NEVADA LEGISLATURE-ASSEMBLY.

FIFTH SESSION.

FIRST DAY.

Monday, January 2, 1871.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution and the Statute, the Assembly was called to order at twelve o'clock noon, by the Hon. C. N. Noteware, Secretary of State.

The roll was called, and the following members elected answered to their names, took the oath of office administered by Justice Garber,

and subscribed thereto:

Messrs. Barber, Beck, Bowman, Buckingham, Burlingame, Brown, Canavan, Child, Cowen, Dangberg, Delano, Dovey, Ellyson, Fuller. Garaghan, Gray, Greenhalgh, Harris, Hatch, Hay, Hogan, Jones, Lawson, Likens, Lockwood, Lowery, Manning, McClelan, McLeod, Murphy, Owen, Organ, Patchen, Piper, Potter, Rogers, Roney, Savage, Saville, Simpson, Smith, Tennant, Trousdale, Wagner, Willard, Williams.

Mr. Tennant offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Assembly do now organize by election of permanent officers in the following order:

First—Speaker.

Second—Speaker pro tem.

Third—Chief Clerk.

Fourth—Sergeant-at-Arms.

Fifth—Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms.

Sixth—Assistant Clerk.

Seventh—Minute Clerk.

Eighth—Engrossing Clerk.

Ninth—Journal Clerk.

Tenth—Chaplain.

Mr. Beck moved to amend the order of business by striking out Chaplain.

Lost.

Nominations for Speaker being in order, Messrs. Robert E. Lowery and

John Bowman were placed in nomination. The first ballot resulted as follows: Lowery received 24 votes, and Bowman 20, Lowery and Bowman declining to vote; whereupon the Secretary of State declared Mr. Lowery elected Speaker of the Assembly.

Messrs. Beck and Williams were appointed a committee to wait upon

the Speaker elect, and conduct him to the chair.

The committee performed its duty, and the Speaker assuming the chair, addressed the House with a few appropriate remarks, and declared the Assembly ready for business.

A motion was made to adjourn until three o'clock P. M., which was lost. Mr. Williams moved to strike from the order of business Speaker

pro[tem.]

Carried.

Nominations for Chief Clerk being next in order, Messrs. Geo. W. Cas-

sidy and Andrew Whitford were placed in nomination.

On the first ballot Cassidy received 25 votes and Whitford 21; where-upon Mr. Cassidy was declared elected.

Mr. Bowman moved to adjourn until four o'clock P. M.

Lost.

Mr. Smith then moved to take a recess for one hour, which was ruled out of order.

Nominations for Sergeant-at-Arms were announced as next in order. Messrs. David Weaver and D. H. Pine were placed in nomination. The first ballot resulted as follows: Weaver 25 votes, Pine 21; whereupon Mr. Weaver was declared elected.

P. H. Burnham was placed in nomination for Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms, when Mr. Hogan moved to adjourn until 3:30 P. M.

Lost.

Messrs. P. H. Burnham and P. J. H. Smith were placed in nomination for Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms. On the first ballot Burnham received 24 votes, and Smith 22 votes; whereupon Mr. Burnham was declared elected.

Nominations for Assistant Clerk being in order, T. W. McGovern and Richard Rison were placed in nomination. First ballot McGovern received 24 votes, Rison 22 votes; whereupon Mr. McGovern was declared elected.

Minute Clerk being next in order, Messrs. J. P. Curtis and Theodore Davenport were nominated. Curtis received 26 votes, and Davenport 20; whereupon Mr. Curtis was declared elected.

Engrossing Clerk being next in order, Messrs. Robert Cavanaugh and W. J. Smith were placed in nomination. Smith received 24 votes, and Cavanaugh 22. Mr. Smith was declared elected.

Mr. Buckingham moved to adjourn for one hour.

Lost.

A motion was adopted, amending the order of business, and merging

the offices of Minute and Journal Clerk into one.

Nominations for Chaplain being in order, Rev. J. D. Hammond and Rev. J. P. Slayton were placed in nomination. On the first vote Mr. Hammond received 35 votes; Mr. Slayton, 6; scattering, 5.

