INTRODUCTION, FIRST READING AND REFERENCE

By Assemblywoman Torres:

Assembly Bill No. 222—AN ACT relating to employment; making it an unlawful employment practice for an employer to take certain actions against an employee who reports, requests the correction of or refuses to engage in certain conduct; establishing procedures for certain civil actions concerning unlawful employment practices; revising provisions governing periods of limitation in certain civil actions concerning unlawful employment practices; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblywoman Jauregui moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Commerce and Labor.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymen Dickman, Wheeler and O'Neill; Senator Settlemeyer:

Assembly Bill No. 223—AN ACT relating to occupational diseases; requiring that when certain physical examinations are administered to a firefighter, arson investigator or police officer, the physical examinations must include a PSA test to screen for prostate cancer; requiring certain examinations of the heart administered to a firefighter, volunteer firefighter, arson investigator or police officer to include certain elements; requiring certain examinations of the heart administered to a volunteer

firefighter to be administered every 2 years instead of every 3 years; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblywoman Jauregui moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Commerce and Labor.

Assembly Bill No. 224—AN ACT relating to education; requiring that the annual report of accountability prepared by the board of trustees of each school district and the governing bodies of certain charter schools include certain information related to feminine hygiene products; requiring the provision of feminine hygiene products in the bathrooms of certain public schools; requiring the board of trustees of each school district and the governing bodies of certain charter schools to develop a plan to address access to feminine hygiene products; requiring the board of trustees of each school district and the governing bodies of certain charter schools to submit a report to the Legislature; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblywoman Bilbray-Axelrod moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Education.

Assembly Bill No. 225—AN ACT relating to education; requiring the provision of accommodations on examinations to certain applicants for an initial license as a teacher or other educational personnel; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblywoman Bilbray-Axelrod moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Education.

Assembly Bill No. 226—AN ACT relating to peace officers; revising the membership of the Peace Officers' Standards and Training Commission; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblyman Flores moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Government Affairs.

By Assemblywoman Carlton:

Assembly Bill No. 227—AN ACT relating to contractors; setting forth the persons who may perform certain types of work for a contractor;

revising the grounds for disciplinary action against a licensee by the State Contractors' Board; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblywoman Jauregui moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Commerce and Labor.

By Assemblywomen Brittney Miller, Gorelow, Monroe-Moreno and Thomas:

Assembly Bill No. 228—AN ACT relating to child welfare; prescribing the requirements governing the credentialing and operation of children's advocacy centers; providing that certain persons are immune from civil liability for actions or omissions in duties performed on behalf of or through a children's advocacy center; requiring the governing body of each county and each agency which provides child welfare services to ensure access to a children's advocacy center; creating an account to support children's advocacy centers; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblywoman Nguyen moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Health and Human Services.

Motion carried.

By Assemblywoman Cohen and Senator Ohrenschall:

Assembly Bill No. 229—AN ACT relating to parentage; adopting provisions of the Uniform Parentage Act; revising provisions relating to the establishment of a parent and child relationship and the presumption of parentage; establishing provisions concerning the voluntary acknowledgment of parentage and denial of parentage by certain persons; authorizing the State Board of Health to adopt regulations relating to an acknowledgment of parentage or denial of parentage; establishing provisions governing genetic testing in proceedings to adjudicate parentage; establishing and revising various provisions relating to proceedings to adjudicate parentage; authorizing a person who claims to be a de facto parent of a child to be adjudicated as a parent of the child in certain circumstances; authorizing a court to adjudicate a child to have more than two parents in certain circumstances; establishing and revising provisions relating to assisted reproduction and gestational agreements; repealing various provisions relating to parentage; providing a penalty; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblyman Yeager moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Assembly Bill No. 230—AN ACT relating to juvenile justice; eliminating the exclusion of certain offenses from the jurisdiction of the juvenile court; revising provisions relating to the certification of a child for criminal proceedings as an adult; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblyman Yeager moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.
