

ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 49—COMMITTEE ON JUDICIARY

(ON BEHALF OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL)

SUMMARY—Revises provisions relating to criminal procedure. (BDR 3-419)

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EXPLANATION – Matter in *bolded italics* is new; matter between brackets ~~fornitted material~~ is material to be omitted.

AN ACT relating to criminal procedure; authorizing certain persons to file and serve certain documents by electronic means; prescribing separate forms for certain postconviction petitions for a writ of habeas corpus; revising various provisions relating to postconviction petitions for a writ of habeas corpus; eliminating the requirement that the respondent to a postconviction petition for a writ of habeas corpus file a return with the court; revising provisions relating to a petition for a hearing to establish the factual innocence of a person; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Legislative Counsel’s Digest:

1 Existing law authorizes an offender who is convicted of a crime and under a
2 sentence of death or imprisonment to file a postconviction petition for a writ of
3 habeas corpus to challenge: (1) the validity of a judgment of conviction; or (2) the
4 computation of time that the person has served pursuant to a judgment of
5 conviction. (NRS 34.724) Existing law also authorizes a person who has been
6 convicted of a felony to file a petition for a hearing to establish the factual
7 innocence of the person based on newly discovered evidence. (NRS 34.960)
8 **Section 2** of this bill defines the term “prosecuting agency” for the purpose of
9 clarifying certain requirements relating to such petitions. **Sections 5, 10, 11, 13 and**
10 **20-24** of this bill make conforming changes to substitute the defined term where
11 appropriate.
12 **Sections 3 and 11** of this bill prescribe separate and distinct forms for a
13 petition for a writ of habeas corpus that challenges the computation of time that a
14 person has served pursuant to a judgment of conviction and a petition for a writ of



15 habeas corpus that challenges the validity of a judgment of conviction, respectively.
16 **Section 10** of this bill makes a conforming change by requiring each type of
17 petition to be: (1) appropriately titled; and (2) in substantially the form prescribed
18 by **sections 3 and 11**. **Section 2.5** of this bill authorizes a petitioner, under certain
19 circumstances, to file and serve upon certain persons each type of petition by
20 electronic means. Under **section 2.5**, the following may be filed or served by
21 electronic means: (1) a response or answer filed by a prosecuting agency; (2) a
22 copy of any decision or order served by the clerk of the court upon the petitioner or
23 petitioner's attorney; and (3) a notice of a decision or order delivered to the
24 petitioner or petitioner's attorney. **Sections 6, 7 and 17** of this bill make
25 conforming changes to indicate the proper placement of **sections 2.5 and 3** in the
26 Nevada Revised Statutes.

27 **Section 8** of this bill makes a nonsubstantive change to clarify that a person
28 may file a postconviction petition for a writ of habeas corpus without paying a
29 filing fee. **Sections 9, 10, 12-14, 16, 18, 19, 24.1-24.3, 24.5 and 24.6** of this bill
30 make certain other nonsubstantive changes in statutes concerning postconviction
31 petitions.

32 Existing law requires the respondent on a postconviction petition for a writ of
33 habeas corpus to file with the court: (1) a return, which includes certain information
34 relating to the basis on which the respondent has the petitioner in his or her custody
35 or power; and (2) an answer responding to the allegations of the petition. (NRS
36 34.430, 34.745) **Section 26** of this bill repeals the requirement that the respondent
37 file a return with the court. **Section 15** of this bill requires instead that the response
38 or answer filed by the respondent include the information contained in a return
39 under existing law. **Sections 13, 14 and 16** make conforming changes relating to
40 the elimination of the requirement that a respondent file a return with the court.

41 Existing law provides that: (1) certain written motions, written notices,
42 designations of record on appeal and similar papers must be served upon each of
43 the parties in a criminal proceeding and filed with the court; and (2) with certain
44 exceptions, any papers required to be served must be filed with the court in the
45 manner provided in civil actions. (NRS 178.582, 178.584, 178.588) **Section 24.4** of
46 this bill authorizes a person, under certain circumstances, to file and send or receive
47 service of a motion, notice or other legal document through electronic means.

48 **Section 25** of this bill makes the amendatory provisions of this bill applicable
49 to a postconviction petition for a writ of habeas corpus filed on or after July 1,
50 2023.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN
SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** Chapter 34 of NRS is hereby amended by adding
2 thereto the provisions set forth as sections 2, 2.5 and 3 of this act.

