1 *infection among employees and guests. The plan must include only*  
2 *the following:*

3 (a) *The designation of a person or persons responsible for*  
4 *overseeing and carrying out on-site enforcement of the plan. The*  
5 *regulations must not require such a person or persons to be on-site*  
6 *at all times.*

7 (b) *A requirement that each new employee and each employee*  
8 *returning to work for the first time after March 13, 2020, must*  
9 *undergo testing for SARS-CoV-2, if such testing is available.*

10 (c) *The designation of an area of the public accommodation*  
11 *facility where employees will check in every day to receive contact-*  
12 *free temperature measurement and review questions to screen for*  
13 *exposure to SARS-CoV-2.*

14 (d) *Requirements that:*

15 (1) *The public accommodation facility must notify each*  
16 *employee who is known to have had close contact with a guest or*  
17 *employee who has been diagnosed with COVID-19 not later than*  
18 *24 hours or as soon as practicable after the employer learns of the*  
19 *diagnosis; and*

20 (2) *Each such employee must undergo testing for SARS-*  
21 *CoV-2 and, in addition to any other leave to which the employee is*  
22 *entitled, be given:*

23 (I) *Not more than 3 days of paid time off to await testing*  
24 *and testing results; and*

25 (II) *Additional paid time off if the public accommodation*  
26 *facility receives documentation of a delay in testing or receiving*  
27 *testing results that exceeds 3 days.*

28 (e) *A requirement that each employee who otherwise has a*  
29 *reasonable belief or has been advised that he or she has been in*  
30 *close contact with a person who has tested positive for SARS-CoV-*  
31 *2 must undergo testing for SARS-CoV-2.*

32 (f) *Requirements that each employee who notifies his or her*  
33 *employer that he or she is experiencing symptoms of COVID-19:*

34 (1) *Must undergo testing for SARS-CoV-2; and*

35 (2) *Must not return to work while awaiting the results of that*  
36 *testing.*

37 (g) *Requirements that each employee described in paragraph*  
38 *(e) or (f) must, in addition to any other leave to which the employee*  
39 *is entitled, be given for the first occurrence on which the employee*  
40 *gives the employer such notification:*

41 (1) *Not more than 3 days of paid time off to await testing and*  
42 *testing results; and*

43 (2) *Additional paid time off if the public accommodation*  
44 *facility receives documentation of a delay in testing or receiving*  
45 *testing results that exceeds 3 days.*



1 (h) A requirement that, except as otherwise provided in  
2 subsection 3, each employee who tests positive for SARS-CoV-2 or