Another motion was made to adjourn one hour, which was lost.

A committee, consisting of Messrs. Lockwood and Trousdale, was appointed to wait upon the Rev. Mr. Hammond and inform of his election as Chaplain.

Mr. Williams offered a resolution: That the Assembly meet the Senate in joint convention at 4 p. m., for the purpose of having the Governor and the Lieutenant-Governor elect, sworn in, which was adopted.

Justice R. R. Parkinson appeared and administered the oath of office to

officers elected.

On motion, the clerk was instructed to inform the Senate that the

Assembly was fully organized and prepared for business.

It being ascertained that the latest statutes required the election of a Minute and Journal Clerk separately, on motion, the Assembly went into an election of Journal Clerk.

J. C. Dorsey and Theodore Davenport were placed in nomination. On the first ballot Dorsey received 24 votes and Davenport 20; whereupon, Dorsey was declared elected.

Mr. Dorsey and the Rev. Mr. Hammond appeared and were sworn in.

On motion, the Assembly then adjourned until 3:45 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Assembly met pursuant to adjournment.

Speaker Lowery in the chair.

On motion, Messrs. Lockwood, Williams and Tennant were appointed a committee to wait upon the Senate, and inform that body that the Assembly was fully organized, and ready to meet in joint convention.

A message was received from the Senate returning Assembly concurrent resolution so amended as to have the convention held in the Assem-

bly Hall.

The committee returned, and reported that the Senate stood upon its dignity, and declined to act until the Assembly should have transmitted in proper form its concurrence in the Senate amendments to the resolution.

The Clerk transmitted the resolution in proper form, and the Senators

marched into the Assembly Hall.

Lieutenant-Governor Slingerland being invited to the chair by Speaker

Lowery, stated briefly the object of the convention.

On motion, Assemblyman Tennant and Senators Shamp and Hopkins were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and Lieutenant Governor elect, and escort them to the Assembly Hall.

On motion, Senator Bonnifield and Assemblyman Beck were appointed

a committee to wait upon a Justice of the Supreme Court, and invite him to come forward and administer the oath.

The first named committee returned and presented L. R. Bradley, Governor elect, and Frank Denver, Lieutenant-Governor elect, who were introduced to the Convention by Lieutenant-Governor Slingerland.

Chief Justice Lewis appeared; was introduced; and administered the

oath of office to the Governor and Lieutenant-Governor elect.

On motion, the Joint Convention adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Williams, the Clerk was instructed to inform the Governor that the Assembly was now fully organized, and ready to receive any communications he had to offer.

On motion of Mr. Lockwood, the Sergeant-at-Arms was authorized to

employ a fireman at \$4 per diem.

On motion, the Assembly adjourned.

House called to order at eleven o'clock. Speaker Lowery in the chair. On calling the roll, all members present.

Prayer by the Chaplain.

Motion by Mr. Tennant, that the reading of the minutes be dispensed with.

Adopted.

By Mr. Brown:

Resolved, That the rules governing the proceedings of the last session of the Assembly be declared the rules of this House until otherwise ordered by the adoption of new rules.

By Mr. Potter:

Resolved, That the Speaker be authorized to employ a boy as paper folder.

Mr. Tennant gives notice that at some future day he will introduce a bill, entitled "An Act to repeal all laws relative to the collection of four dollars poll tax as a condition of registration."

Mr. Burlingame gives notice that he will, on some future day, ask leave to introduce a bill for an Act to abolish the office of State Mineralogist.

Mr. Hogan gives notice that he will, at some future day, ask leave to introduce a bill, entitled "An Act providing for the removal of county seats, and the permanent location of the same."

ferred to Judiciary Committee; and ordered printed.

belonging to the State of Nevada."

Moved by Mr. Lockwood, that the rules be suspended, and the bill, together with the Governor's message, be referred to the Committee on Public Lands.

Second—"An Act to provide for the issue and sale of school land warrants."