3 **Sec. 2.** *As used in this chapter, "prosecuting agency" means:*

4 *1. The district attorney of the county in which the judgment*
5 *of conviction or sentence being challenged in a petition for a writ*
6 *of habeas corpus was obtained, if the district attorney or a*
7 *deputy district attorney prosecuted the petitioner in the*
8 *original proceeding which led to the judgment of conviction or*
9 *sentence; or*



1 2. *The Attorney General, if the Attorney General or a deputy*
2 *attorney general prosecuted the petitioner in the original*
3 *proceeding which led to the judgment of conviction or sentence*
4 *being challenged in a petition for a writ of habeas corpus.*

5 **Sec. 2.5.** *1. A petition that challenges the computation of*
6 *time that the petitioner has served pursuant to a judgment*
7 *of conviction or that challenges the validity of a judgment of*
8 *conviction may be served by electronic means upon the officer or*
9 *other person by whom the petitioner is confined or restrained. A*
10 *copy of the petition may also be served by electronic means upon*
11 *the Attorney General or any other prosecuting agency.*

12 2. *A petition filed with the clerk of the district court for the*
13 *county in which the conviction occurred pursuant to NRS 34.738*
14 *may be filed electronically.*

15 3. *A response or answer to a petition filed by a prosecuting*
16 *agency pursuant to NRS 34.745 may be filed electronically.*

17 4. *A decision or order prepared by the court pursuant to NRS*
18 *34.830 may be filed electronically. A copy of the decision or*
19 *order may be served by electronic means upon the petitioner*
20 *and the petitioner's counsel. A notice of a decision or order may*
21 *be electronically delivered to the petitioner by the clerk of the*
22 *court.*

23 5. *The clerk of the court may accept a petition and a response*
24 *or answer to the petition that is filed electronically. A petition,*
25 *response or answer that is filed electronically may be converted*
26 *into a printed document and served upon a respondent or*
27 *petitioner, as applicable, in the same manner as a petition,*
28 *response or answer that is not filed electronically.*

29 6. *A petition, response, answer, order or decision that is filed*
30 *electronically shall be deemed to be filed on the date that it is*
31 *filed electronically if it is filed not later than 11:59 p.m. on that*
32 *date.*

33 **Sec. 3.** *A petition for a writ of habeas corpus that challenges*
34 *the computation of time that the petitioner has served pursuant to*
35 *a judgment of conviction must be in substantially the following*
36 *form, with appropriate modifications if the petition is filed in the*
37 *Court of Appeals or the Supreme Court:*

(5) You must name as respondent the person by whom you are confined or restrained. If you are in a specific institution of the Department of Corrections, name the warden or head of the institution. If you are not in a specific institution of the Department but:

(a) Within its custody, name the Director of the Department of Corrections.

(b) Under the supervision of the Division of Parole and Probation of the Department of Public Safety, name the probation officer or parole officer assigned to you at this time.

(6) You must include all grounds for relief which you may have regarding the computation of time served on your sentence. Failure to raise all grounds in this petition may



preclude you from filing future petitions challenging the same computation of time issue.

(7) You must allege specific facts supporting the claims in this petition. Failure to allege specific facts rather than just conclusions may cause your petition to be dismissed.

(8) When the petition is fully completed, the original and one copy must be filed with the clerk of the state district court for the county in which you are incarcerated, or, if you are incarcerated outside this State, the First Judicial District Court in and for Carson City. One copy must be mailed or electronically delivered to the respondent and one copy must be mailed or electronically delivered to the Attorney General's Office. Copies must conform in all particulars to the original submitted for filing.

41 **Sec. 4.** NRS 34.370 is hereby amended to read as follows:

42 34.370 1. A petition for a writ of habeas corpus must be
43 verified by the petitioner or the petitioner's counsel. If the petition is
44 verified by counsel, counsel shall also verify that the petitioner
45 personally authorized counsel to commence the action.

2. A verified petition for issuance of a writ of habeas corpus
must specify that the petitioner is imprisoned or restrained of the
petitioner's liberty, the officer or other person by whom the
petitioner is confined or restrained, and the place where



1 the petitioner is confined, naming all the parties if they are known,
2 or describing them if they are not known.

3 3. If the petitioner claims that the imprisonment is illegal, the
4 petitioner must state facts which show that the restraint or detention
5 is illegal.

