INTRODUCTION, FIRST READING AND REFERENCE

By Assemblymembers O'Neill and Dickman:

Assembly Bill No. 273—AN ACT relating to civil immunity; providing immunity from civil liability to licensed firearm dealers under certain circumstances; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Miller moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymembers O'Neill, Gray, Gurr, D'Silva, Cole, Dickman, Edgeworth, Hardy, Hibbetts, Kasama, Koenig and Yurek:

Assembly Bill No. 274—AN ACT relating to state business licenses; requiring the Secretary of State to waive the fee charged for the issuance of a state business license for certain businesses related to veterans; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Considine moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Government Affairs.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymembers O’Neill, DeLong, Dickman, Edgeworth, Gray, Gurr, Hardy, Hibbetts, Kasama, Koenig and Yurek:

Assembly Bill No. 275—AN ACT relating to criminal procedure; providing that the interception, listening or recording of a wire, electronic or oral communication by a peace officer or certain other persons is not unlawful in certain circumstances; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Miller moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Judiciary.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymembers O’Neill and Dickman:

Assembly Bill No. 276—AN ACT relating to taxation; increasing and providing for the adjustment of the gross revenue threshold above which the gross revenue of a business entity is subject to the commerce tax; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Backus moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Revenue.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymembers DeLong and Gurr:

Assembly Bill No. 277—AN ACT relating to taxation; authorizing the Department of Taxation to disclose certain confidential information relating to the taxation of the net proceeds of minerals extracted in this State; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Backus moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Revenue.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymembers Miller, Nadeem, González, Mosca, Anderson, Considine, Dalia, D’Silva, Jackson, Karris, La Rue Hatch, Monroe-Moreno, Moore, Nguyen, Orentlicher, Roth and Watts:

Assembly Bill No. 278—AN ACT relating to periods of observance; designating the month of July of each year as “Muslim American Heritage Month” in this State; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Considine moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Government Affairs.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymembers Orentlicher and González:

Assembly Bill No. 279—AN ACT relating to tobacco; prohibiting the sale, import, export, possession or constructive possession of certain vapor products; prohibiting the sale of cigarettes to persons born after a certain date

except on the premises of certain gaming establishments; revising provisions authorizing boards of county commissioners to adopt certain ordinances related to tobacco products; providing penalties; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Backus moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Revenue.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymember Jauregui:

Assembly Bill No. 280—AN ACT relating to real property; requiring, under certain circumstances, a landlord who collects from a prospective tenant any fee to apply to rent a dwelling unit to return such fees; prohibiting a landlord from collecting certain application fees for a minor in the household of a prospective tenant; requiring any written agreement for the use and occupancy of a dwelling unit or premises to contain separate appendices relating to fees and tenant rights; making it unlawful for a landlord or certain other persons to charge a tenant certain fees; temporarily prohibiting a landlord from entering into a rental agreement with certain existing tenants that increases the rent due from the tenant by more than a certain amount; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Marzola moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Commerce and Labor.

Motion carried.

By the Committee on Government Affairs:

Assembly Bill No. 281—AN ACT relating to the state militia; revising the benefits and compensation that a member of the state militia and the dependents of the member are entitled to receive if the member is wounded, injured, disabled or killed while on state active duty; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Considine moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Government Affairs.

Motion carried.

By Assemblymember Orentlicher:

Assembly Bill No. 282—AN ACT relating to health care; requiring a medical facility or a provider of health care who receives notice of or otherwise discovers a potential error in a medical bill to review the potential error and refund any overpayment; authorizing disciplinary action for the failure to comply with such requirements; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

Assemblymember Brown-May moved that the bill be referred to the Committee on Health and Human Services.

Motion carried.
