Senate Bill No. 288—AN ACT relating to fire protection; requiring the State Forester Firewarden to designate areas in this State with a high risk of fire hazards; requiring certain information concerning a property located in such an area to be included on a form for disclosing the condition of residential property offered for sale; requiring a governing body which issues building permits to notify an applicant that the site for which the permit is sought is located in such an area; and providing other matters properly relating thereto.

REMARKS FROM THE FLOOR

Senator Cannizzaro requested that remarks congratulating the Nevada Youth Legislators by Senators Cannizzaro, Lange, Dondero Loop, Hansen, Nguyen, Cruz-Crawford, Buck, Daly, Rogich, Scheible, Ohrenschall, Stone and Taylor be entered in the journal.

SENATOR CANNIZZARO:

I am very pleased to have with us today all of our Nevada Youth Legislators, who are each sitting with their respective Legislators on the floor, those of them who are here to join us today. You'll notice that many of you have the cords on your desk; these are graduation cords. The silver and the blue are representative of the Nevada Youth Legislature. Our graduating seniors will be

able to wear this regalia at their graduation ceremonies. You will all receive it from the Senators whose districts you are representing in the Nevada Youth Legislature today.

Since its creation in 2007, more than 230 high school students have been given an opportunity to serve as Youth Legislators, and the Nevada Youth Legislature program has received more than 80 state, national and international awards.

This afternoon, Youth Legislators will attend the Senate Committee on Education and hear the Nevada Youth Legislator's bill for this legislative session. It is Senate Bill No. 254, which establishes policies for substance use interventions for students. We are very excited to see that presentation and watch how they are able to handle their legislative duties in this building.

At this time, as I mentioned, we have these silver and blue commencement cords that acknowledge the successful completion of their Nevada Youth Legislature terms. This is my Nevada Youth Legislator, Kathleen McCarthy. She has just a wonderful Youth Legislator. We are very, very proud of her. I'm thrilled to have her as my Youth Legislator this last session and interim. She has done a tremendous job. She is a high school junior at West Career & Technical Academy, and she is the original author and the primary sponsor of this year's Nevada Youth Legislature bill. So, we are very impressed to see that come through the process and be an actual piece of legislation that we are going to discuss today. She is passionate about community service, education and, of course, highlighting the youth voice. She says that she has learned so much from the Nevada Youth Legislature program, created important connections, and is excited to see the program continue to grow and impact the community in the future. And I am just so thrilled to have her with me today. So, Kathleen, we have for you this commencement cord. I would love to be able to present you with this commencement cord, if that is okay. Excellent.

SENATOR LANGE:

The person sitting with me today, his name is Zhan Okuda-Lim, he is an alumni of the Youth Legislature. He was born and raised in Nevada, a proud graduate of Valley High School in Las Vegas. He served as a Youth Legislator from 2009 to 2011 and as NYL Chair during the 2010–2011 term. He remains actively involved as a mentor and a member of the NYL Board of Directors.

After earning his bachelor's degree in public affairs from Princeton University and his master's degrees in education policy and public administration from Harvard University and the University of Pennsylvania, Zhan returned home to serve as director of public policy and government relations at the Clark County Public Education Foundation. He currently serves as the assistant policy researcher at the RAND Corporation and as a visiting policy fellow with the Leadership Institute of Nevada and is a Ph.D. candidate in public policy analysis at the Pardee RAND Graduate School.

Please make him feel welcome.

SENATOR DONDERO LOOP:

I would like to very much introduce Sophie Cain. I am very proud of Sophie. She is a Faith Lutheran High School sophomore in Las Vegas, Nevada, and she is my Youth Senator from Senate District 8. She serves as youth president of Project Dot, where she has raised more than \$32,000 and led the distribution of 10,000 hygiene kits to support those in need. As a national delegate for the Girl Scouts conventions—go Girl Scouts—in 2023 and 2024, she helped shape policy decisions that impact scouts nationwide. Besides her leadership roles, she serves on the youth advisory board for Hope Means Nevada and contributes to *Mythology Crafts* by writing educational blog articles. She also runs—which I would ever aspire to do—the 100- and 200-meter races on the Faith Lutheran track and field team. Whether advocating for youth or leading service projects, Sophie is committed to making a meaningful impact in her community and has been a wonderful Youth Legislator. I am so proud of her.

And with that, Sophie, I would love to present this cord to you. Thank you very much, and thank you for serving.

SENATOR HANSEN:

I have as my Youth Legislator, for Senate District 14, I have Owen Chang. For those of you that have heard of Mensa, we also have Davidson Academy in Reno. I don't know, it's maybe a rumor, but you have to have an IQ of 150 or greater—it may be a rumor. But anyway, Owen is a high school junior, who attends Davidson Academy. He participates in speech and debate and

DECA. He is currently taking electrical engineering courses at UNR and enjoys playing Civilization 6. So, he is an exceptionally intelligent individual who is going to be an electrical engineer. Considering when I was a junior, I was taking geometry or something. This guy is taking electrical engineering courses at college levels—very impressive, Owen. So I, too, will give you your graduation cord. Please give Owen a big hand from the Nevada State Senate.