Mr. Burlingame moved the rules be suspended, and that the bill with the Governor's message be referred to the Committee on Public Lands. Adopted.

Speaker decided the point of order well taken, whereupon Mr. Williams appealed from the decision of the chair.

Fellow Citizens:

Having taken the official oath, as Governor of the State of Nevada for the next four years, in this presence I render my grateful acknowledgments to the generous people who have intrusted to my hands the important duties of their Chief Executive.

Fully impressed with the magnitude of the interests involved in the well or ill-performance of the obligations resting upon me in the station to which I am called, I assure them that my only purpose and constant

effort shall be to do my whole duty without fear or favor.

It ought to be remembered by each Department of the Government that it was created by the people for the purpose of preserving their rights and promoting their prosperity. It must not be forgotten that the Government belongs to the people, and that the inestimable right of self-government is lost when the people shall consent to belong to the Government. The innate love of liberty in the heart of every true American, and the conscious feeling of personal independence which pervades the breast of every citizen of this free Republic, will always keep our people ready and able to rebuke the arrogance of office, and to repress every

selfish attempt of power to invade the rights of our people.

The brief history of Nevada is full of promise. But a few short years since our State was only known to the world as a wonderful mining camp. Now, though our mining fields are distinguished among the richest on the globe, and are known to extend from California to Utah, and from Idaho to Arizona, mining is not our only—possibly, not our best—source of wealth and future prosperity. Our genial climate and productive soil are yielding rich rewards to the husbandman. Our very large grazing fields, unequaled in the richness of their natural grasses, are making us distinguished for our flocks and herds. Our superior and abounding hydraulic power is being utilized, and at a day, not remote, our fabrics will take their place in the marts of the world. Our school system is extending its benefits to every portion of our State, and a judicious management of the munificent endowment for that purpose will soon make our educational advantages equal to any.

The great Trans-Continental Railroad passing through our midst makes us neighbor to New York and the broad Atlantic on the one hand, and to San Francisco and the great Pacific on the other. Temples in almost

every hamlet are dedicated to the worship of Almighty God.

With wise and just laws dispensing the benefits and burdens of the

Government upon all alike, we shall be blessed indeed.

Let us render the homage of grateful hearts to Him from whom all blessings come.

Lieutenant-Governor Slingerland declared the Joint Convention adjourned sine die.

STATE OF NEVADA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CARSON CITY, March 6th, 1869.

To Honorable C. N. Noteware, Secretary of State, State of Nevada:

Herewith I deposit with you Assembly Bill No. 128, entitled "An Act to provide for the issue and sale of school land warrants," without my approval. The same came into my hands about fifteen minutes before the final adjournment of the Legislature, March 4, 1869. My objections to, and recover for not approximately this bill was a following.

and reasons for not approving, this bill are as follows:

Sections four (4), five (5), and seven (7) thereof provide that certain duties shall be performed by the "State Board of Land Commissioners." I know of no law of the State recognizing any such officers; and as the bill, if it become a law, would be practically inoperative, unless there were such officers as are named therein, I do not think it expedient to cumber the statutes with an Act which in itself would be of no probable validity.

I herewith deposit with you, Senate Substitute for Assembly Bill No. 129, entitled "An Act to provide for the selection and sale of the school lands belonging to the State of Nevada," without my approval. This bill was delivered to, and received by, me on the 4th day of March, 1869,—the day of the final adjournment of the Legislature for the second biennial session. As I do not approve the bill, you will lay it before the Senate, when the Legislature shall next be in session, together with my objections thereto, herein set forth, as required by section thirty-five, article four of the constitution.

The principal feature of the bill, and the objections to it, are these: First—It creates a Board of Land Commissioners, the duties assigned

to which are now performed by the Board of Regents of the State Un-

iversity, without cost or charge to the State.

Second—It confers the power on the Board of Land Commissioners to elect a State Land Register, at a salary of two hundred and fifty dollars per month; whereas, the Surveyor-General of the State, under existing laws, is ex officio State Land Register; and having been elected to the office of Surveyor-General, since the passage of the law making him such, is, by the Constitution, entitled to the fees and emoluments of such office, for the full term for which he was elected, to wit: until the first Monday of January, 1871,—being the sum of twenty-six hundred (\$2,600) [dollars] per year, for two years.

