SUMMARY—Makes an appropriation to the Other State Education Programs Account for the creation and maintenance of school gardens. (BDR S-557)

AN ACT making an appropriation to the Other State Education Programs Account for allocation to nonprofit organizations to provide programs for the creation and maintenance of school gardens for public schools; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEVADA, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 **Section 1.** 1. There is hereby appropriated from the State
2 General Fund to the Other State Education Programs Account in the
3 State General Fund for the cost of creating and maintaining
4 programs for school gardens that meet the requirements of
5 subsection 3 the following sums:
6 For the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 \$1,500,000
7 For the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 \$1,500,000



1 2. The Department of Education shall allocate the money
2 appropriated by subsection 1 to nonprofit organizations to provide at
3 public schools programs for school gardens which meet the
4 requirements set forth in subsection 3. In making allocations
5 pursuant to this subsection, the Department shall allocate not less
6 than 80 percent of the money appropriated pursuant to subsection 1
7 to fund programs for a school garden which will be implemented at
8 Title I schools, as defined in NRS 385A.040.

9 3. For a nonprofit organization to receive an allocation of
10 money to provide a program for a school garden pursuant to
11 subsection 2, the program must:

12 (a) Create and maintain a school garden at the school.

13 (b) Have a curriculum that:

14 (1) Includes a comprehensive science, technology,
15 engineering, arts and mathematics school garden program. Such a
16 program must include, without limitation, a science, technology,
17 engineering, arts and mathematics curriculum for outdoor or
18 hydroponic gardens for pupils in prekindergarten, kindergarten and
19 grades 1 through 12 that is tailored to pupils of the appropriate grade
20 levels at the school.

21 (2) Is written specifically for Nevada and the desert
22 environment of Nevada.

23 (3) Complies with the standards of content and performance
24 for a course of study in science adopted by the State Board of
25 Education pursuant to NRS 389.520.

26 (4) Uses experiential learning or project-based learning to
27 teach science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics.

28 (5) Is designed with the assistance of teachers and other
29 educational personnel with experience at the appropriate grade
30 levels at the school.

31 (6) Involves supervised learning experiences for the pupils at
32 the school in a classroom and a school garden.

33 (c) Provide the school with assistance from members of the
34 community, including, without limitation, trained educators, local
35 farmers and local chefs.

36 (d) Provide pupils with the:

37 (1) Ability to operate a farmers' market to sell the produce
38 from the school garden; and

39 (2) Opportunity to have a local chef or employee of a school
40 who works in food services demonstrate how to cook a meal using
41 the produce grown from the school garden.

42 (e) Establish garden teams comprised of teachers and, if such
43 persons are available, parents and members of the community. Each
44 garden team shall meet at least once each month.



1 (f) Require any local nonprofit or community-based
2 organization which will provide services to implement the program
3 for a school garden to have at least 2 years of experience
4 implementing such a program.

5 (g) Be identified as a high-quality science, technology,
6 engineering and mathematics program by the Office of Science,
7 Innovation and Technology.

8 4. Money allocated pursuant to subsection 2 may be used to:

9 (a) Provide professional development for teachers regarding the:

10 (1) Use of a school garden to teach pupils with disabilities,
11 including, without limitation, training for teaching such pupils
12 science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics curriculum
13 and vocational training to create a career path in horticulture;

14 (2) Development and implementation of science, technology,
15 engineering, arts and mathematics curricula that incorporate the use
16 of a school garden;

17 (3) Development and implementation of training that may be
18 provided to a group or individually to teachers in how to establish
19 and maintain school gardens to increase the time teachers allocate to
20 teaching science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics;
21 and

22 (4) Development and implementation of a food safety plan
23 designed to ensure that food grown in a school garden is properly
24 handled and safe to sell and consume;

25 (b) Pay for any travel expenses associated with the attendance of
26 a teacher at any training or conference relating to school gardens;
27 and

28 (c) Pay for the costs of a conference regarding school gardens
29 held in this State.

30 5. As used in this section:

31 (a) "Public school" has the meaning ascribed to it in
32 NRS 385.007.

33 (b) "School garden" includes, without limitation, a hydroponic
34 garden.

35 **Sec. 2.** Upon acceptance of the money allocated pursuant to
36 section 1 of this act, a nonprofit organization agrees to:

37 1. Prepare and transmit a report to the Interim Finance
38 Committee on or before October 1, 2024, that describes each
39 expenditure made from the money allocated pursuant to section 1 of
40 this act from the date on which the money was received by the
41 nonprofit organization through June 30, 2024;

42 2. Prepare and transmit a final report to the Interim Finance
43 Committee on or before October 1, 2025, that describes each
44 expenditure made from the money allocated pursuant to section 1 of



1 this act from the date on which the money was received by the
2 nonprofit organization through June 30, 2025; and

3 3. Upon request of the Legislative Commission, make available
4 to the Legislative Auditor any of the books, accounts, claims,
5 reports, vouchers or other records of information, confidential or
6 otherwise, of the nonprofit organization, regardless of their form or
7 location, that the Legislative Auditor deems necessary to conduct an
8 audit of the use of the money allocated pursuant to section 1 of this
9 act.

10 **Sec. 3.** Any balance of the sums appropriated by section 1 of
11 this act remaining at the end of the respective fiscal years must not
12 be committed for expenditure after June 30 of the respective fiscal
13 years by the entity to which the appropriation is made or any entity
14 to which money from the appropriation is granted or otherwise
15 transferred in any manner, and any portion of the appropriated
16 money remaining must not be spent for any purpose after
17 September 20, 2024, and September 19, 2025, respectively, by
18 either the entity to which the money was appropriated or the entity
19 to which the money was subsequently granted or transferred, and
20 must be reverted to the State General Fund on or before
21 September 20, 2024, and September 19, 2025, respectively.

22 **Sec. 4.** This act becomes effective on July 1, 2023.