6 4. If the petition requests relief from a judgment of conviction
7 or sentence in a criminal case, the petition must identify the
8 proceedings in which the petitioner was convicted, give the date of
9 entry of the final judgment and set forth which constitutional rights
10 of the petitioner were violated and the acts constituting violations of
11 those rights. Affidavits, records or other evidence supporting the
12 allegations in the petition must be attached unless the petition recites
13 the cause for failure to attach these materials. The petition must
14 identify any previous proceeding in state or federal court initiated by
15 the petitioner to secure relief from the petitioner's *judgment of*
16 conviction or sentence. Argument, citations and other supporting
17 documents are unnecessary.

18 **Sec. 5.** NRS 34.700 is hereby amended to read as follows:

19 34.700 1. Except as provided in subsection 3, a pretrial
20 petition for a writ of habeas corpus based on alleged lack of
21 probable cause or otherwise challenging the court's right or
22 jurisdiction to proceed to the trial of a criminal charge may not be
23 considered unless:

24 (a) The petition and all supporting documents are filed within 21
25 days after the first appearance of the accused in the district court;
26 and

27 (b) The petition contains a statement that the accused:

28 (1) Waives the 60-day limitation for bringing an accused to
29 trial; or

30 (2) If the petition is not decided within 15 days before the
31 date set for trial, consents that the court may, without notice or
32 hearing, continue the trial indefinitely or to a date designated by the
33 court.

34 2. The arraignment and entry of a plea by the accused must not
35 be continued to avoid the requirement that a pretrial petition be filed
36 within the period specified in subsection 1.

37 3. The court may extend, for good cause, the time to file a
38 petition. Good cause shall be deemed to exist if the transcript of the
39 preliminary hearing or of the proceedings before the grand jury is
40 not available within 14 days after the accused's initial appearance
41 and the court shall grant an ex parte application to extend the time
42 for filing a petition. All other applications may be made only after
43 appropriate notice has been given to the prosecuting ~~attorney.~~

1 **Sec. 6.** NRS 34.720 is hereby amended to read as follows:
2 34.720 The provisions of NRS 34.720 to 34.830, inclusive, *and*
3 *sections 2.5 and 3 of this act* apply only to petitions for writs of
4 habeas corpus in which the petitioner:

- 5 1. Requests relief from a judgment of conviction or sentence in
6 a criminal case; or
- 7 2. Challenges the computation of time that the petitioner has
8 served pursuant to a judgment of conviction.

9 **Sec. 7.** NRS 34.722 is hereby amended to read as follows:

10 34.722 As used in NRS 34.720 to 34.830, inclusive, *and*
11 *sections 2.5 and 3 of this act*, unless the context otherwise requires,
12 “petition” means a ~~[postconviction]~~ petition ~~[for habeas corpus]~~ *to*
13 *obtain relief from a judgment of conviction or sentence or to*
14 *challenge the computation of time a person has served* filed
15 pursuant to NRS 34.724.

16 **Sec. 8.** NRS 34.724 is hereby amended to read as follows:

17 34.724 1. Any person convicted of a crime and under
18 sentence of death or imprisonment who claims that the conviction
19 was obtained, or that the sentence was imposed, in violation of the
20 Constitution of the United States or the Constitution or laws of this
21 State, or who, after exhausting all available administrative remedies,
22 claims that the time the person has served pursuant to the judgment
23 of conviction has been improperly computed [,] may ~~[-without~~
24 ~~paying a filing fee,]~~ file a ~~[postconviction]~~ petition ~~[for a writ of~~
25 ~~habeas corpus]~~ to obtain relief from the *judgment of* conviction or
26 sentence or to challenge the computation of time that the person has
27 served. *A person must not be required to pay a filing fee to file*
28 *such a petition.*

29 2. Such a petition:

30 (a) Is not a substitute for and does not affect any remedies which
31 are incident to the proceedings in the trial court or the remedy of
32 direct review of the sentence or conviction.

33 (b) Comprehends and takes the place of all other common-law,
34 statutory or other remedies which have been available for
35 challenging the validity of the *judgment of* conviction or sentence,
36 and must be used exclusively in place of them.

37 (c) Is the only remedy available to an incarcerated person to
38 challenge the computation of time that the person has served
39 pursuant to a judgment of conviction, after all available
40 administrative remedies have been exhausted.