Third—It authorizes the procurement of an office and the allowance of office expenses, thereby to the extent of office rent, at least, increasing the charge against the State, and it will therefore be seen that, the State being obligated to pay the salary of the ex officio Register in any event—that the salaries of the Land Commissioners, the Register to be elected by them, and rent of office, agent to select lands at ten dollars per day and his expenses—perhaps ten dollars per day additional, will, at a moderate estimate, cost the State ten thousand dollars more per annum, by

the proposed Act, than it does under existing laws.

Fourth—By section thirteen of the bill, [all] incidental expenses incurred under the Act may be paid, without presentation to, or allowance by, the State Board of Examiners; and this in palpable violation of section

twenty-one, article five, of the constitution.

Fifth—Under the section of the bill last referred to, "the compensation of the State Register, Locating Agent and Commissioners, and all incidental expenses authorized by this Act, shall be paid out of any moneys coming into the School Fund after the passage of this Act." This is in violation, as I believe, of section three, article eleven of the constitution, which solemnly pledges these lands and the proceeds thereof, for educational purposes, without abatement or diminution of the principal sum derived therefrom. Most certainly this will not be controverted, so far as it applies to the ninety thousand (90,000) acres, granted to the State for an Agricultural or Mining College, as the Legislature, in accepting the grant, entered into a compact with the Federal Government to the effect that the State must provide the means, from its ordinary sources of revenue, to pay the expenses of selling the same and investing the proceeds. It has been so held by our Supreme Court, in the recent case of the State Ex-Rel. Greenebaum vs. Rhoades, State Treasurer.

Numerous other objections, but of less moment than those already enumerated, might be stated, to this bill. Suffice it to say—the Act of April 2d, 1867, which it proposes to repeal and supersede—defective as it is, and sadly wanting amendment in many particulars, to which the attention of the Legislature was called, by executive communication, at the beginning of the late session—is far better, less expensive, and measurably free of the constitutional objections apparent in this bill; and had better remain in force until more considerate legislation can be had in relation to this valuable trust, which has been confided to our keeping—the

care, management and disposition of our School Fund.

The Governor's veto message to Senate Bill No. 7, entitled "An Act to create Legislative Funds," was received and read as follows:

STATE OF NEVADA, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, CARSON CITY, January 24th, 1871.

To the Honorable the Senate of Nevada:

I herewith return without approval the bill entitled "An Act to create Legislative Funds," which originated in your House, briefly stating my objections thereto.

I regard it as belonging to that class of legislation commonly denominated special, and, therefore, opposed to the letter and spirit of article

four, section twenty-one, of the Constitution.

If a measure of that kind is necessary at all, a bill can be easily framed which will place all of the creditors of the State on the same footing. This bill, however, discriminates in favor of a limited number of those persons, making them preferred creditors; and postpone the payment of past obligations, which the State is in honor bound to satisfy for the purpose of first discharging the claims of members of one branch of the Government. Such legislation is not only unconstitutional, but unjust, and should be avoided.

In my judgment, that portion of the bill relating to the salaries of members of the Legislature, by indirection, increases their compensation during the term for which they have been elected, and is therefore in violation of the provisions of article four, section thirty-eight of the Constitution; and that part of it which makes provision for the incidental expenses of the Legislature conflicts with article five, section twenty-one of the Constitution.

It is not questioned that the effect of the bill is to add some \$10,000 or \$12,000 to the liabilities of the State on account of the salaries of members of the present Legislature, nor can it be denied that they will be the recipients of a corresponding benefit. As a consequence, should it become a law, members of the Legislature will be adding to their compensation during the term for which they have been elected, which, as before stated, is prohibited by the Constitution.

All readily admit that the addition directly of any sum whatever to the per diem of members of the Legislature, by action of the two Houses interested, is a violation of the Constitution. I think it equally a violation of that instrument to reach the same, and by any other means, however indirect.