SENATOR NGUYEN:

I think this might be my favorite day of session. A point of privilege, this program—when I think of some of the things that we've created legislatively, and I know it's at the direction of Senator Weiner, who's also here and a former Senator from my district, in Senate District 3—I think of this program. The impact that these kids have and what they are able to bring forward is just incredible.

With me today I have my Youth Legislator, Jolie Nguyen—no relation. I wish she was. She has become one of my children, and her family has really become a part of the Senate District 3 family. I love that for our State, and I love that for my district.

She currently serves as the Vice Chair of the Nevada Youth Legislature, last session, and continues to advocate for policies that support students and families. She's worked with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department Office of Community Engagement. In fact, I think she's at every single event they've ever had, including some of their redevelopment and public safety initiatives that have taken place on Spring Mountain, which is just outside of Senate District 3. But [she's] really engaging the students that go to Clark that spend a lot of time in that Spring Mountain area making sure that those businesses and the students are safe in those areas.

In addition to that, you would think you were reading a resume of a 50-year-old, but we are talking about a high school junior. Her works in the community began in the sixth grade. She has always been involved in outreach efforts, including organizing dental clinics alongside her father as well as creating her own food distribution programs. She's dedicated to passing universal free school meal legislation for all Nevada students, and she's passionate about addressing policy challenges that impact youth and expanding resources for underserved communities. She is a junior at Clark High School, and she excels in AP coursework and actively engages in civic discussions. In fact, I know that she is here today, but she is planning on taking the SAT on Saturday, as well as probably a lot of other individuals in this room. I am just so excited to be a part of any development that she has in her leadership skills. She is a natural leader, and I know this will not be her last time here. In fact, she is helping me present a bill next Monday.

I would ask you to congratulate her, and at this time I would like to present her with these graduation cords for next year.

SENATOR CRUZ-CRAWFORD:

Today, I'm introducing my Youth Legislator for Senate District 1. This is Mackenzie Coughlin. We got to spend all morning together, and I was just as eager to learn about her as she was to learn about the legislative process.

She's a junior in the engineering program at West Career & Technical Academy and hopes to have a future career in chemical engineering. And the three schools she told me about were pretty impressive, so I am excited to support her in that journey.

She was born and raised in the district that I represent, and she is a lifelong Nevadan. She's passionate about giving back to the community, and she's had the opportunity to serve others during her term here at NYL. She has served her church group and her position as a candidate for the Leukemia & Lymphoma Society's Student Visionaries of the Year program. In her spare time—I don't know how she has spare time—she enjoys reading, exercising and spending time with friends and family.

As an educator, I am so happy to be able to support her through this process, and special recognition for you to have this cord next year during your graduation. Congratulations, Makenzie.

SENATOR BUCK:

I would like to introduce you to Senate District 5 Youth Legislator, Toren Wolf. Toren is a sophomore at Southeast Career & Technical Academy. He has a strong interest in the legislative process and is involved in several clubs and organizations to enhance his leadership skills as well

as serve the community. He is excited to engage with the representatives here and share ideas and learn from this experience.

So with that, I want to present him with his commencement cord. In a few years, you can wear that. Thank you so much for all you do. And make him feel warm and welcome.

SENATOR DALY:

I would like to introduce the Youth Legislator for Senate District 13, Jordan Chong. Jordan is a Davidson Academy student. He has represented the 13th District in the Nevada Youth Legislature since [2023]. In the Youth Legislature, he has honed his leadership and communication skills through meetings and activities. He has taken the responsibility of hosting international visitors and writing a bill draft request that represents youth issues of the State. In addition to the Youth Legislature, Jordan is interested in journalism and environmental science.

Let me present you with your graduation cord. Thank you. Please make him feel welcome.

SENATOR ROGICH:

It is my pleasure to introduce Matthew Chen, the Nevada Youth Legislator for Senate District 11. Matthew is not just a senior at Sierra Vista High School, he's a trailblazer, ranking in the top 0.01 percent of his class and excelling in multiple leadership roles. Talk about setting the bar high.

But wait, there's more. Matthew is a visionary with big dreams in marketing and public relations. He's determined to build a career that reflects his core values: empathy, radical inclusivity and uplifting marginalized communities. These aren't words just for Matthew, they're the driving force behind everything he does. His lived experiences have fueled his passion for creating meaningful change, and he's on a mission to make every place that he enters better, brighter and more welcoming.

As a Youth Legislator, Matthew is the voice of his generation, a champion for his peers and a beacon of hope for the future. His energy, passion and commitment to build a more equitable society are nothing short of extraordinary.

So, let's give a huge applause for Matthew Chen.