41 3. For the purposes of this section, a motion to withdraw a plea
42 of guilty, guilty but mentally ill or nolo contendere pursuant to NRS
43 176.165 that is made after sentence is imposed or imposition of
44 sentence is suspended is a remedy which is incident to the
45 proceedings in the trial court if:



1 (a) The person has not filed a prior motion to withdraw the plea
2 and has not filed a prior ~~[postconviction]~~ petition ; ~~for a writ of~~
3 ~~habeas corpus;~~

4 (b) The motion is filed within 1 year after the date on which the
5 person was convicted, unless the person pleads specific facts
6 demonstrating that some impediment external to the defense
7 precluded bringing the motion earlier;

8 (c) At the time the person files the motion to withdraw the plea,
9 the person is not incarcerated for the charge for which the person
10 entered the plea; and

11 (d) The motion is not barred by the doctrine of laches. A motion
12 filed more than 5 years after the date on which the person was
13 convicted creates a rebuttable presumption of prejudice to the State
14 on the basis of laches.

15 4. The court shall not appoint counsel to represent a person for
16 the purpose of subsection 3.

17 **Sec. 9.** NRS 34.726 is hereby amended to read as follows:

18 34.726 1. Unless there is good cause shown for delay, a
19 petition that challenges the validity of a judgment *of conviction* or
20 sentence must be filed within 1 year after entry of the judgment of
21 conviction or, if an appeal has been taken from the judgment, within
22 1 year after the appellate court of competent jurisdiction pursuant to
23 the rules fixed by the Supreme Court pursuant to Section 4 of
24 Article 6 of the Nevada Constitution issues its remittitur. For the
25 purposes of this subsection, good cause for delay exists if the
26 petitioner demonstrates to the satisfaction of the court:

27 (a) That the delay is not the fault of the petitioner; and

28 (b) That dismissal of the petition as untimely will unduly
29 prejudice the petitioner.

30 2. The execution of a sentence must not be stayed for the
31 period provided in subsection 1 solely because a petition may be
32 filed within that period. A stay of sentence must not be granted
33 unless:

34 (a) A petition is actually filed; and

35 (b) The petitioner establishes a compelling basis for the stay.

36 **Sec. 10.** NRS 34.730 is hereby amended to read as follows:

37 34.730 1. A petition must be verified by the petitioner or the
38 petitioner's counsel. If the petition is verified by counsel, counsel
39 shall also verify that the petitioner personally authorized counsel to
40 commence the action.

41 2. *A petition that challenges:*

42 *(a) The computation of time that the petitioner has served*
43 *pursuant to a judgment of conviction must be titled "Petition for*
44 *Writ of Habeas Corpus (Computation of Time)" and be in*
45 *substantially the form set forth in section 3 of this act.*

4. The court shall inform the petitioner and the petitioner’s counsel that all claims which challenge the *judgment of* conviction or imposition of the sentence must be joined in a single petition and that any matter not included in the petition will not be considered in a subsequent proceeding.

5. If relief is granted or the execution is stayed, the clerk shall forthwith notify the respondent [~~the Attorney General~~] and the [~~district attorney of the county in which the petitioner was convicted.~~] *prosecuting agency.*

6. If a district judge conducts an evidentiary hearing, a daily transcript must be prepared for the purpose of appellate review.

7. The judge or justice who considers a petition filed by a petitioner who has been sentenced to death shall make all reasonable efforts to expedite the matter and shall render a decision within 60 days after submission of the matter for decision.

Sec. 21. NRS 34.830 is hereby amended to read as follows:

34.830 1. Any order that finally disposes of a petition, whether or not an evidentiary hearing was held, must contain specific findings of fact and conclusions of law supporting the decision of the court.

during which a motion for a new trial based on newly discovered

TEXT OF REPEALED SECTION

34.430 Return and answer: Service and filing; contents; signature and verification.

1. Except as otherwise provided in subsection 1 of NRS 34.745, the respondent shall serve upon the petitioner and file with the court a return and an answer that must respond to the allegations of the petition within 45 days or a longer period fixed by the judge or justice.

2. The return must state plainly and unequivocally whether the respondent has the party in custody, or under the respondent's power or restraint. If the respondent has the petitioner in the respondent's custody or power, or under the respondent's restraint, the respondent shall state the authority and cause of the imprisonment or restraint, setting forth with specificity the basis for custody.

3. If the petitioner is detained by virtue of any judgment, writ, warrant or other written authority, a certified or exemplified copy must be annexed to the return.

4. If the respondent has the petitioner in the respondent's power or custody or under the respondent's restraint before or after the date of the writ of habeas corpus but has transferred custody or restraint to another, the return must state particularly to whom, at what time and place, for what cause, and by what authority the transfer took place.

5. The return must be signed by the respondent and, unless the respondent is a sworn public officer who makes the return in the respondent's official capacity, verified under oath or affirmation.