The last clause of article five, section two, of the Constitution, expressly declares that no claim against the State (except salaries or compensation of officers fixed by law,) should be passed upon by the Legislature without having been considered and acted upon by the Board of Examiners.

The bill expressly sets apart nine thousand dollars to be used by the Sergeant-at-Arms of the two Houses to be paid out as directed by resolution of those bodies. Justice to the members of the Legislature demands the presumption that they will not order any portion of the money mentioned to be paid out, except in the discharge of just claims held by other parties, nor can we presume that they will order the payment of claims held against themselves or their Sergeant-at-Arms. In a word, it is only fair and reasonable to suppose that orders will be confined to the payment of claims properly chargeable to, and payable by the State; and if such claims only are to be paid out of that fund, then it is clear that before the payment can constitutionally be ordered by the Legislature, they must be acted upon by the Board of Examiners.

I am aware that my conclusions upon the subject under consideration differ from those of the Supreme Court, as represented in Ash vs. Park-

inson, 5 Nevada Reports.

On questions of Constitutional law, I will at all times, when I can conscientiously do so, take pleasure in being guided by the judiciary, but when their reasoning fails to convince my judgment of the correctness of their conclusions, duty, and my official oath require that I follow the dictates of my own conscience.

Our Government is divided into three independent departments; the officers in each take the same oath; neither swears to support the Constitution as construed by the others, but each declares, in effect that he will do so to the best of his ability, as dictated by his judgment and conscience.

During my term of office, I shall endeavor to comply with the obligations which I assumed at the beginning. I cannot do so by following advice which my judgment repudiates.

In conclusion, allow me to add, that I stand pledged to the people of this State to observe the strictest economy possible in the administration of the office of Governor.

It is my purpose to fulfill the pledge to the best of my ability.

and for the county of Ormsby, was duly appointed trustee for the inhabitants of Carson City. That pursuant to an Act of the Legislature of Nevada, approved January 31st, 1866, application was duly made on the part of the State of Nevada for a title deed of said plaza grounds in Carson City; that in compliance with said statute, due notice was given to any and all parties interested, to file counter claims to said grounds, if any existed. That it appears by the record of proceedings of said trustee, that no other claim of title to said grounds was set up. That after the expiration of the time of notice required by law, said Samuel H. Wright, Judge and Trustee as aforesaid, duly granted and conveyed, by deed properly executed and acknowledged, to H. G. Blasdel, then Governor of this State, for the sole use and occupancy of the State, title to said Plaza. That said deed was executed on the fifth day of September, A. D. 1867, duly recorded in the Ormsby County Record, Dec. 23, 1867, and filed and recorded in the Secretary of State's office January 1, 1868.

In view of the foregoing facts, your committee unanimously concur in the opinion that the *title* of the State to the Capitol grounds is perfect.

The Lincoln County delegation, relative to Senate Substitute Bill for Senate Bill No. 54: "An Act to change the county seat of Lincoln County," made the following report:

Mr. Speaker:

Your committee having had under consideration Senate Substitute Bill for Senate Bill No. 54, entitled "An Act to change the county seat of Lincoln (County "respectfully report or follows:

Lincoln County," respectfully report as follows:

Article four, section twenty, of Nevada Constitution reads: "The Legislature shall not pass local or special laws in any of the following enumerated cases; that is to say:

"Regulating the jurisdiction and duties of Justices of the Peace and

Constables."

"For the punishment of crimes and misdemeanors."

"Regulating the practice of Courts of justice."

"Providing for changing the venue in civil and criminal cases."

"Granting divorces."

"Changing the names of persons."

"Vacating roads, town plots, streets, alleys, and public squares."

"Summoning and impanelling grand and petit juries, and providing for their compensation."

"Regulating county and township business," etc.

Section twenty-one of article four of the same instrument reads: "In all cases enumerated in the preceding section, and in all cases where a general law can be made applicable, all laws shall be general and of uni-

form operation throughout the State."