SENATOR SCHEIBLE:

I am very pleased to introduce my Youth Legislator, Ethan Cohen. He represents Senate District 9 in the Youth Legislature. He is the founder and president of the Jewish Student Union at his school. He is vice president of the Business Club, and an active member of the debate team in DECA, where he won first place in Nevada for the virtual business challenge. He participates in the Clark County Law Foundation's Youth Restorative Program, the Nevada volunteers youth council board, and supports organizations dedicated to improving the lives of Jewish people and Israelis.

Ethan testified just earlier this week on the importance of fighting antisemitism and recommended Holocaust education in public schools here at the Nevada Legislature. He also founded a project bringing in-person Holocaust education to schools and leads a youth-driven genocide education organization. For his work, he has not once but twice received the Las Vegas Review Journal's Academic Excellence Award.

He is an invaluable part of the Youth Legislature. I am so excited to have him here with me today and so grateful for your service, Ethan. I hope you all will join me in congratulating him as I present these cords which you can wear in two years. If you manage not to lose them, then you're ahead of a lot of high schoolers I know.

SENATOR OHRENSCHALL:

I am very lucky to have with me today my Youth Legislator for Senate District 21, Eric Conyers. It has been a life-long dream for Eric to work with the Legislature and work on legislation, and that has been his main focus in the Youth Legislature. He has been very active on education and mental-health issues. Today, he feels that dream has never been closer. He feels honored to be here among so many amazing people who work to progress Nevada, along with the youth who reside here.

Eric is a sophomore at Canyon Springs. And I learned today talking to Senator Weiner that our Youth Legislature program is probably the only program in the country—and the world—where the kids actually get to work on a real bill.

Today, Eric's told me he's been walking the halls, talking to Legislators on the Youth Legislature bill and really trying to shore up support for the idea the young men and women have come up with.

So, I am very honored to present Eric with the graduation cord—that will be about a couple of years from now—and I am very impressed by his work. and I'd ask the body to make him feel welcome.

SENATOR STONE:

I am very proud to introduce Daniel Obstgarten, who is my Youth Legislator from Nevada Senate District 20. He is captain of his high school Quiz Bowl team that qualified for the national championship. He's also vice president of the speech and debate team at Coral Academy of Science. Daniel has a passion for improving public education throughout Nevada and ultimately throughout the country. He believes phonics instruction is key to this end and is hoping to see this implemented on a wider scale than it currently is. He is planning on going to college to major in political science and ultimately go on to law school.

Please help me welcome Daniel as I present him with his graduation cord. Congratulations.

SENATOR TAYLOR:

It is with great honor that I stand to introduce to you the Youth Legislator from Senate District 15. This is Sitara Reganti. She is a senior at Sage Ridge School, which is one of the most high-achieving high schools not just in Northern Nevada but also in our State. I've had the pleasure of knowing her for the past few years. She told me she made her parents vote for me, so I really appreciate that. She has been our representative from Senate District 15 since the year [2023]. And she has a deep passion for causes like juvenile justice, and she is dedicated to advocating for Nevada's youth.

She is a senior, and so next year she plans to go to Washington, D.C., and get them straight—no, she plans to go to Washington, D.C., and study international relations. She's eager to contribute actively to the legislative process. She will be there this afternoon when they present their bill, and she is working toward meaningful change for the young people of our State.

So, please help me congratulate her as I present her with this cord—this is, I'm sure, the first of many—and let's make sure she feels welcome.

SENATOR CANNIZZARO:

I appreciate everyone allowing us the time. I think it is so important for us to acknowledge our Youth Legislators, who are doing a mock legislative session and bringing their bill draft request ideas to each other and having mock committee hearings and being able to take votes on that and ultimately end up with a piece of legislation that we get to hear right here in this building. I think it is very important for all of us to take a moment to acknowledge all of their hard work that they have been doing over this biennium and coming into this legislative session. Needless to say, after hearing all of those biographies, I certainly will be retiring from this building because I think they all might be more qualified than us to be serving as true representatives. They've done such an amazing job. Thank you for allowing us the time to honor all of these amazing Youth Legislators who are able to be here with us today.

But I also wanted to just take one moment to also acknowledge that this program is put together and sustained and supported by so many people on the Nevada Youth Legislature Board who are here with us. The Senator from Senate District 9 is part of that group. We heard about Zhan, who is also here from the board, Senator Joyce Woodhouse—a retired Senator—who is part of that board as well. And then, of course—one of my favorite people ever—Senator Valerie Wiener, who is the right person to lead this charge. She is truly committed to these students and committed to the cause and has always been someone who has been willing to reach out to the youth and let them know about the important work we do here and to help with that civics education. We are very grateful for your service.

And thank you, Mr. President, for allowing me the time to get to brag a little bit about the Nevada Youth Legislature program and allow us the time to acknowledge each one of these remarkable students.