The only case where a county seat was removed by act of the Legislature, was the removal of the county seat of Nye County, from Ione to Belmont, (Nev. Stat. 1867, page 47,) which is not a precedent, for the following reasons: At the time the bill was passed, there was no general law on the statutes governing the removal of county seats. Governor Blasdel, in signing the bill, called the attention of the Legislature to the fact that his action in this particular instance must not be deemed a conclusive criterion by which to be governed in future cases of like character. "I believe, as a rule, that county seats should be changed by the popular vote of the qualified electors of the county interested." (Senate Journal, third session, page 103.)

In deference to the suggestion of his Excellency, the Legislature passed a general law governing the removal of county seats, approved March 2d,

1867.

This general law required the Board of County Commissioners of any county to order an election to be held within fifty days, whenever three fifths of the legal voters of the county petition them to do so. Under this law, all matters relating to the removal of county seats was at once removed from the halls of the Legislature to the voting precincts of the county interested. The Registration Act of 1866, (page 83,) required the registry books to be kept open only ten days for special elections, such as would seem to be necessitated by the circumstances of the present case. Thus, the removal of a county seat could not under any circumstances be delayed longer than fifty days, and might be completed in as short a space of time as twenty days. The Act gave general satisfaction.

In 1869, the Legislature repealed the registration act of 1866, and enacted the present law, under which forty days are required for registration, and ten for challenging the votes registered, thus allowing fifty days to elapse: but, as the law for the removal of county seats required the election to be held within fifty days, a conflict was made between the law to remove county seats and the registry law. The Supreme Court lay all the

blame on the Legislature of 1869, and declare it to be "another instance of too much legislation." (See decision in the Washoe County case.)

The whole objection was as to the time, and not to the Constitutional

question.

Your committee would call the attention of the House to the fact that Assembly Bill No. 63, which unanimously passed this House about a week ago, required the register to be kept open but twenty days, and ten days in which to challenge the right of any person registered to vote, thus requiring only thirty days time from the opening to the closing of the registration books, instead of fifty, as required by the law of 1869. If the Assembly Bill No. 63 becomes a law, (it has passed the House, and your committee is advised will pass the Senate,) then the old law of 1867, providing for the removal of county seats will become operative. Your committee would further state, that a bill for the removal of county seats has passed the House some time ago, which overcomes the objection of time, viz: By allowing sixty days in which to complete the election.

If either of the bills referred to pass the Senate, there will be no urgent

necessity for special legislation.

Your committee is not prepared to say positively whether the removal of a county seat by direct action of the Legislature comes within the prohibition of the Constitution in article four, sections twenty and twenty-one, forbidding special legislation; but is of the opinion that it is certainly contrary to the spirit of our Constitution.

In this particular case there are so many different views entertained as to where the county seat should be permanently located, that your committee can see no way of giving general satisfaction except by submitting

the matter to a vote of the people.

A portion of the people believe that the county seat should remain at Hiko, and some arrangement be made for holding Court at two or three places in the county. They urge that Hiko will accommodate the western and southern parts of the county of Lincoln much better than any other place. And they further urge that the numerous mining camps in the south and southwest are of exceeding great promise, and that their future wants should be regarded. Another portion of the people believe that if the county seat be moved it should not be to Pioche, but to either Panacca City or Bullionville—points only ten miles distant from Pioche. They urge that either Panacca City or Bullionville should be selected, for the following reasons:

First—The cost of public buildings would not be one half of what it

would be in Pioche—water and land being in abundance.

Second—The cost of holding Court, keeping prisoners, etc., would be much less.

Third—It would suit the people of the west and southwest on account

of being more centrally located.

In this view the Representative, Senator, Judge elect, Recorder, Sheriff, one of the County Commissioners and several of the largest taxpayers

in the county, concur.

Your committee is further advised, that if submitted to a vote of the people, the county seat would not be located at Pioche, simply on the ground of its location in a remote corner of the county so near the northern line of said county that there appears to be a question whether it be in the county of Lincoln or Nye. The County Surveyor of Nye, in a letter to one of the delegation from that county, expresses the opinion that Pioche is in Nye County, from which opinion your committee dissent;

this fact is only introduced in the hope that it may guard the Legislature against the possibility of locating the county seat of one county within the boundaries and jurisdiction of another.

As between Hiko and Pioche, that a large number of people desire its location at Pioche cannot be denied; but your committee has not been

able to find any one outside of Pioche who desires such location.

The population of Lincoln County, as reported by the Census Marshal, was in September, 1870, three thousand nine hundred and fifty-five (3,955). It is not claimed that Pioche had more than twelve hundred, or at the most, fifteen hundred (1,500) population at that time, consequently your committee find that there was in September, 1870, from twenty-four hundred to twenty-seven hundred population in Lincoln County exclusive of Pioche.

It is the opinion of your committee that these people should be consulted on a matter of such great importance as the location of a county seat. These people, it is true, have heretofore refused to acknowledge the jurisdiction of the State of Nevada, they holding that they were in Utah. The recent survey has set that matter at rest, and we may look to see them become valuable citizens of the State and county.

In view of the foregoing your committee would recommend that the

bill do not pass.

The undersigned, a minority of the Humboldt delegation, to which was referred Sevate Bill No. 168: "An Act to remove the county seat of Humboldt County," respectfully submit the following report:

Upon a careful examination of the subject we find that the citizens of Quin's River, Paradise Valley, Winnemucca, Gold Run, Golconda, Battle Mountain, Galena, Dun Glen, and Rye Patch, have to travel from fifty to

one hundred and fifty miles to get to the county seat of said county, by the usual and regular mode of conveyance, at great cost and inconvenience; and that while the Central Pacific Railroad runs from East to West, through said county, touching at Winnemucca, the centre of the inhabited portion of said county, and would alike accommodate the citizens on each side thereof, were the county seat located at Winnemucca. on said road, the citizens of Quin's River, Paradise Valley, Gold Run, Battle Mountain and Galena are now compelled to travel from ten to eighty miles to the railroad, from thirty to ninety miles to Mill City, where they are necessarily detained two nights—one in going and one on returning—and from Mill City to Unionville, the present county seat, twenty miles by stage, a journey which takes from four to five hours. citizens of Golconda, Winnemucca, Raspberry and Rye Patch are located on the railroad, and are compelled to travel a greater or less distance by railroad to Mill City, and thence by stage twenty miles to the present county seat; that a large majority of the citizens of said county reside North of and along the line of said railroad, and that it works a hardship on, and is an injustice to, a large majority of the citizens and taxpayers of said county to longer retain the county seat at Unionville; that a poor man, living in the Northern or Eastern portions of said county, unable to bear the expense of a journey to Unionville, to pay a tax of a few dollars, and consequently allowing the time limited by law for him to pay to expire, is subjected to burdensome and oppressive costs for officers' mileage, and that, in many instances, where the original tax did not exceed ten dollars, the costs from Sheriff's mileage alone amount to one hundred and twenty dollars; that while every citizen and taxpayer is alike subject to jury duty, it is oppressive and unjust to the poor citizen and small taxpayer of the county to be compelled to travel to the railroad, and on the railroad, and away from the railroad, to reach the county seat, when by locating the said county seat on the railroad, at the centre of population, all would be equally accommodated; that Unionville, the present county seat, is away from the centre of territory and population in said county; that the present locality of the county seat does not accommodate any of the citizens of said county, except those of Unionville, there being no precincts South of that place except on the line of the railroad; that said county extends from North to South a distance of one hundred and forty miles, and that the county seat is at present located within twenty miles of the Southern boundary of said county, and fifty miles from Winnemucca, the geographical centre of the county; and that the entire population of Humboldt county could reach Winnemucca in less time and at less expense than at any other point in said county; that at an election held in said county on the 6th day of December, 1869, for the removal of the county seat, Winnemucca received a majority of all the votes cast, but that through informality in the returns, Quin's River precinct was thrown out by the Board of Commissioners, which left Unionville a majority of seven. I therefore recommend that the bill do pass.
